CLEMSON OPENS ACC PLAY AGAINST GEORGIA TECH

Conference play has arrived for No. 3/2 Clemson, which will square off against the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets in Clemson's 2018 ACC debut on Saturday, Sept. 22. Kickoff from Bobby Dodd Stadium in Atlanta is scheduled for 3:30 p.m. ET.

"We've gotten some good, quality experience under our belts in this first quarter of season, which bodes well for us entering conference play. We're going to Atlanta next week, so we have a huge challenge ahead of us," Head Coach Dabo Swinney told the Clemson Tigers Network following last week's 38-7 win against Georgia Southern. "There have been lots of positive takeaways from the first three games, though... Our next goal is to win the division."

Clemson has had to make itself at home on the road in conference openers in years past, as 2018 marks the seventh consecutive season that the Tigers have opened conference play on the road. Clemson has won each of their last three conference openers, and with a victory on Saturday, the 2018 seniors can become Clemson's first senior class to sweep their conference openers since 2005.

Last week, Swinney and the Tiger coaching staff publicly declared their intention to jumpstart the Clemson running game, and the Tigers delivered against Georgia Southern with their first 300-yard rushing game since the fourth game of the 2017 season. Running back Travis Etienne led Clemson with a career-high 162 yards on 16 carries. He eclipsed 1,000 career rushing yards on his final run and now sits atop the school's all-time leaderboard for yards-per-carry average (7.29).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR THIS WEEK

- Clemson attempting to open 4-0 for the fourth straight season and for the fifth time in the last six years.
- Clemson winning its first four games of a season for the sixth time under Head Coach Dabo Swinney (2011, 2013, 2015, 2016, 2017). Clemson's five 4-0 starts under Swinney are already the most under any head coach in school history (Frank Howard, 4; Danny Ford, 3; Josh Cody, 3; Tommy Bowden, 2; John Heisman, 1).
- Clemson opening ACC play on the road for the seventh year in a row, the longest stretch in program history. Clemson has not opened conference play at home since 2011.
- Clemson opening ACC play with a victory for a fourth consecutive season. The Tigers won their conference opener in each of the last three seasons. A fourth straight victory in their conference opener would mark the program's longest such winning streak since the 2002-05 seasons.
- Clemson earning its 31st all-time victory against Georgia Tech. Georgia Tech is one of 11 schools against whom Clemson has earned at least 30 all-time victories (South Carolina, Wake Forest, North Carolina State, Furman, Virginia, North Carolina, Duke, Maryland, Presbyterian and The Citadel).
- Clemson winning its fourth consecutive game against Georgia Tech, dating back to a 43-24 home win in 2015. It would match Clemson's longest winning streak in the all-time series, matching four-game winning streaks across the 1898-1903 seasons and the 1993-96 campaigns.
- Clemson winning back-to-back road games at Georgia Tech for the first time the 2001 and 2003. Clemson won its most recent game at Georgia Tech, 26-7, in 2016.
- Clemson recording its 14th all-time road win against Georgia Tech.
- Clemson improving to 20-4 under Head Coach Dabo Swinney when entering a game ranked lower in the AP Poll than it was in its previous contest.
- Clemson securing its 16th victory in its last 17 true road games.
- Clemson earning its 23rd victory in its last 26 games away from home, including neutral site contests.
- Clemson defeating an ACC foe for the 28th time in its last 30 opportunities, including conference championship games, dating back to 2015.
- Clemson extending its winning streak in Saturday games to 20. The current 19-game streak is the longest of any Power Five school in the country. It is the second-longest Saturday winning streak in school history, trailing a 21-game Saturday streak across the 2014-16 campaigns.
- Clemson winning its 17th consecutive game in the month of September, dating back to 2014. The current streak is already the longest in school history.
- Clemson winning games in back-to-back weeks against teams from the state of Georgia for the first time since winning consecutive games against Georgia and Georgia Tech in September 1987.
- Clemson recording at least three sacks in a fourth straight game for the first time since the Tigers recorded a combined 14 sacks across the Wake Forest (four), South Carolina (three), Virginia Tech (four) and Ohio State (three) games in 2016.
- Clemson forcing a takeaway in a 12th consecutive contest, which would be the program's longest streak since a 15-game stretch across the 2012-13 seasons.
- Clemson attempting to hold their opponents without a first-half touchdown for the eighth time in the last nine games.

