# TECH GOLF NOTEBOOK

Georgia Tech's 21st-ranked golf team begins its quest to reach the NCAA Men's Golf Championship finals for the 29th time in its history at the NCAA Stanford Regional at the Stanford University Golf Course at Stanford, Calif. The 54-hole event, one of six qualifying tournaments being held around the nation concurrently, runs through Wednesday.

The Yellow Jackets are looking to advance to the NCAA Championship for the 28th time since 1985 and 29th time in program history, rebounding from last spring when they finished seventh in the Tucson Regional and did not advance.

This is the third straight year that Tech will travel to the West Coast for its NCAA regional. The Jackets played last May in Tucson, Ariz., and in San Diego in 2015.

## Team Update

Georgia Tech enters NCAA regionals ranked No. 21 in the Golfstat rankings and No. 22 in the Golfweek/Sagarin Index. Tech had risen as high as No. 20 and No. 19 in the respective ratings after the first five spring events, having finished second in three straight events leading into the ACC Championship, in which the Yellow Jackets tied for seventh place.

Tech's closest brush with victory came at the Valspar Collegiate Invitational against the toughest field it has faced this spring (10 top-50 teams), when the Yellow Jackets rallied on the final day to come within a shot of No. 9 Wake Forest. Tech tied for second with Florida State at the Seminole Intercollegiate the week before and second at the Clemson Invitational immediately before the ACC Championship.

Previously this spring, Tech tied for seventh place in a 21-team field at the Amer Ari Invitational in Hawai'i and tied for third among 15 teams at the Puerto Rico Classic. The Jackets' best finish in the fall was a fifth-place showing at the Carpet Capital Collegiate.

Tech has a 79-37-1 won-loss record cumulatively this year against a schedule rated the 13th-strongest in the country, according to the Golfweek/Sagarin Index.

## Tech Lineup

Head coach Bruce Heppler the Yellow Jackets' lineup for the post-season prior to the team competing in the Seminole Intercollegiate, going with a core of three freshmen in Andy Ogletree (Little Rock, Miss.), Luke Schniederjans (Powder Springs, Ga.) and Tyler Strafaci (Davie, Fla.) in his starting five, joining senior Vincent Whaley (McKinney, Texas) and junior James Clark (Columbus, Ga.), for the last two events.

Schniederjans and Strafaci have both landed in the winner's circle this year, Strafaci most recently at the Valspar Collegiate, where he captured a one-shot victory and earned his third top-20 finish this spring. Schniederjans has won twice, including a one-shot win at the Puerto Rico Classic in February, and he tied for third at the Seminole Collegiate. Schniederjans ranks No. 2 on the team in stroke average at 72.07 and is ranked 103rd in the nation in the Golfweek/Sagarin Index. Strafaci crept into the top 100 briefly after winning the Valspar (now No. 160) and has a 72.71 stroke average.

Clark, ranked No. 99, has developed into a solid middle-of-the-lineup player for the Yellow Jackets this spring, finishing eighth, 17th and third in Tech's last three events and compiling a team-best 72.00 stroke average. He tied for third at Clemson and led for a portion of the final round. Whaley returned to the lineup after a long absence at the Seminole Intercollegiate and tied for 20th place, shot a final-round 70 to help the Jackets' final-round rally at the Valspar and tied for 11th at Clemson. Ogletree has three top-20 finishes this year and a 72.89 stroke average.

## Clark, Schniederjans Named All-ACC

Georgia Tech's James Clark and Luke Schniederjans were been named to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference Men's Golf team, announced Thursday by the conference office on May 11.

Clark, a junior from Columbus, Ga., and Schniederjans, a freshman from Powder Springs, Ga., are among fifteen student-athletes who were honored on the all-conference team.

Clark has been the steadiest performer this year for the Yellow Jackets, who are ranked No. 21 in the latest Golfstat rankings. Ranked 99th nationally in the Golfweek/Sagarin ratings, leads Tech in stroke average (72.00) and has in the top 30 in six of nine events. He has a pair of top-10 finishes this spring, a tie for eighth at the Seminole Intercollegiate and a tie for third at the Clemson Invitational.

Schniederjans has accomplished two things his older brother, Ollie, a three-time All-American, did not as a freshman – win a golf tournament and make the All-ACC team. Luke won the Carpet Capital Collegiate in his college debut last fall and the Puerto Rico Classic this spring. He also tied for third at the Seminole Intercollegiate this spring and is ranked No. 103 nationally in Golfweek/Sagarin.

This is the 23rd time since 1985 that Tech has had multiple players make the All-ACC team. Clark and Schniederjans, both first-time honorees, bring to 33 the number of Yellow Jacket golfers who have made the All-ACC team at least once during their careers.

## Tee Shots

- The Stanford Regional will be Tech's third trip West this year. The Yellow Jackets also played in the Cypress Point Classic, a match play event on the Monterey Peninsula, last November, and the Maui Jim Intercollegiate in September. All five Jackets in this weekend's regional played in the Cypress Point Classic, and all but Strafaci played in the Maui Jim event.

