2019-20 MEN'S TENNIS NOTES

Georgia Tech's men's tennis team had an up-and-down 2018-19 season, finishing .500 overall and in conference play, but the year was highlighted by some big wins over ranked ACC opponents. They failed to make the NCAA Tournament, but Carlos Divar received an at-large bid to the 2019 NCAA Division I Men's Tennis Championships.

Team Update

Georgia Tech came into the Fall with the No. 6-ranked recruiting class in the nation, and this young core has already made their mark early on. The team compiled a 43-30 singles record, including three individual draw titles. In doubles, the Jackets saw two different pairings crowned during the fall slate.

Singles Update

Starting off the season in Athens, Ga. for the Southern Intercollegiate, freshman Marcus McDaniel and sophomore Pablo Schelcher each won their individual singles draws. McDaniel finished the fall 11-3 in singles, winning seven of his last 10 matches of the season.

Freshman Andres Martin made waves at the All-American Championships, sweeping his way through the qualifying draw to earn a spot in the main draw. Martin won his first-round match over No. 96 Kody Pearson (Tulsa) It was the third ranked opponent Martin beat in Tulsa, after besting No. 58 Bradley Frye (USC), and No. 76 Melios Efsthathiou (Wake Forest) in the qualifying draw. He was eventually ousted by No. 6 Aleksandar Kovacevic (Illinois) in three sets.

Back on The Flats, freshman Keshav Chopra was victorious at the Georgia Tech Invitational, taking home the Olde Gold singles draw title.

Doubles Update

In doubles, the duo of senior Chris Yun and junior Brandon Freestone nabbed the Navy draw doubles crown at the Georgia Tech Invitational. Yun and Freestone also advanced to the main draw semifinal at the ITA Southeast Regional, finishing the fall season 5-1.

While the freshman pairing of Keshav Chopra and Marcus McDaniel continued their strong fall, winning the doubles title at the USTA National Junior Indoor Championships in Kansas City, Kan. The pair, playing together in doubles for the first time this season, swept through the tournament before defeating Michael Andre and Blake Kasday in the final, 8-5.

Jackets Add 6th Ranked Recruiting Class

The Georgia Tech men's tennis 2019 recruiting class was ranked the sixth-best in the country, according to tennisrecruiting.net.

The Jackets' ranking is their highest in program history, beating out the No. 11 ranking the team recruited in 2013.

Georgia Tech will welcome a talented group featuring top-level prospects Andres Martin, Brandon McKinney, Marcus McDaniel, and Keshav Chopra.

Martin comes to The Flats from Flowery Branch, Ga. The righty is currently ranked sixth in the USTA boy's U18 national rankings. A blue chip recruit, he has recorded wins over 12 blue chip recruits and 13 five-start recruits. Martin took home the coveted Gold Ball for winning the Winter Nationals U18 doubles title.

Coach Kenny Thorne on Andres Martin- *"When we started recruiting Andres he was one of the best recruits in Georgia and now he is one of the best in the nation. More importantly, he is one of the best young men that you will come across. His parents and coaches did a great job developing him on and off the court."*

Brandon McKinney currently ranks as the No. 2 player in Georgia and has a combined 17 wins over 4-star, 5-star, and blue-chip players, and he has ranked as high as the

seventh best player in his class. A native of Marietta, Ga., he finished in the top 16 in the Boy's 18 National Clay Courts in Delray Beach and most recently defeated the likes the No. 26 ranked player, Theo Winegar, according to tennisrecruiting.net, 6-3, 7-6 (3) before falling in the Quarterfinals in the USTA L2 Tournament.

Coach Kenny Thorne on Brandon McKinney - *"We are very confident that Brandon is going to make big contributions to our success on the court over his time at Georgia Tech, and his academics are excellent. He is a great fit for Georgia Tech and we are excited about Brandon's future. Brandon has been one of the best players for quite a few years in Georgia and in the nation, and we love that we are able to sign another top Georgia player."*

McDaniel comes to The Flats from Vacaville, Calif. He is a highly rated blue-chip player who has boasted an impressive 41-11 mark. He also ranks fourth nationally in his class, according to tennisrecruiting.net, posting an impressive 11 wins over fellow blue-chip players, and is the number one player in California.