- Dabo Swinney improving to 7-5 all-time against Georgia Tech.
- Swinney improving to 10-6 as a head coach all-time in games against schools from the state of Georgia. He enters the game with a 6-5 mark against Georgia Tech, a 1-1 record against Georgia and a 1-0 mark against both Georgia State and Georgia Southern.
- Kelly Bryant (968) and Tavien Feaster (945) entering the game 32 yards and 55 yards, respectively, away from reaching 1,000 career rushing yards. Travis Etienne reached 1,000 career rushing yards last week, and Clemson will attempt to become the fifth FBS team with three active career 1,000-yard rushers (Ball State, Georgia Tech, SMU, Syracuse).
- Bryant (4,250) accounting for 365 yards of total offense to pass Homer Jordan (4,614) and move into the Top 10 in Clemson history in career total offense.
- Bryant (308) completing 26 passes to pass Rodney Williams (333 from 1985-88) for eighth-most career completions in Clemson history.
- Bryant (3,282) chasing No. 14 DeChane Cameron (3,300), No. 13 Mike Eppley (3,354), No. 12 Brandon Streeter (3,504), No. 11 Homer Jordan (3,643) and No. 10 Tommy Kendrick (3,893) to enter the Top 10 in school history in career passing yards.
- Bryant (16) chasing Nos. 14 Brandon Streeter and Cole Stoudt (17), No. 13 Harvey White (18) and No. 12 Will Proctor (19) on the school's all-time leaderboard for career touchdown passes.
- Running back Travis Etienne rushing for a touchdown to match his career-long streak for consecutive games with a rushing touchdown (four, set vs. Florida State, The Citadel, South Carolina and Miami in 2017).
- Etienne rushing for 100 yards to post consecutive 100-yard rushing games for the first time in his career.
- Etienne attempting to become the first Clemson player to rush for 100 yards in back-to-back games since Wayne Gallman against Wake Forest and South Carolina in 2016.
- Defensive end Clelin Ferrell entering the week with 20.5 career sacks, third-most among active players in the FBS and the most among non-seniors. His 5.0 sacks this season are tied for the most in the FBS.
- Kicker Greg Huegel (293) scoring two points to pass James Davis (294) for sixth-most career points in school history.
- Huegel (293) also chasing No. 5 Travis Zachery (300), No. 4 Nelson Welch (301) and No. 3 C.J. Spiller (308) on the program's all-time career scoring list.
- Huegel (293) scoring seven points to become the sixth player in school history to reach 300 career points, joining Chandler Catanzaro, Aaron Hunt, C.J. Spiller, Nelson Welch and Travis Zachery.
- Huegel (46) kicking two field goals to pass David Treadwell (47) for seventh-most made field goals in a career in school history.
- Huegel (46) kicking four field goals to join Nelson Welch, Chandler Catanzaro, Obed Ariri, Chris Gardocki, Aaron Hunt and Jad Dean as the only players to connect on at least 50 career field goals with Clemson.
- Tackle Mitch Hyatt (3,046) chasing No. 4 Glenn Rountree (3,048) and No. 3 Kyle Young (3,097) on the school's all-time leaderboard for career snaps from scrimmage.
- Hyatt making his 46th career start to pull within three starts of tying and four starts of breaking Landon Walker's school record for career starts by an offensive tackle (49). Walker also shares the mark for most starts by an offensive lineman with center Dalton Freeman.
- Hyatt (45) tying PK Nelson Welch (46 from 1991-94) and P Cole Chason (46 from 2003-06) for the eighth-most career starts in Clemson history.

- Dexter Lawrence (three) blocking his fourth career placekick to tie Jarvis Jenkins' school record for most career blocked placekicks (four from 2007-10).

- Hunter Renfrow (31) catching a pass to extend his streak of consecutive games played with a reception to 32.