- The Yellow Jackets, who finished the 2015-16 year outside the top 25 for the first time in 20 years (No. 42 in Golfstat and No. 38 in the Golfweek/Sagarin Index), have rebounded this spring to No. 21 in Golfstat and No. 22 in the Golfweek/Sagarin ratings.

- Georgia Tech boasts three individual champions this year, all from freshmen, with Luke Schniederjans capturing the Carpet Capital Collegiate and the Puerto Rico Classic, and Tyler Strafaci winning the Valspar Collegiate.

- Collectively, Tech's team has compiled eight top-10 finishes, six by the five players competing in the regional.

- Schniederjans, junior James Clark, senior Vincent Whaley and Strafaci are all ranked 161 or above in the Golfweek/Sagarin Index, while six Jackets are listed among the top 250 in Golfstat.

- The five players on Georgia Tech's roster in the ACC Tournament collectively have played 240 rounds in their collegiate careers, compared to 344 by last year's NCAA regional quintet, 475 rounds by the starting five in the 2015 NCAA Championship and 537 by the 2014 NCAA quintet.

- Only senior Vincent Whaley and junior James Clark have played in an NCAA regional for Tech. Whaley tied for 17th at last year's Tucson Regional, while Clark tied for 26th. At San Diego in 2015, Clark tied for 29th and Whaley tied for 49th.

- According to the Golfweek/Sagarin ratings, Tech has faced the 13th-most difficult schedule in Division I -- Tech has gone 7-32-3 vs. the nation's top 25 teams, 22-37-7 vs. the top 50, 54-37-7 vs. the top 100.

- Tech finished third (Puerto Rico Classic), second (Seminole Intercollegiate), second (Valspar Collegiate Invitational) and second (Clemson Invitational) in its last four events leading into the ACC Championship, but no higher than fifth in any event prior to that in 2016-17.

- Tech's team scoring average for the year is 286.63, more than three shots lower than last year's 290.14, less than two shots higher than the 2014-15 average of 284.90, and four higher than the 282.2 norm of 2013-14.

- Tech's best score of the year was 836 (-28) at the Seminole Intercollegiate.

- Georgia Tech has played in the NCAA Championship finals 28 times, and 27 times since 1985.

## Tech Golf APR Perfect for 12th Straight Year

Bruce Heppler's golf program again earned a perfect four-year APR score of 1000 for the four-year period ending in the 2015-16 academic year in the NCAA's survey announced May 10. The Yellow Jackets have earned a perfect four-year score every year since its inception in 2006, and has also received an APR Public Recognition Award every year. Among Power 5 conferences, the Yellow Jackets are one of two men's golf teams and 14 programs overall that have earned all 12 Public Recognition Awards.

The APR measures eligibility, graduation and retention each term and provides a clear picture of the academic performance for each team in every sport.

The APR is an annual scorecard of academic achievement calculated for all Division I sports teams nationally. The most recent APR scores are based on the four-year period ending with the 2015-16 academic year. This year marks the 12th year of APR data for most teams.

## Tech Signs Three in Class of 2017

Three highly-regarded junior golfers from the class of 2017 – Will Dickson of Providence, R.I., Noah Norton of Chico, Calif., and Ben Smith of Novi, Mich. – signed national letters-of-intent to play at Georgia Tech during the November signing period.

Each of the three prospects are ranked No. 2 among all junior golfers in their respective states and among the top 160 junior players from all classes nationally, according to the Junior Golf Scoreboard. Dickson, ranked No. 72 in his class, and Smith, ranked 99th, both qualified for last year's United States Amateur Championship. Dickson and Norton, No. 7 in his class, both qualified for the U.S. Junior Amateur.

"As we all know, there's never been a coach who doesn't like his recruits. Certainly, we don't want to put pressure on guys 10 months before they arrive, but I think this is one of the best groups we've ever signed. They're all from out of state, but they all saw the value in our program, our facilities and our academics, and, most importantly, they believe this is where they can achieve their goals."

Heppler's squad, which has won six of the last nine Atlantic Coast Conference championships and has reached NCAA Championship match play three of the last six years, will graduate two seniors in May.

Dickson is ranked 114th overall, 72nd in the class of 2017, and No. 2 in the state of Rhode Island according to the Junior Golf Scoreboard, and ranked 88th nationally by the American Junior Golf Association. Norton is ranked 11th overall, 7th in the class of 2017, and No. 2 in the state of California according to the Junior Golf Scoreboard, and was named a second-team Rolex All-American for 2016 by the American Junior Golf Association. Smith is ranked 158th overall, 99th in the class of 2017, and No. 2 in the state of Michigan according to the Junior Golf Scoreboard.