Coach Kenny Thorne on Marcus McDaniel- *"Marcus is an outstanding young man, a very accomplished tennis player, and an excellent student. That is the combination we are looking for in every recruit. We look forward to continuing that developmental process. We have very high goals to compete for an ACC and National Championship and Marcus is the character of person and level of tennis player we need to bring in to compete at that level."*

Keshav Chopra is a Marietta, Ga. native who is has been the No. 1 ranked player in the nation in the USTA Boys 16s standings. Before deciding to graduate a full year early, Chopra was ranked in the top 5 nationally and No. 1 in Georgia in the class of 2020 according to tennisrecruiting.net. After reclassifying to the class of 2019, he currently is ranked 13th nationally in tennisrecruiting.net's senior class.

Coach Kenny Thorne on Keshav Chopra- *"Keshav has been the best player in the state for many years and one of the best in the nation for the past couple of years. He improved tremendously at IMG under Jose Lambert. Juan Herrera and the staff there did a great job. Keshav is a fighter on the court and doesn't give away too many free points. He also excels academically. We are very excited to welcome Keshav to Georgia Tech and have another very accomplished local player join us."*

Tech's NCAA History

Georgia Tech reached the NCAA Championship three straight years from 2015-2017, falling in the opening round of the 2015 regional in Oxford, Miss., and falling in the second round in both 2016 and 2017.

Those were Tech's first bids since 2011, when the Yellow Jackets hosted a regional and advanced to the round of 16 by defeating Middle Tennessee State and Mississippi State. Tech then lost to No. 2 seed Southern California in Stanford, Calif. That is the only time Tech has made it out of a regional in the current format of the championship. Tech has made the NCAA Championship field 12 times under head coach Kenny Thorne and 17 times in program history. The Jackets' deepest run in the NCAAs came in 1994, when Tech won three matches before being eliminated. Tech is 11-15 all-time in NCAA Championship competition.

Tech's ACC Championship History

Georgia Tech has never won an Atlantic Coast Conference championship in men's tennis, though several Yellow Jackets have individual titles to their credit from an era when individual championships were crowned.

Tech has reached the finals four times, two of those under head coach Kenny Thorne in 1999 and 2002. The Jackets also reached the championship match in Thorne's

senior year of 1988 and again in 1994. The Jackets made it to the ACC Tournament quarterfinals for the fourth-straight season in 2018, and reached the semifinals and earned the fourth seed in 2017.

Alumni Update

In August, former Yellow Jacket standout Chris Eubanks played in his first grand slam, earning a wild-card invite to the US Open. Eubanks received one of just eight wild-card spots in the tournament. He also advanced to the second round qualifying at Wimbledon this summer, and reached the quarterfinal at the Winnetka tournament in July. He defeated No. 68 Steve Johnson in the round of 32 of the Hall of Fame Open, and advanced to the round of 16 in two other tournaments in September.

Former Yellow Jacket Kevin King advanced to the finals at the M25 Martos in Martos, Spain, falling to Eduardo Struyav 3-6, 2-6, and reached the quarterfinal of the M25 Palma Del Rio. He competed at the BB&T Atlanta Open this summer, reaching the round of 16 before falling to No. 32 Taylor Fritz 2-6, 3-6. In August he reached the quarterfinal in two tournaments, the M25 Edwardsville and M25 Memphis.

KEN BYERS TENNIS COMPLEX

A lot of history was made in the Bill Moore Tennis Center. Some of the greatest players in Georgia Tech history took to those courts and improved their games to the point they could reach the pro tour.

Current Georgia Tech men's tennis head coach Kenny Thorne is one of those. He played and coached there in his four decorated years on the Flats (1985-89).