- Wide receiver Justyn Ross recording 100 receiving yards in consecutive games for the first time in his career. He would be the first Clemson player with consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Mike Williams against Syracuse and Pitt in 2016.

- Ross becoming the first Clemson freshman with back-to-back 100-yard receiving games since Artavis Scott vs. South Carolina and Oklahoma in 2014.

- Clemson producing a 100-yard receiver in three straight games for the first time since a four-game streak in 2015 (Mike Williams vs. NC State, Jordan Leggett vs. Florida State, Williams and Deon Cain vs. Syracuse, Williams and Artavis Scott vs. Pitt).

- Christian Wilkins making his 34th career start. The Clemson record for career starts by a defensive tackle is 40, set by Jim Stuckey from 1976-79. (Note: Wilkins has also started at defensive end in his career but is currently listed at tackle).

CLEMSON IN ACC OPENERS

The 2018 season marks Clemson's 66th year of membership in the ACC, dating back to the conference's first year of play in 1953. In its previous 65 seasons of ACC membership, Clemson has posted a 39-25-1 record in conference openers.

Clemson has won its last three ACC openers, including road victories at Louisville in 2015 and 2017 and a road win at Georgia Tech in 2016. The 2018 season will mark the seventh consecutive year that Clemson has had to travel to open ACC play.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is 5-4 in ACC openers at Clemson, with all four losses coming to Top 20 opponents, including No. 15 Georgia Tech in 2009, No. 16 Miami (Fla.) in 2010, No. 4 Florida State in 2012 and No. 1 Florida State in 2014. Three of those four contests were on the road.

The Tigers are seeking a fourth consecutive victory in conference openers, which would be the team's longest streak since 2005. With a win on Saturday, the 2018 senior class would become only the fifth senior class in Clemson history to win all four of its ACC openers,

joining 4-0 records posted by the 1983, 1984, 1989 and 2005 senior classes in ACC debuts.

Georgia Tech joined the ACC prior to the 1983 football season.

Clemson has won three in a row against Georgia Tech. If the Tigers earn a victory on Saturday in Atlanta, it would give Clemson four wins in a row over the Yellow Jackets for the first time since 1993-96. Clemson has won four in a row over the Yellow Jackets just twice, the aforementioned 1993-96 streak and the first four games of the series in 1898-1903.

A victory on Saturday would make Dabo Swinney the first Clemson coach to beat Georgia Tech four consecutive times. In the previous two Clemson four-game winning streaks in the series, Clemson had multiple coaches.

The home team has won eight of the last nine games in the series, with the only road win taking place in 2016 when Clemson won, 26-7, in Atlanta during Clemson's national championship season. That was Clemson's first win in Atlanta over Tech since a 2003 victory in which current Co-Offensive Coordinator Tony Elliott caught a touchdown pass for the Tigers.

Clemson has not won consecutive games at Georgia Tech since 2001 and 2003, when Tommy Bowden's Tigers won 47-44 in overtime in 2001 and 39-3 in 2003.

Twelve of the last 22 games in the series have been decided by five points or less, including a six-game streak between 1996-01 in which every game was decided by exactly three points. Eleven of Georgia Tech's last 14 wins in the series have been decided by a touchdown or less.

The series dates to a 23-0 Clemson win in Augusta, Ga., in 1898, just the 11th game in Clemson football history. Clemson won the first four games of the series, including games in 1902 and 1903 when John Heisman was at the helm. Clemson defeated Georgia Tech, 73-0, in Atlanta in 1903 with Heisman as head coach. Heisman then left Clemson to become Georgia Tech's head coach.

DEFENSE KEY IN CURRENT SERIES STREAK

Defending Georgia Tech's option offense has been the key to victory for the Tigers against the Yellow Jackets the last three years. Clemson has won the games by scores of 43-24 in 2015, 26-7 in 2016 and 24-10 last year. In those game, Georgia Tech has averaged just 13.7 points per game, 121 yards rushing on 41 carries per game, 11 first downs per game and 194 yards of total offense.