## Tech's NCAA Championship History

Georgia Tech has reached the NCAA Championship finals 27 times since 1985 (28th time in program history), which is tied for fourth most in that time period behind Oklahoma State (31), Florida (30), Arizona State (29) and Texas (28). Tech has posted nine top-8 finishes in the last 14 tries. *(Tech played in NCAA regionals in 2008, 2012 and 2015 but did not advance.)*

The Yellow Jackets tied for 10th in 2009, the first-year of the stroke-play/match-play format, but qualified for match play each of the next four times they have advanced to the NCAA Championship (third in 2010, second in 2011, second in 2013, fifth in 2014). Tech did not advance out of its regional in 2012 or 2016.

Tech lost to the eventual champion three times in its first three forays into match play - Augusta State by the score of 3-2 in the quarterfinals in 2010 and 2011 and to Alabama (3-0-2) in 2013.

Tech has been the runner-up in the NCAA Championship four times (1993, 2000, 2002 and 2005, all before the advent of match play), more than any team in the history of the championship except Houston, Michigan, Texas and Wake Forest, who also have four, and Oklahoma State, which has five.

In 1993 and 2002, the Yellow Jackets led after 54 holes, but finished second by one shot to Florida in 1993, and by four shots to Minnesota in 2002.

In 2000, the Yellow Jackets rallied to tie Oklahoma State after 72 holes, but lost to the Cowboys on the first hole of a playoff. Tech and OSU matched the lowest 72-hole team score in NCAA Championship history (36-under-par 1,116) at the Grand National Lake Course in Opelika, Ala. In 2005, Tech finished 11 shots behind Georgia, and seven shots ahead of third-place Washington.

Since Bruce Heppler became Tech's coach, the Jackets have finished in the top eight 11 times, with one 10th-place and one 11th-place finish.

Three Tech players have won national collegiate championships. Troy Matteson did it most recently in 2002 at Ohio State. Watts Gunn (1927) and Charlie Yates (1934) won national titles under a match play format before the NCAA took sponsorship of the championship in 1939.

Other top-10 finishers for Tech include David Duval (runner-up in 1991 and 1993, T-8 in 1990), Bill McDonald (T-2 in 1988), Bunky Henry (2nd in 1967), Roberto Castro (3rd in 2005), Nacho Gervas (T-3 in 1986), Paul Haley (T9 in 2010), Kris Mikkelsen (T-4 in 2001), Stewart Cink (T-5 in 1994), Bryce Molder (6th in 1998), Matt Weibring (6th in 2000), James White (T8 in 2011) and Ollie Schniederjans (T8 in 2013 and 2nd in 2015).

## Tech and NCAA Match Play

The 2009 NCAA Championship featured a new twist with the team champion determined via match play. The top eight teams after 54 holes of stroke play advance to a match play tournament format.

The NCAA added a fourth round of stroke play in 2016 for the top 15 teams and nine individuals not on those teams, after which the national individual champion and the top eight teams for match play will be determined.

Match play a format that Bruce Heppler has supported vigorously. Under Heppler, Georgia Tech finished in the top eight of the NCAA Finals seven times in 10 tries under the 72-hole, stroke-play format. Tech is one of only two teams (Oklahoma State is the other) to have advanced to match play four times in the six years the current format has been in effect.

In the stroke-play/match play era, the Yellow Jackets have finished 10th, third, second, second and fifth, respectively, in the stroke-play portion the NCAA Championship in five tries (Tech did not advance out of its regional in 2012 or 2016). Tech lost to the eventual national champion three of the four times has qualified for match play (Augusta State in the 2010 and 2011 quarterfinals, Alabama in the 2013 semifinals).

Tech has had success in other match-play events in recent years, reaching the finals of the Callaway Collegiate Match Play Championship four times in six appearances.

## Tech in NCAA Regional Competition

Georgia Tech has advanced through an NCAA regional 23 times in 26 tries, and all but twice since the NCAA went to a six-regional qualifying format in 2009. Head coach Bruce Heppler's teams have won five regional tournaments outright, most recently in 2014, and tied for one other.

The NCAA began using regional qualifying tournaments in 1989, first with the 81 teams split among three sites (27 teams each), then with six sites with either 13 or 14 teams each beginning in 2009. Since the NCAA went to six regional sites in 2009, Tech has finished third (Bowling Green, Ky.), third (Milton, Ga.), tied for third (Radford, Va.), sixth/did not advance (Norman, Okla.), fourth (Tallahassee, Fla.), first (Raleigh, N.C.), third (San Diego) and tied for seventh/did not advance (Tucson).

Tech's first four victories all occurred in 27-team regionals in 1991 (New Haven, Conn.), 1998 (Daufuskie Island, S.C.), 1999 (Providence, R.I.) and 2002 (Roswell, Ga., tied with Clemson). Only the 2014 win occurred in a 13-team field.

## Georgia Tech Match Play History

While match play in college golf may be infrequent, Georgia Tech is no stranger to it, having participated in six regular season match play events since 2001, as well as three times in the five years the NCAA has utilized match play to determine its champion. Here is a history of Tech's participation.

## ACC Championship History

Georgia Tech has two of the last four Atlantic Coast Conference championships, six of the last nine and eight of the last 12, but the Yellow Jackets have not won since 2015.