In January of 2013, Thorne witnessed the opening of the Ken Byers Tennis Complex, as the women's tennis team opened the facility with a match against Syracuse and men's team opened a day later against Old Dominion. In a way, it was *deja vu* for Thorne, who was a freshman the year the Moore Center opened.

"It's just a very unique thing. It's an honor to be coaching here at this time, and it's an honor for all of our student-athletes to have opened a new facility," said the 1989 graduate and 1995 Georgia Tech Sports Hall of Fame inductee. "That doesn't happen too often in any sport. It's very exciting."

Women's head coach Rodney Harmon, whose team played the first matches on the brand new six-court facility, who was beginning his first season on the Flats, has been around the sport long enough to know something special when he sees it. He's seen it with the Byers Complex.

Ground was broken for the facility on June 15, 2012 and was made possible by a generous gift from alumnus Ken Byers (class of '66) and his wife, Trish.

"It's going to help both our men's and women's programs stay a factor with the other schools, in our very, very tough conference," said Harmon, who has been in tennis player development for more than 25 years and, as a pro, reached the quarterfinals at the 1982 U.S. Open. "It has a great feeling, which I think will help us set up a home-court advantage because a lot of our fans tend to be very vocal and really support our team."

As advantageous to the team is the amount of space. Off the court, Byers has bigger locker rooms, a lounge, a training facility and more office space for the coaching staffs. The number of available courts for play inside doubled from three to six.

"It allows us to compete year-round, and when the weather gets inclement, both teams have a place to play," Harmon said. "We've always had to play outside, and it can get pretty cold sometimes. Now we're going to be able to play indoors and really get prepared for the indoor season, which starts in February."

The doubling of the court space was a key factor in building the new complex.

"You need space and you need quality space and if that means new or renovations then so be it," said former associate athletic director Paul Griffin. "Now, we have an efficient way of running our indoor matches, and because of the weather you wind up playing almost half of your matches indoors be it for wet or for cold."

Thorne and Harmon agree that the opening of the Byers Complex signaled the start of big things ahead. Thorne compared the anticipation of the facility's opening to the buzz surrounding the opening of McCamish Pavilion and expects Tech tennis fans to be as energized as basketball fans.

"It's such a big change and ours is a total change," said Thorne. "It's a whole brand-new complex. There are some really exciting things happening. So hopefully it's going to draw a lot more people out. They come see the facility as well as some great tennis."

Harmon expects the facility to also draw some big-name recruits.

"It's going to give us an opportunity to recruit top-level athletes because now a lot of the top schools have new facilities around the country, whether it's Alabama or Florida State or South Carolina, Texas is getting a new facility built," he said. "So now we have a new facility. It's something that to our recruits that makes us a lot stronger."

Both programs are seeing the benefits when it comes to recruiting top talent to Georgia Tech. The women's recruiting class was ranked sixth-best in the nation in 2018, as was the men's 2019 recruiting class, according to tennisrecruiting.net.

The Byers Complex, built on the same footprint where the



Moore Center stood, is light years ahead of its predecessor and was overdue as far as keeping Tech's programs current. The ingenuity in building a facility that could fit so much more into the same space as its predecessor made this project design uniquely Tech.

The former three-court indoor tennis facility was replaced with a state-of-the-art six-court indoor facility. The new steel indoor facility is located next to Tenth Street, just behind the magnolias. It features an entrance lobby, men's and women's coaches offices, men's and women's locker rooms and a team lounge. The indoor facility retains the Bill Moore name and provides seating a little more than 200 spectators.

Since the space opened, Georgia Tech has played host to a number of invitationals, as well as the 2018 ITA Southeast Regionals.

The outdoor part of the complex consists of six competition courts on the south end of the site and four practice courts located between the indoor facility and the competition courts. A landscaped courtyard area was added between the practice courts and Fowler Street. Outdoor seating, situated between the Griffin Track and the competition courts, provides a view of both competition on the track and action on the tennis courts and includes plenty of space for wheelchair seating. Additionally, an East-West Connector provides a lighted walkway for pedestrians along the track-side of the site to facilitate movement between the North Campus Parking Deck and the McCamish Pavilion.