In 2015 when not playing Clemson, Georgia Tech averaged 5.6 yards per rush and 273 rushing yards per game. They averaged 1.7 yards per rush and had 71 yards against Clemson. In 2016, Georgia Tech averaged 5.7 yards per rush and 272 yards a game against other opponents but had 2.3 yards per rush and 95 rushing yards against Clemson.

Unusually, Georgia Tech had exactly 56 plays for 230 yards of total offense in each of its last two games at Clemson.

LAST MEETING VS. GEORGIA TECH

Clemson 24, Georgia Tech 10

(Oct. 28, 2017, Clemson, S.C.)

No. 7 Clemson won its 300th game in Memorial Stadium, defeating Georgia Tech, 24-10, on Oct. 28, 2017.

Clemson was led by Kelly Bryant, who had 67 yards rushing on 12 attempts and threw for 207 yards and two touchdowns on 22 completions. The Clemson defense held Georgia Tech to negative yards passing until the fourth quarter and had 11 tackles for loss by eight different players.

Clemson jumped out to a 7-0 lead two minutes into the game when Van Smith recovered a fumble on Tech's opening possession and Kelly Bryant connected with Deon Cain on a 38-yard scoring pass two plays later.

After a Tech field goal, Milan Richard hauled in a 20-yard scoring pass from Bryant to put the Tigers up 14-3. It was Richard's first career touchdown reception, one scored with his uncle, former Georgia great Herschel Walker, in attendance.

Clemson took a 21-3 lead in the second period when Travis Etienne scored on a two-yard run. Clemson added three points in the second half on a 29-yard field goal by Alex Spence. Georgia Tech scored its only touchdown of the game with 4:43 left on a 22-yard run by TaQuon Marshall.

Clemson finished with 428 yards total offense on 78 plays (221 rushing, 207 passing).

LAST MEETING IN ATLANTA

Clemson 26, Georgia Tech 7

(Sept. 22, 2016, Atlanta, Ga.)

Clemson's defense had its finest performance against a Paul Johnson-coached Georgia Tech team in a 26-7 victory, Clemson's first win in Atlanta since 2003. Clemson gave up only 22 yards of total offense in the first half and just 124 for the game.

Tech ran 52 plays and gained just 124 yards, the fewest yards by a Johnson-coached Georgia Tech team. Tech finished with just 95 yards rushing in 38 attempts and was just 4-14 passing for 29 yards. They converted just 2-of-12 third down opportunities and averaged just 2.4 yards per play. The Clemson defense had seven tackles for loss, including three sacks.

Clemson led 23-0 at halftime as the Tigers ran 56 plays to just 21 for Tech. Deshaun Watson was 32-48 for 304 yards for the Thursday night performance. He threw a scoring pass each to Mike Williams and Jordan Leggett in the opening half.

SERIES HIGHLIGHTS

- Every game between the two teams between 1907-74 was held in Atlanta. Clemson's only wins in those 36 meetings came in 1907, 1936, 1945 and 1969, the last of which was Frank Howard's final season as head coach. Howard won just twice (1945 and 1969) in his career in Atlanta, but Clemson made the trip every year to help balance the athletic department budget. Howard was also athletic director his entire time as head coach (1940-69).

- The two teams have played on a neutral site just three times. Clemson won a 23-0 victory in 1898 in Augusta, Ga., and a 41-5 win in Greenville, S.C. in 1899. Georgia Tech won the ACC title game in Tampa in 2009, 39-34.

- The first time Georgia Tech played at Memorial Stadium in Clemson was 1974, a 21-17 Clemson victory. Clemson won that game on a three-yard touchdown pass from Mike O'Cain (later a head coach at NC State) to All-America tight end Bennie Cunningham with 8:26 left.

- Woodrow Dantzler had one of the best all-around games of his career with 164 yards rushing and 254 yards passing in Clemson's victory in Atlanta in 2001. He threw for two scores and ran for two, including a 38-yard "Hail Mary Run" on the last play of the first half to cut Tech's lead to 19-14 at intermission. His 63-yard scoring pass to J.J. McKelvey with 1:58 left put Clemson ahead by three, but Tech tied the count with a 20-yard field goal with just six seconds left. Dantzler's "walk-off" 11-yard touchdown in overtime gave Clemson the win.