Tech's 16 ACC men's golf titles in history ranks second among conference schools behind Wake Forest (18). Tech has won 11 of its conference titles under current head coach Bruce Heppler, nine of those outright (1999, 2001, 2002, 2009, 2010, 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015) and two shared (2006, 2007). The Yellow Jackets won five championships (1985, 1991, 1992, 1993, 1994) under previous head coach Puggy Blackmon.

Ten of Tech's ACC titles have occurred at the Old North State Club, the first occurring in 1999 by 10 strokes over North Carolina and Duke. Tech won the 2011 crown with a tournament record score of 831 (-33) and by a record 20 strokes. Tech shared the 2006 title with North Carolina, and the 2007 crown with Virginia Tech.

If a consistently high level of success over a long period of time is the measure of a great program, then Georgia Tech's golf program under Bruce Heppler would certainly meet the standard. His peers recognized this in 2013 when they inducted him into the Golf Coaches Association of America Hall of Fame.

Tech is currently on a run unprecedented in school history and perhaps unmatched by any other in Division I - eight Atlantic Coast Conference titles in the last 11 years and four trips to match play at the NCAA Championship in the last seven.

Heppler has guided the Yellow Jackets to the NCAA Championship every year since 1998, and helped author 11 top-8 finishes in the Finals, including three runner-up showings.

Tech has advanced to match play at the NCAA Championship for the four times in the eight years the format has been used, and is one of only two programs that have advanced to match play four times.

During his tenure, Tech has won or shared 11 Atlantic Coast Conference titles. Only two ACC coaches have led their teams to more ACC titles than has Heppler. The Yellow Jackets have captured or shared 46 team titles overall.

He was named ACC Coach of the Year in 2014 for the eighth time, more than any coach in ACC history except one, and was a finalist for the GCAA's Dave Williams national coach of the year award.

Since 2000, the Yellow Jackets have finished in the top 10 of the final Golfstat rankings 11 times, and in the final Golfweek/Sagarin top 10 13 times. Tech did not finish lower than 14th in either ranking in any year from 2000 to 2015.

In a July, 2015 poll of his coaching peers conducted by Golfweek magazine, Heppler ranked No. 3. His program was ranked No. 2 among College Factual's ranking of the best colleges to play golf, taking into account both the quality of the golf team, as well as the academic success of the players and the quality of the school.

Heppler has recruited and developed his share of star players as well. The Yellow Jackets have had at least a pair of All-Atlantic Coast Conference honorees in 16 of the last 18 years, and landed four members of the team on the squad twice (2005, 2011). Tech has had at least two players earn All-America honors 14 of the last 17 years, and Ollie Schniederjans became the program's 20th and 21st first-team selections in his junior and senior years. Three of his players, Matt Kuchar, Bryce Molder and Troy Matteson, have been named national player of the year.

Thirteen of Heppler's players are currently active members of either the PGA Tour or the Web.com Tour, with several other recent graduates climbing their way up through the SwingThought.com or other mini-tours.

Heppler has been named to coach the United States team in the Palmer Cup twice, in 2003 and 2015, and eight of his players have also represented the USA in that annual event.

Kuchar, Molder, Nicholas Thompson and Cameron Tringale have represented the United States in the Walker Cup matches. Twice, in 1998 and 2013, five or more of the Heppler's active Tech players have qualified to play in the U.S. Amateur. Six of Tech's seven returning players in 2013 competed in that year's U.S. Amateur in Brookline, Mass., an unprecedented feat.

On the conference level since 1985, when the Yellow Jackets won their first ACC Championship, Tech has earned more NCAA Championship berths than any team except Clemson. The Jackets have earned more top-10, more top-5 and more top-2 finishes in NCAA Championship competition than any other ACC team. Tech also has had more All-America selections (61) than any other ACC team during the same period except the Tigers.

His players have been just as successful in the classroom. Tech's golf program has been recognized with a perfect Academic Progress Report score of 1000 for 11 straight years, and every senior has graduated.

Fourteen different players under Heppler have been named All-America Scholars by the Golf Coaches Association of America, which requires a minimum 3.2 GPA and participation in at least 75 percent of a team's events. Two, All-Americans Bryce Molder and Roberto Castro, have received the NCAA's Top VIII Award, an honor given to eight student-athletes from all sports each year and recognizes those who excel in their sport and in the classroom, and exhibit high character, leadership and service to others.

It didn't take long for Heppler to restore the glory to Tech's golf program following a couple of lean years in the mid-1990s. After recruiting future All-Americans Kuchar and Molder, Heppler had the Yellow Jackets back in the NCAA Tournament in his third season, where they finished third, just four shots off the lead. Tech also was ranked No. 1 in the nation during the course of the year and won the NCAA East Regional.

Even better things were to come as Tech captured the first of its ACC titles under Heppler in 1999. In 2000 the Yellow Jackets came the closest to an NCAA Championship in their history, tying for first after 72 holes with Oklahoma State before losing a one-hole playoff. On the year, Tech captured four team titles and finished in the top four in each event it entered.