"Thirty years is a long time," said Griffin. "It's not a matter of different inclusions. It's a matter of improved space. It's a tight footprint. The real estate didn't change, so we had to make some compromises on that and one of the other things was to relocate the indoor facility to the 10th street side of the real estate because it will serve as a buffer from the noise and street from 10th street for the outdoor courts that wasn't there before. So there are a lot of those kinds of features that are now a benefit for the program."

"It has a bunch of other features that are assets to the Institute and to athletics in other ways than just tennis," he added. "There's a seating area for track, a pathway from the parking lot to McCamish Pavilion (Tech's basketball arena across Fowler Street), a parking lot on Atlantic to McCamish, improved sidewalks and streetscapes. So it's a very comprehensive project."

For the school, it's the latest improvement to the campus' Fowler Street entrance, which also includes Mewborn Softball

Field and the Brock Indoor Football Facility.

That exciting plan will continue to evolve in years to come. The tennis teams are thrilled to be part of it and are eager to do their part to stir up excitement around campus as they begin spring play.

"It is a tremendous commitment," said Harmon. "That whole side of campus, with the new basketball arena, with the tennis facility, with the track and the indoor football complex and baseball and softball, it's now a great corner of campus."

Kenny Thorne recorded one of the most successful tennis careers by a player from the state of Georgia, winning seven pro titles and defeating four of the world's top-10 players in the 1990's. Some of Thorne's notable victories include wins over Richard Krajicek, Wayne Ferreira, Mark Philippoussis and Todd Martin. As a pro, he achieved his highest singles ranking of No. 121 and a doubles ranking of No. 67. Thorne brings his love of tennis and impressive professional playing experience to his alma mater, Georgia Tech.

Charged with building the Georgia Tech tennis program back to the level it was when he was a player, Thorne was named to the newly-created position of Director of Tennis on June 30, 1998, becoming the ninth head coach in Tech men's tennis history.

Thorne took over the reins of the Tech program after spending one season as the team's assistant coach and wasted little time in taking steps toward his ultimate goal of turning the Yellow Jackets into contenders.

The Yellow Jackets have reached the NCAA Championship 13 times in his 19 years at the helm, and seven of those have advanced past the opening round. Tech made it back for the third straight year in 2017 with its best record since 2011 (18-8, 8-4 ACC). After a two-year absence, the 2010 and 2011 teams reached the second and third rounds of the tournament, respectively, finished fourth in the Atlantic Coast Conference each time (15-7 record), while posting a combined 39-14 dual match record.

During the 2016 season, Thorne surpassed the legendary Tech coach Earle Bortell (228-108-2) for most career coaching victories in the Yellow Jackets' program history. Thorne now has 235 victories over 18 seasons against 195 losses. In 2017 he was named the ACC Coach of the Year after coaching Tech to the fourth seed in the ACC Championships and bringing the team to a season-high ranking of No. 12.

Thorne has developed two of the best singles players in Tech history, Guillermo Gomez (2008-11) and Christopher Eubanks (2014-17), both of whom earned ACC Player of the Year honors. Eubanks advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2017 NCAA Singles Championship and took back-to-back ACC Player of the Year honors. He has also developed two of the best doubles players in Tech history, Juan Spir, who advanced to the NCAA Doubles Championship semifinals in 2012 and quarterfinals in 2013 with different partners. Spir and Kevin King, Spir's doubles partner for 75 of his Tech-record 103 victories, played in the NCAA Singles Championship as well.

Under Thorne's guidance, Tech had at least one ITA All-American every year from 2009-13, and has had at least one All-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree each year since 2008.