- Clemson has had just five games in its history in which both teams scored in the 40s. The first two took place at Georgia Tech. Tech won 45-42 in 1999 and Clemson won 47-44 in overtime in 2001 in Atlanta.

- One of the most unusual statistical occurrences in Clemson history took place during Clemson's 33-12 victory over Georgia Tech in 1987 at Clemson. Clemson entered the game with a streak of 999 consecutive combined punt returns and kickoff returns without a touchdown dating to 1970. Then, on the 1,000th return, Donnell Woolford raced 78 yards with a punt return for a touchdown. Then, later in the game Joe Henderson returned a kickoff return 95 yards for a touchdown. It is one of just two games in Clemson history that the Tigers have returned a punt return for a touchdown and a kickoff return for a touchdown. The other took place in 2009 when Clemson defeated Middle Tennessee State.

- C.J. Spiller had arguably the best game of his Clemson career against Georgia Tech in the 2009 ACC Championship Game. The unanimous All-American had a career-high 233 yards rushing in 20 attempts and scored four touchdowns. He had 301 all-purpose yards and was named the MVP of the game even though Clemson lost 39-34. It is the only time a player on the losing team has been named the MVP of any conference championship game.

- Austin Bryant (DE): Played one game against Georgia Tech in 2017 in Clemson. Had six tackles, including two tackles for loss, one of which was a sack, in 31 plays as a starter.

- Kelly Bryant (QB): Played just four snaps against Georgia Tech in 2015. Last year, completed 22-33 passes for 207 yards and two touchdowns. Added 67 yards in 12 carries on the ground, giving him 274 yards total offense in 45 plays.

- Adam Choice (RB): Has 12 career rushes for 80 yards against Georgia Tech. Had 4-26 rushing and 1-5 receiving in 14 plays against Georgia Tech in 2016 and added 8-54 rushing and 1-7 receiving in 2017. The 54 rushing yards were a season high.

- Tavien Feaster (RB): Played, but had no carries in 2016. Had 7-35 rushing and 2-12 receiving against Georgia Tech in 2017.

- Clelin Ferrell (DE): Started and played 45 snaps at Georgia Tech in 2016 with four tackles. Had six tackles in 25 plays as a starter against Tech last year.

- Greg Huegel (PK): Scored eight points on a 21-yard field goal and 5-5 extra points in 2015. Had six points on 3-3 extra points and a 26-yard field goal in two attempts in 2016.

- Kendall Joseph (LB): Did not play in 2015 against the Yellow Jackets. Had seven tackles in 56 snaps as a starter in 2016. Had seven tackles in 56 snaps off the bench in 2017.

- Tre Lamar (LB): Had one special teams tackle in 2016. Had nine tackles, including a career-high two sacks in 46 plays as a starter vs. Georgia Tech in 2017.

POSTGAME NOTES VS. GEORGIA SOUTHERN

- Clemson amassed 595 total yards, including 286 passing and 309 rushing. It marked the second time this season that Clemson has reached 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in the same game and the 36th time the program has done so under Head Coach Dabo Swinney. Clemson is undefeated (36-0) in those contests.

- Running back Travis Etienne totalled a career-high 162 yards on 16 carries. The 100-yard rushing game was the second of Etienne's career and his first since Sept. 23, 2017 vs. Boston College (113). His 162 yards are the most by a Clemson running back since Wayne Gallman ran for 187 yards against North Carolina (12/5/15).

- On a 40-yard touchdown run in the fourth quarter, Etienne eclipsed the 1,000 career rushing yards mark.

- With Etienne's performance and the Tiger win, Clemson has now posted a 33-2 record when producing a 100-yard rusher since 2011.

- Clemson rushed for 309 yards and is now 47-1 when rushing for at least 200 yards under Swinney. The 309-yard game is the most rushing yards by a Clemson team since Sept. 23, 2017 when the Tigers rushed for 342 yards.