During the 2001 campaign, the Jackets won their second ACC crown in three years, the





second under Heppler, captured a school-record-tying five tournament wins during the year and finished fourth in the NCAA Championship. For his efforts, Heppler was named ACC Coach of the Year and guided three All-Americans in Molder, who was also the consensus National Player of the Year, Matteson and Kris Mikkelsen.

In 2002, Heppler led the Yellow Jackets to arguably the best season in school history, as Tech captured seven team titles and finished second at the NCAA Championship. In the process, Heppler earned National and ACC Coach of the Year honors. During the year, the Jackets won the school's eighth ACC title, while placing all five starters on GCAA All-America teams. Under Heppler's tutelage, Matteson became the third Tech player to win the national individual title.

Tech has dominated the Atlantic Coast Conference in recent years, winning eight of the last 10 titles and six of the last seven. The Yellow Jackets have been to the NCAA Tournament every year since 1998, and only twice in that time failed to advance out of a regional. In the seven years the NCAA has conducted the current medal/match play format for the championship, Tech has advanced to match play four times.

A 55-year-old native of St. George, Utah, Heppler has demonstrated his strength as a recruiter by attracting both National Players of the Year during 1997-98 and the ACC Players of the Year for 1998, 1999, 2000 and 2001. His first recruit at Tech was Kuchar, who won the 1997 U.S. Amateur Championship and was named the ACC Player of the Year and the Fred Haskins National Player of the Year in 1998. Molder was the Jack Nicklaus Player of the Year in 1998 and in 2001, along with being named the ACC Player of the Year in 1999, 2000 and 2001.

Heppler, a dean's list student at Brigham Young, earned his bachelor's degree in accounting from BYU in 1985, and later received his master's degree in sport management from Massachusetts in 1988. He played golf for one year at Dixie Junior College in St. George before transferring to Brigham Young.

He became a certified public accountant in 1985 and spent one year in the firm of Huber and Associates in Salt Lake City, then began his collegiate coaching career in 1987 as the men and women's golf coach at Amherst. He then spent two years as an administrative assistant at UNLV, becoming the assistant men's golf coach at UNLV in 1989. He spent two years in that role before moving to Oklahoma State in 1991.

"Georgia Tech is a great fit for me," said Heppler. "This is one of the five or six best programs right now if you look around at college golf's successful teams since the '90s. We have a lot of alumni on the PGA Tour, which is great for the school. Young people can see they have a chance to be player of the year or win a national championship here. It's a great school academically, which is a real draw with the general pool of talent out there interested in playing college golf."

Heppler is married to the former Traci Schull of Southbury, Conn., and they have a son, Zakary, and a daughter, Moriah. Heppler is actively involved with Atlanta Alliance for Children and is a member of the Golf Coaches Association of America.

**D**rew McGee, who spent the last two years as an assistant coach at the University of New Mexico, joined the Georgia Tech golf program as assistant coach in July of 2016.

McGee, 26, assists head coach Bruce Heppler in the areas of operations, scheduling, recruiting, academics and fund-raising. Jeff Pierce, who spent the 2015-16 year as Heppler's

full-time assistant coach, transitioned into a volunteer coaching role and will continue to assist with instruction.

"We're excited for Drew to join our program," said Heppler, who is entering his 22nd year at the helm of the Tech program. "Drew has been involved in every aspect of the New Mexico program and has been successful in their recruiting over the past couple of years. He comes highly recommended and is highly-regarded by many of the coaches on the West Coast. He is thrilled with the opportunity to work in our program and recognizes the years of continued excellent that our program has enjoyed."

During his two years at New Mexico, McGee helped guide the Lobos to three tournament victories, two NCAA regional tournament appearances and a second-place finish in the Mountain West Conference Championship in 2016. Four Lobos won individual tournament titles, while five members of the team made the all-MWC team, and one was named Mountain West Player of the Year. McGee also served as co-director of the Lobo Junior Golf Camps.

"I am very excited to join Coach Heppler and the Georgia Tech golf program," said McGee. "I am also grateful for my time at New Mexico and the chance to work with Coach (Glen) Millican. I believe that my experience there has prepared me well for this tremendous opportunity. Coach Heppler has created a tradition of success both on the course and in the classroom, and I look forward to working with him and the players to build on that success. Georgia Tech is definitely a special place and I am thankful to be here."

Prior to accepting an assistant's position at New Mexico, McGee was head coach of the men's and women's teams at NAIA Northwood College in Cedar Hill, Texas, for the spring of 2014. Northwood's teams broke two scoring records under McGee during his tenure, and the women's team finished 10th in the 2014 NAIA Championships in Lincoln, Neb. That spring, he received the NAIA's Champion of Character Award.

McGee began his coaching career as a volunteer assistant in 2013 at McNeese State.

McGee is a 2012 graduate of Baylor University with a bachelor's degree in business administration and was a three-year letter winner for coach Greg Priest. McGee was a member of the Big XII Commissioner's honor roll.