Tech's 2011 team finished the year ranked 13th in the nation and reached the round of 16 at the NCAA Championship, both high-water marks for Tech tennis under Thorne. Tech's 21 wins in 2011 were the most for the Jackets under Thorne and the second most in the history of the program.

As a result, the Tech alum was named the ITA National Coach of the Year, becoming only the fourth Georgia Tech head coach ever to receive such an honor.

Thorne built those Tech squads around four-time All-ACC honoree Gomez, who was named the ACC Player of the Year in 2011 and earned ITA All-American honors three times, and broke Thorne's record for career singles victories. He also recruited another pair of ITA All-Americans in King and Spir, who formed one of the top 10 doubles teams nationally and developed into top-of-the-lineup players in singles, both earning NCAA bids in 2012.

Tech's teams in 2015, 2016 and 2017 were built around Eubanks, a five-star junior player from Atlanta who has helped the Jackets earn NCAA Championship appearances each year and a 49-29 overall record, while Eubanks himself rose to No. 4 in the ITA singles rankings.

Fifteen of Thorne's Tech teams have finished the spring ranked among the top 50 in the ITA team rankings, and eight of them have finished in the top half of the perennially powerful Atlantic Coast Conference.

He has coached 12 different players to All-ACC honors 25 times, and three of his players have been named ACC Player of the Year. Nine different players have earned ITA All-America honors.

Also under Thorne's watch, 10 players have earned 17 total bids to the NCAA Singles Championship and five pairs have made the NCAA Doubles Championship field.

Other highlights include:

- During the 2003 campaign, Georgia Tech earned a spot in the NCAA Tournament and climbed into the 14th spot in the national rankings midway through the year. The Jackets also boasted their first All-America honorees since 1988, as the doubles team of Roger Anderson and Scott Schnugg earned the honor after finishing the year as the country's 10th-ranked tandem. The duo also earned All-ACC honors after winning the league's Flight One Doubles title. Tech finished with a 12-10 record and notched seven wins over ranked opponents, including a 4-2 victory over ninth-ranked Texas on

- In 2002, Tech defeated eight ranked teams and reached the finals of the ACC Championship, en route to a 15-11 dual-match record, while also reaching the NCAA Tournament for the third time in four years under Thorne. In the ACC Tournament, the Jackets upset top-seeded and 14th-ranked Duke in the semifinals by a 4-0 score and ended the Blue Devils four-year reign as ACC Champions. On an individual level, Roger Anderson earned All-ACC honors for the second time and earned his first berth in the NCAA Individual Championship, becoming the first Tech player to do so since 1999.

- During the 2000-01 season, Thorne made great strides toward achieving his goal. When the Yellow Jackets climbed to No. 20 in the national rankings on April 11, they claimed their highest ranking since 1988, when Thorne was an All-American and team captain.

- Thorne led the 2001 Yellow Jackets to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Roger Anderson earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors and three Tech players earned ACC Flight championships in singles or doubles.

- Under Thorne's guidance in 2000, Anderson became the first Tech player to earn ACC Rookie of the Year honors after leading the Yellow Jackets with a 24-8 singles record, including a 15-5 mark in dual matches.

- In his first year as head coach in 1999, Thorne earned ACC Coach of the Year honors after guiding the Yellow Jackets to a second-place tie in the regular-season conference standings, a runner-up finish at the ACC Tournament, an NCAA Regional berth and a final national ranking of 32 by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA). Senior Benjamin Cassaigne was named the ACC Player of the Year, earned all-conference honors and captured the ACC Flight Championship at No. 1 singles.

- With Tech's 1999 NCAA Regional berth, Thorne became the first person in ACC history and just the second nationally, joining LSU's Jeff Brown, to lead the same school to post-season competition as a player, assistant coach and head coach since the current NCAA team dual-match format was instituted in 1977. (Prior to 1977, team finishes were determined by an accumulation of points based on individual play.) Thorne helped Tech to NCAA play as a senior in 1988, as an assistant coach in 1998 and as head coach in 1999.