- With 100-yard performances from both Justyn Ross (receiving) and Travis Etienne (rushing), today's game against Georgia Southern marks the first time a Clemson team has had two players eclipse the 100-yard passing/rushing plateau since Nov. 26, 2016 (Wayne Gallman - 112 yards rushing; Mike Williams - 100 yards receiving)

- On his second completion of the day — a five-yard completion to Tee Higgins — quarterback Kelly Bryant recorded his 300th career pass completion, becoming only the 10th player in school history to complete 300 career passes (Tajh Boyd, Charlie Whitehurst, Deshaun Watson, Cullen Harper, Woodrow Dantzler, Nealon Greene, Kyle Parker, Rodney Williams and Tommy Kendrick).

- With his sixth completion of the day, an 11-yard pass to Trevion Thompson, Bryant passed Tommy Kendrick (303 from 1969-71) for the ninth-most career completions in Clemson history.

- Etienne opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run in the second quarter. Etienne has now scored a rushing touchdown in three straight games for the fourth time in his career and scored a rushing touchdown in 13 of his 16 career games.

- This marks the second consecutive year that a member of the Tigers has opened a season with a

rushing touchdown in each of the first three games of the season. Kelly Bryant accomplished the feat in the first three games of 2017.

- Etienne's second-quarter touchdown was the culmination of a 13-play, 93-yard drive. It was Clemson's third scoring drive of 90 yards or more already this season. Clemson had four scoring drives of 90 or more yards in 14 games in 2017.

- Running back Tavien Feaster scored his first rushing touchdown of the season on a one-yard run in the second quarter. The rushing touchdown was the 10th of his career, giving Clemson three active players with at least 10 career rushing touchdowns (Feaster, Etienne, Bryant).

- Wide receiver Justyn Ross scored the second receiving touchdown of his career on a 57-yard pass from quarterback Trevor Lawrence.

- Including a 64-yard touchdown pass to Tee Higgins last week, Lawrence has now thrown touchdown passes of 50 yards or more in back-to-back games. It is the first time a Clemson quarterback has done so since Kelly Bryant threw touchdown passes of 53 and 61 yards in back-to-back games against The Citadel and South Carolina, respectively in 2017.

- Ross finished the contest with a career-high 103 receiving yards on three receptions.

- With a catch on the game's second play from scrimmage, wide receiver Hunter Renfrow extended his streak of consecutive games played with a reception to 31.

- During his sixth snap of the game, tackle Mitch Hyatt became only the fifth player in Clemson history to play 3,000 career snaps from scrimmage (Dalton Freeman, Landon Walker, Kyle Young and Glenn Rountree).

- Hyatt made his 45th career start, tying OG Jeb Flesch (45 from 1988-91) for the 10th-most career starts at any position in Clemson history.

- Clemson recorded five sacks and has now posted at least three sacks in three straight games for the first time since the Tigers recorded a combined 13 sacks across the Wake Forest (three), Syracuse (six) and Georgia Tech (four) games in 2017.

- Defensive end Austin Bryant recorded his first sack of the season to force a three-and-out in the first quarter. He added another in the fourth quarter to record his second career game with 2.0 or more sacks, joining a 4.0-sack performance against Auburn in 2017.

- Defensive end Xavier Thomas recorded his first career sack in the second quarter.

- Defensive end Clelin Ferrell recorded 2.0 sacks to push his season total to 5.0 and his career total to 20.5. He entered the week ranked third in career sacks among active FBS players.

- Ferrell has now recorded 2.0 sacks in back-to-back games, becoming the first Clemson player to have two or more sacks in consecutive games since Vic Beasley against Florida State and North Carolina in 2014.

- Ferrell became the first Clemson player to record a sack in each of the first three games of a season since Vic Beasley in 2014.

- In the fourth quarter, defensive lineman Nyles Pinckney forced and recovered a fumble, both career firsts.

- Clemson has now forced a takeaway in 11 consecutive contests, the program's longest streak since a 15-game stretch across the 2012-13 seasons.

- Linebacker Tre Lamar matched a career high with 11 total tackles.