He was a four-year letterwinner for head coaches Ronnie Jones and Jeff Williamson at Graham (Texas) High School. McGee led the Steers to back-to-back state runner-up finishes in 2005 and 2006 before helping Graham strike gold with a state championship in 2008. McGee was a first-team all-district, all-region and all-state performer his senior year. His sister Anna is a volleyball player at Texas Women's University.

**JEFF PIERCE**

**Volunteer Coach**  
**2nd year at Tech**  
**Morehead State, 2009**

**J**eff Pierce, a veteran professional golf instructor dating back to his college years, moved into a volunteer assistant role for the Georgia Tech golf team in August of 2016 after joining the Yellow Jackets as an assistant coach on October of 2015.

Pierce, 29, will continue to assist with golf instruction for the current Tech players, and will now take over management of the program's newly-renovated Noonan Golf Facility at the edge of campus and next to Atlantic Station, using the facility to tutor the Yellow Jackets' players and his professional clients, including PGA Tour members Roberto Castro, Brooks Koepka, Derek Fathauer, Si Woo Kim and others.

Pierce came to Tech after serving as the director of instruction at Elk River Golf Club in Banner Elk, N.C., during the summer of 2015 and a three-year tenure as the senior instructor at Butch Harmon Floridian, an elite golf learning center based at The Floridian Resort in Palm City, Fla. Pierce has delivered golf instruction to players at all levels, creating and administering programs in both individual and group situations. He has expertise in the latest instruction technology as well as club fitting and performance.

"Last fall, I made a decision to hire Coach Pierce in an effort to provide some specific skill instruction for our team," said head coach Bruce Heppler. "At that time, he was also working closely with several PGA Tour professionals. With Coach Pierce moving to the volunteer role, he can still be involved in skill instruction with our team and work with players who stay behind when we are competing in tournaments as well as serve his professional clients, some of whom are former Tech players."

Pierce's list of pupils at Butch Harmon Floridian included winners in the PGA Tour, the Web.com Tour, the European Tour and the LPGA Tour. He has traveled 12-15 weeks a year to work directly with players such as former Florida State All-American Brooks Koepka, who finished 24th in the 2015 FedEx Cup standings and won the Waste Management Phoenix Open, and former Louisville All-American Derek Fathauer, who won the 2014 Web.com Tour championship.

"The structure of our staff is new and something we're all excited about," said Pierce. "It will enable us to provide the best instruction possible to our players going forward. Thus blueprint will be something other programs may follow in the future. I've been instructing players at the highest level for a long time, and part of that is developing players. I've been doing the job with guys that have been fresh out of college or late in college. In the college environment, I can have a deeper relationship with our players as we work with them to develop their games."

Prior to working at Butch Harmon Floridian, Pierce was an assistant golf professional at The Virginian Golf Club in Bristol, Va. (March 2011-Oct. 2012), and began his career as an assistant golf professional at Elizabethtown (Ky.) Country Club from 2006-09 while a student-athlete at Morehead State University.

A native of Glasgow, Ky., Pierce earned All-Ohio Valley Conference honors in golf at Morehead State in the 2008-09 academic year. He earned OVC academic honors (3.5-plus GPA) and made the MSU Dean's List all four years at Morehead State, where he studied industrial engineering technology. He played professionally for a year before diving into instruction full-time.

# ADMINISTRATION



## DR. G.P. "BUD" PETERSON

President

G.P. "Bud" Peterson was appointed as the 11th president of Georgia Tech on April 1, 2009. Prior to his appointment, he served as chancellor at the University of Colorado at Boulder (2006-2009), provost at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy, New York (2000-2006), and program director at the National Science Foundation for the Thermal Transport and Thermal Processing Program (1993-1994). He has held various positions at Texas A&M University, beginning in 1981 as an assistant professor of engineering technology and Halliburton Professor of Mechanical Engineering (1990), the College of Engineering's Tenneco Professor, head of the Department of Mechanical Engineering (1993-1996), executive associate dean of engineering (1996-2000), and associate vice chancellor for engineering for the Texas A&M University System (1996-2000). Prior to his service at Texas A&M, he was a visiting research scientist at NASA-Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas (1981-1982), associate professor and head of the General Engineering Technology Department at Kansas Technical Institute in Salina, Kan. (1979-1981), and taught mathematics, physics and chemistry at Shawnee Mission South High School in Overland Park, Kan. (1978-1979), and Wabaunsee County High School in Alma, Kan. (1977-1978).

Throughout his career, Peterson has played an active role in helping to establish the national education and research agendas, serving on numerous industry, government, and academic task forces and committees. He has served as a member of a number of congressional task forces, research councils, and advisory boards, including the Office of Naval Research (ONR), the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), the Department of Energy (DOE), the National Research Council (NRC), and the National Academy of Engineering (NAE). In addition, he has served as a member of the Board of Directors and vice president for education for the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics (AIAA) and is currently serving as a member of the National Science Board (NSB), co-chair of the Government Relations Committee of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU), as a member of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness, and was recently appointed by Secretary Gary Locke as a member of the National Advisory Council on Innovation and Entrepreneurship (NACIE).