Thorne earned an Industrial Engineering degree from Tech in 1989 and during his four seasons as a player from 1985-88, the Jackets posted a 70-38 dual-match record and a 20-7 ACC mark, including wins over nationally-ranked foes such as Georgia and Clemson in 1988, his final season. Tech climbed as high as 10th in the ITA national rankings during Thorne's senior season before the Jackets ended the year ranked 12th nationally.

He qualified for the NCAA singles tournament in 1986 and 1988 and advanced to the second round on both occasions. Thorne also competed in the 1988 NCAA doubles tourney with partner Bryan Shelton. After turning professional in 1989, Thorne spent eight years on the tour, achieving his highest singles ranking of 121 and doubles ranking of 67 in the world. He was also a six-time participant at Wimbledon, the U.S. Open, French Open and Australian Open.

Thorne's best career wins were over 1996 Wimbledon champion Richard Krajicek, ATP No. 11 Wayne Ferreira, Australia's Mark Philippoussis and Todd Martin of the United States. He posted two career ATP doubles titles, one career Challenger singles title and four career Challenger doubles titles.

An All-American in 1988, Thorne finished his Georgia Tech playing career as a four-time All-ACC honoree and the career leader in singles victories with 112. He was also a two-time captain and an Academic All-ACC honoree. Thorne was inducted into the Georgia Tech Athletic Hall of Fame in 1995.

Thorne married former Yellow Jacket cross country standout and Tech Hall of Fame inductee, Bridget Koster, in 1990. The couple has two daughters, Rachel and Kenedy, and two sons, Zachary and Daniel. Rachel was a distance runner on the Tech track team.

Jeremy Efferding, a former ITA All-American at Texas A&M and ATP professional player, was announced as the assistant coach on the Georgia Tech men's tennis staff on Aug. 9, 2017.

"Derek Schwandt did an incredible job at Georgia Tech and we are happy for him that he got rewarded with a good head coaching job after last season," Thorne said. "I have been looking for the best coach I could find on and off the court to train and mentor our student-athletes. Jeremy is one of the best up-and-coming coaches out there and he is a first class person. He understands what it takes to succeed on the court and in the classroom."

Thorne continued, "He is a great analytical thinker and understands the game very well. I've enjoyed spending time with him talking about developing players for the highest level of the game. Jeremy also plays very well so I wish he still had some eligibility left. He played at the highest level in college and went on the pro tour before sustaining an injury. He and his wife, Mayers, are two incredible people who I am happy to welcome to our Georgia Tech team."

Since wrapping up his All-American playing career at Texas A&M in 2015, Efferding has played professional tennis on the ATP Tour as well as worked as the student assistant coach on the Texas A&M women's tennis staff and, most recently, as a fellow in the United States Tennis Association (USTA) Player Development program.

While in the USTA Player Development program, Efferding was able to work alongside the top national coaches and junior players in the country, receiving training in coaching, mental and physical strength and conditioning, and film review when traveling and coaching at professional events. During his time, he worked under 2005 Wimbledon doubles champion Stephen Huss and USTA national coach and former SEC Head Coach of the Year Sylvain Guichard. Currently working at the USTA Boys 18 National Championships in Kalamazoo, Mich., Efferding is working with the top American players in their junior career.

With Efferding on staff at Texas A&M, the women's tennis team finished No. 16 in the nation, downing six nationally ranked programs — including then-No. 5 Auburn, No. 10 Duke and No. 11 Kentucky — en route to an 18-13 overall record. The Aggies advanced to the NCAA Championship round of 16, where they fell to then-No. 1 seed and eventual national champion Florida.

Beginning his professional career in the summer of 2015, Efferding competed on the circuit overseas in Greece and Portugal as well as in events in the United States. The 24-year-old has amassed 18 career singles victories and four doubles wins.