- On a 37-yard field goal in the third quarter, kicker Greg Huegel passed Obed Ariri (288) for seventh-most career points in school history.

NOTES

- The Tigers recorded 383 total yards on offense in the first half, the most by a Clemson team since Nov. 5, 2016 when the Tigers hung 396 yards on Syracuse in the first half of that game.

- Clemson led at halftime, 21-0. Dating back to last season, Clemson has shut out its opponents in the first half of six of its last eight games (21-0 vs. Georgia Southern, 27-0 vs. Furman, 21-0 vs. Miami, 20-0 vs. South Carolina, 38-0 vs. The Citadel, 17-0 vs. Florida State).

- Clemson has now won 55 of its last 57 games when leading at halftime.

- Clemson has not allowed a first-half touchdown at Memorial Stadium since Nov. 12, 2016 against Pittsburgh, a streak of 10 consecutive home games without allowing a touchdown in the first two quarters.

- Clemson held Georgia Southern without a touchdown in the first half and has held opponents without a first-half touchdown seven times in the last eight games.

- The game was the first all-time meeting between Clemson and Georgia Southern. It marked the second straight season in which Clemson had faced an opponent for the first time in history, as the Tigers earned a 56-3 win in their first ever meeting with Kent State in 2017.

- The Tigers committed their first turnover of the season on an interception on the eighth play of the game. Clemson opened the season with 136 plays without a turnover.

- Clemson's captains for the contest were linebacker J.D. Davis, linebacker Judah Davis, wide receiver Hunter Renfrow and tight end Cannon Smith.

- Clemson has now won 46 of its last 50 games, dating to 2014.

- Clemson has now opened 3-0 for four straight years and for the seventh time in the last eight years.

- Clemson extended its winning streak in non-conference regular season play to 18 games. Dating back to 2014, Clemson's current 17-game winning streak in regular season non-conference games entering the game was already the longest such streak in

program history.

- Clemson won its 10th consecutive game at Memorial Stadium, dating back to a 56-7 win against South Carolina on Nov. 25, 2016. The team's current home winning streak is Clemson's third double-digit home winning streak in Dabo Swinney's tenure as head coach (21 from 2013-16, 13 from 2011-12). Clemson has won 31 of its last 32 at home.

- Clemson extended its winning streak in Saturday games to 19, the longest of any Power Five school in the country. It is the second-longest Saturday winning streak in school history, trailing a 21-game Saturday streak across the 2014-16 campaigns.

- Clemson won its 16th consecutive game in the month of September, dating back to 2014.

- Dabo Swinney pushed his all-time record in non-conference play as a head coach to 39-13, including a 32-8 record against non-conference opponents in regular season play.

- Swinney improved to 9-6 as a head coach all-time in games against schools from the state of Georgia. He entered the game with a 6-5 mark against Georgia Tech, a 1-1 record against Georgia and a 1-0 mark against Georgia State.

- Clemson led 24-0 after three quarters and is now 76-2 since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

- Clemson recorded a 27-7 advantage in total first downs, and is now 76-2 record when recording more first downs than its opponent since 2011.

- Clemson has now won 58 straight games when holding teams under 23 points (dating back to 2010).

CHASING 100

Head Coach Dabo Swinney can vividly recall the looks he received when he said Clemson was on the cusp of the winningest decade in program history following a 2010 campaign in which the Tigers finished 6-7. In 2017, that vision became a reality with two seasons to spare when Clemson collected its 88th win of the decade in the ACC Championship Game against Miami to surpass the 1980s Tigers (87) for the most wins in any decade in school history.

With 12 wins in 2018, the Clemson can reach triple digits in wins in a decade for the first time in program history.

POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson Athletic Director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and I was like, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" Swinney recounted prior to the 2018 season. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five opponents than Clemson.

SWINNEY FOURTH COACH TO REACH 100 WINS IN FIRST 10 YEARS

When Dabo Swinney and the Tigers defeated South Carolina, 34-10, in the final regular season game of 2017, it gave Swinney 100 wins in his first 10 years as a head coach. Swinney accomplished the feat despite his first season as a head coach being limited to seven games after assuming the Interim Head Coach title six games into the 2008 campaign.