As chancellor of the University of Colorado, Peterson led the development of a new university wide strategic plan, Flagship 2030, which defined a vision for the university for the next 20 years. In his nearly three years as chancellor, freshman applications increased by 35 percent, the number of under-represented minorities in the freshmen class increased by 38 percent, sponsored research increased by more than 18 percent, and private philanthropy for the university increased by nearly 80 percent.

As provost at Rensselaer, he played a key role in the institutional transformation and the dramatic improvement in the quality, size, and diversity of the faculty – overseeing the hiring of nearly 40 percent of the faculty, increasing the total number of tenured and tenure-track faculty by 20 percent, and improving the diversity of the tenured/tenure-track faculty by more than doubling the number of under-represented minorities and increasing the number of women by 40 percent. In addition, during his tenure as provost, the quality, size, and diversity of the student body increased, with the number of full-time PhD students increasing by 25%.

Peterson's research interests have focused on the fundamental aspects of phase change heat transfer, including the heat transfer in reduced gravity environments, boiling from enhanced surfaces, and some of the earliest work in the area of flow and phase change heat transfer in microchannels. Early investigations focused on applications involving the thermal control of manned and unmanned spacecraft and progressed through applications of phase change heat transfer to the thermal control of electronic components and devices. More recently, investigations have included fundamental applications of phase change heat transfer to the field of biotechnology, including the insitu treatment of cancerous tissue using hypo and hyperthermia to arrest epileptic seizures through the rapid cooling of localized brain tissue, which required highly efficient heat dissipation devices capable of dissipating thermal energy to surrounding tissue.

A Fellow of both the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics, Peterson is the author or co-author of 14 books or book chapters, 180 refereed journal articles, more than 150 conference publications, and holds eight patents with two others pending. He is a member of several professional organizations and the recipient of numerous national and international honors and awards for both teaching and research.



## TODD STANSBURY

Director of Athletics

Georgia Institute of Technology introduced former Tech football player Todd Stansbury as the Institute's ninth director of athletics on Sept. 22, 2016.

Stansbury has served as Oregon State's athletic director since June 2015 following a nine-year stint as the university's executive associate athletic director from 2003-2012. During his time at Oregon State, Stansbury was part of a senior management team that raised \$150 million for a football stadium expansion, in addition to fundraising for the construction of a sports performing center. He also was part of a team that established several career development initiatives for student-athletes.

"Todd Stansbury is committed to athletes' success both on and off the field," Peterson said. "His global perspective and leadership experience in athletics and development, combined with a lifelong passion for Georgia Tech, make him the ideal candidate. I believe this is one of those rare golden moments in life where opportunity meets ambition. We welcome him home."

Stansbury's resume also includes roles as athletic director at the University of Central Florida (2012-2015) and East Tennessee State University (2000-2003). He was Georgia Tech's assistant athletic director for academics from 1988-1995 under Homer Rice. Now he returns to campus to guide a department that features 15 teams in 17 NCAA Division I varsity sports.

"I am honored and humbled to have the opportunity to return to Georgia Tech, a place that has played such a large role in my life and the place responsible for opening up a world to me that I didn't even know existed," Stansbury said. "I am thankful to President Peterson and the selection committee for providing me this opportunity."

Stansbury grew up in Canada. When he was 10 years old and on vacation with his family in Florida, he befriended several Georgia Tech football players staying at the same hotel. During the drive back home to Ontario, his family stopped on campus to see a practice. That's when Stansbury knew he wanted to play football on The Flats. He earned varsity letters while at Georgia Tech from 1980-1984 as a middle linebacker and on special teams for head coach Bill Curry. He was a third-round draft pick of the Canadian Football League's Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1984.

As the ninth director of athletics in Georgia Tech history, he follows in the footsteps of storied names such as Rice, John Heisman and Bobby Dodd. He was hired following a national search that began in August 2016 when Mike Bobinski accepted the athletics director position at Purdue University. A nine-member search committee led by Georgia Tech Foundation President Al Trujillo identified candidates. The search process was assisted by Turnkey Search.

"I want to thank Al and the search committee for their outstanding guidance in evaluating candidates," Peterson said. "I'm also personally grateful for the leadership and (interim A.D.) Paul (Griffin), who interrupted his retirement to return to campus to lead our Athletics Association. He will continue to be a great asset during the transition period for the remainder of 2016."

Georgia Tech has achieved a school-record Graduation Success Rate (84 percent according to the most recent NCAA figures from November 2015) in each of the past three years. The Institute also recorded outstanding scores in the Academic Progress Rate (APR), which provides a real-time NCAA metric to measure the success of institutions in moving student-athletes toward graduation. The latest APR statistics, released in April, reported that 13 of Georgia Tech's 15 teams scored 980 or better out of a possible 1,000 points.

**R**eginald DesRoches is the Karen and John Huff School Chair and Professor of Civil and Environmental Engineering at the Georgia Institute of Technology. DesRoches took over as FAR on July 1, 2014, after Professor Sue Ann Bidstrup stepped down following a five-year stint as FAR.

As Chair of the School of Civil & Environmental Engineering, he provides leadership to a top-ranked program with 100 faculty and staff and 1,100 students. His primary research interests are in design of resilient infrastructure systems under extreme loads. He has published more than 300 articles in the general area of resilience and seismic risk assessment, and he has given more than 100 presentations in over 35 different countries.

A fellow of the American Society of Civil Engineers and the society's Structural Engineering Institute, Dr. DesRoches has served as the key technical leader in the United States' response to the Haiti earthquake and led a team of 28 engineers, architects, city planners, and social scientists to study the impact of the earthquake. He has also participated in numerous congressional briefings to underscore the critical role that university research must play in addressing the country's infrastructure crisis and resilience to natural hazards. Dr. DesRoches has served as thesis advisor to 29 Doctoral and 17 Master's thesis students.

Dr. DesRoches serves on the National Academy of Sciences Resilience Roundtable and the Academy's Board on Army Science and Technology as well as on the National Science Foundation's Advisory Committee for Engineering, the Global Earthquake Modeling Scientific Board, and the advisory board for the Natural Disasters, Coastal Infrastructure and Emergency Management Research Center. He has chaired the American Society of Civil Engineers' Seismic Effects Committee as well as the executive committee of the Technical Council on Lifeline Earthquake Engineering.

In recent years, Dr. DesRoches has testified before U.S. House and Senate subcommittees on earthquake resilience and science and participated in Washington, D.C., roundtables on topics ranging from disaster preparedness to challenges for African-American men in STEM fields. National media outlets frequently contact him for expert analysis following earthquake events, including CNN, CNN International, LiveScience, National Geographic, and Asia Times online. He also is frequently called on as a champion of the critical role that university research must play in addressing the country's infrastructure crisis and resilience to natural hazards.

Dr. DesRoches has received the Presidential Early Career Award for Scientists and Engineers (PECASE) in 2002 — the highest honor bestowed upon scientists and engineers in the early stages of their careers. Most recently, he was a recipient of the 2007 ASCE Walter L. Huber Civil Engineering Research Prize, the 2015 ASCE Charles Martin Duke Lifeline Earthquake Engineering Award, the Georgia Tech Outstanding Doctoral Thesis Advisor Award (2010), and the Georgia Tech ANAK Award (2008). The ANAK award is the highest honor the undergraduate student body can bestow on a Georgia Tech faculty member.

DesRoches was born in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and grew up in Queens, New York. He earned his Bachelor of Science in Mechanical Engineering, Master of Science in Civil Engineering, and Ph.D. in Structural Engineering at the University of California, Berkeley, where he was recently elected to the civil engineering department's Academy of Distinguished Alumni.

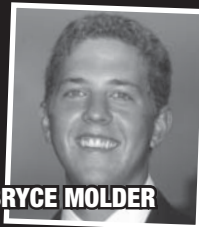

## NCAA Championship Timeline

The national collegiate championships were conducted by the United States Golf Association through 1938, and consisted of a medal competition and a match play bracket similar to today's U.S. Amateur.

The NCAA began conducting the championship in 1939, using a match play format through 1965, when it became a 72-hole, stroke-play event.

The NCAA instituted a 54-hole cut from 1979-88. A 36-hole cut was used in 1989, and again from 1992-2001. No cuts were made in 1990, 1991 or 2002.

Regional qualifying tournaments were instituted in 1989, expanding the championship field to 81 teams, 27 in each of three regionals, with 30 teams advancing to the 72-hole finals. In 2009, the format was changed to include a total of six regional tournaments (13 teams in three, 14 teams in the other three). Thirty teams (five from each regional) advanced to the finals.

The finals structure changed again in 2009, with 30 teams playing 54 holes of stroke play. The individual national champion was crowned after 54 holes, and the top eight teams advanced to a match play bracket to decide the team champion. In 2015, the NCAA added a fourth 18-hole round to the stroke-play portion, cutting the field to the top 15 teams and nine individuals not on those teams for the final round.

Georgia Tech fielded its first intercollegiate golf team in 1918, “and it was met with marked success in the matches with the Eastern colleges,” reads the 1918 edition of the Blueprint, the Georgia Tech yearbook.

“To get to the personnel and work of the team. Very little time was had by the men to practice, but they went to it with a will and when the time for the first match with Columbia came around, a formidable quartet was on hand. Perry Adair, one of the foremost golfers in the South, was number one man. Adair has been playing golf around Atlanta since twelve years old and holds many of the course records in the South. Fred Howden of Savannah, was elected manager. Howden had a score of notable records to his credit there. Ewing Watkins, one of the best golfers in Tennessee and said to be the longest driver in the South, and Tom Prescott of Atlanta golf fame, comprised the other two members of the team.”

Scoring for matches that year, and in years beyond, “was kept on the Nassau system, the winners on the first nine being awarded one point, the same being true for the second nine holes, and an additional point being awarded for the best ball of the match.”