He became just the fourth coach to reach 100 wins in his first 10 years, joining Bob Stoops, Chris Petersen and Urban Meyer.

SWINNEY CLOSING IN ON TWO LEGENDS

Head Coach Dabo Swinney is closing in on coaching accomplishments of two college football legends. Swinney enters Saturday's game against Georgia Tech with an overall record of 104-30 for a .776 winning percentage.

With one more win, Swinney can match the number of total victories earned by Notre Dame's Knute Rockne, the winningest coach by percentage in Division I history. Rockne compiled a 105-12-5 career record from 1918-30 at Notre Dame for a record .881 winning percentage.

Swinney's current .776 winning percentage is 22nd best in Division I history among coaches with a minimum of 10 years experience. Just ahead of him in 21st place is Bear Bryant, who had a .780 winning percentage (323-85-17). If Clemson were to open the season 6-0, Swinney would improve his career record to 107-30 and push his winning percentage to .781.

-- TALKING 'BOUT THE POLLS --

EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

Entering 2018, Clemson had equaled or exceeded its postseason AP and USA Today rankings in comparison to its preseason rankings each of the last seven years. That included quite an accomplishment in 2016, as finished No. 1 by winning the national championship to exceed the school's No. 2 preseason ranking.

Clemson has exceeded its preseason ranking each of the last seven years in the USA Today coaches poll and has exceeded its preseason ranking in the AP poll six of the seven. Clemson was picked No. 8 in the AP preseason poll in 2013 and finished No. 8. Dabo Swinney is the first head coach in history with a seven-year streak in that area. John Cooper (Ohio State) and Bill Snyder (Kansas State) had five-year streaks.

WHEN IN DOUBT, CLEMSON RESPONDS

Clemson dropped from No. 2 to No. 3 in the AP Poll this week despite a 31-point win last Saturday. However, in Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, the Tigers have routinely responded well following dips in the AP rankings.

Under Swinney, Clemson is 19-4 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017 and 2018 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign. Clemson has won its last 11 games when entering ranked lower in the AP Poll than in its previous game.

You have to travel back to Nov. 12, 2016, a total of 679 days prior to this week's contest against Georgia Tech, for Clemson's most recent loss on a Saturday.

It provides a legacy and a foundation upon which Clemson's talented 2018 receiving corps — one co-offensive coordinator Jeff Scott said contains nine plausible starters — to build.

"Get your cameras ready for this year and beyond. Because there's a good chance more history will be made," wrote TigerIllustrated's Larry Williams. "The headlines and cover stories now are about the defensive line. But celebrity status is fast approaching for these receivers."

While the return of the members of Clemson's ballyhooed defensive line generated a majority of the team's offseason headlines, Clemson's offensive line returned its own first-team All-American in left tackle Mitch Hyatt. In July, Hyatt was the leading vote-getter in the preseason All-ACC selection process, appearing on a conference-high 130 of 148 possible ballots, 28 more votes than ACC Preseason Player of the Year AJ Dillon.

Hyatt, a three-year letterman out of Suwanee, Ga., entered the 2018 campaign with 43 games, 42 starts and 2,885 snaps to his credit, helping Clemson to an ACC title and College Football Playoff berth in each of his first three seasons.

#3 AMARI RODGERS

Clemson entered the 2018 season looking to replace primary 2017 punt returner Ray-Ray McCloud, who ranked seventh in the FBS in punt return average (12.1) a season ago. In camp, wide receiver Amari Rodgers separated as the team's top option at punt returner, and Rodgers immediately rewarded the coaching staff's faith in the team's 48-7 season-opening win vs. Furman.

Rodgers' first return of the game went for 25 yards, setting up an ensuing drive that saw him score the team's first points of the season on a 40-yard touchdown reception. On his next return, Rodgers recorded a career-long 62-yard return to finish the day with a 43.5-yard return average.

Through three games, Rodgers ranks No. 4 in the ACC in punt return average.