Efferding was an all-American (2015), three-time all-SEC selection (2013, '14, and '15) and two-time all-SEC Tournament selection (2013, '15) as a 6-foot-2, right-handed singles and doubles player at Texas A&M from 2011-15. A multi-year starter, Efferding cemented his place in the lineup as a sophomore when he defeated the then-No. 1 ranked and eventual 2013 national champion, Alex Domijan of Virginia. He would go on to lead the Aggies to an SEC Tournament Championship in 2015, earning Tournament MVP honors to finish his collegiate career. One of the all-time A&M greats, he currently ranks 20th all-time in the Aggie record books with 58 dual singles victories and 16th in doubles dual wins (59).

"I would like to thank Georgia Tech and Kenny Thorne for this awesome opportunity to come



on board and help represent the Yellow Jackets," Efferding said. "I am thrilled to work under such a knowledgeable coach who has done an amazing job creating a culture of high work ethic and integrity. I aspire to learn from Kenny and help facilitate, for our players, the amazing life-experiences that college tennis has to offer."

Efferding continued, "I want to thank the love of my life, Mayers, for her unconditional love and support. Thanks also, to my family for their continued encouragement and to my mentor coaches at Texas A&M and USTA that have taught me so much. Lastly, I would like to thank Mark Weaver at Texas A&M and all the players there that sparked my path to and passion for collegiate coaching."

A Boca Raton, Fla. native, Efferding graduated from Texas A&M in May 2017 with a bachelor's degree in university studies, health and kinesiology, making the SEC honor roll from 2013-15. He joins the Yellow Jacket family with his wife, Mayers Efferding.

After serving for almost seven years as president of George Mason University (GMU) in Fairfax, Virginia, Dr. Ángel Cabrera was named June 13, 2019, by the University System of Georgia Board of Regents as Georgia Tech's 12th president. He succeeds Dr. G.P. "Bud" Peterson, who has served since April 1, 2009. Peterson will continue in his role as Georgia Tech's president until Cabrera arrives in September. When Peterson announced his pending retirement in January 2019, he shared his plans to continue his research and return to teaching at Georgia Tech.

Under President Peterson's leadership, Georgia Tech exceeded the \$1.5 billion goal for Campaign Georgia Tech by 20%, grew innovative collaborations and strategic partnerships, expanded the campus infrastructure, and elevated its national and global visibility. In the past decade, total research expenditures and other sponsored activities increased by 78% to \$908 million. Enrollment increased by 69%. The number of women in the first-year class increased from 32 to 40%. Georgia Tech's first-to-second-year retention is 97%, a historic high.

Cabrera is a Georgia Tech alumnus, the second in the Institute's 134-year history to serve as president. Peterson's predecessor, Dr. G. Wayne Clough (1994 – 2008), earned bachelor's and master's degrees in civil engineering from Georgia Tech.

Cabrera holds an M.S. and Ph.D. in cognitive psychology from Georgia Tech, which he attended as a Fulbright Scholar. He also holds a telecommunications engineering degree from Universidad Politécnica de Madrid (B.S. and M.S. in computer and electrical engineering). For the past decade, he has served as a member of the Georgia Tech Advisory Board, including a stint as its chair. Cabrera met his wife, Beth, while both were graduate students at Georgia Tech. Dr. Beth Fraser Cabrera was a management professor at Carlos III University in Madrid and Arizona State University, and currently delivers leadership development programs for business executives. Their son Alex, who recently received his undergraduate degree from the Institute, is continuing his studies this fall at Carnegie Mellon University. Daughter Emilia is a rising junior at Harvard University.

George Mason is the largest, fastest growing, and most diverse public university in Virginia. Listed among the top 300 research universities in the world by the Academic Ranking of World Universities, GMU reached the top tier among research universities in the Carnegie Classification and accounted for more than half of all public university enrollment growth in Virginia under Cabrera's leadership. In 2018, it was named by Forbes as one of America's best midsize employers.

Before becoming GMU's president, Cabrera served as dean of IE Business School in Madrid and president of Thunderbird School of Global Management (now part of Arizona State University). As a business educator, Cabrera played a key role in advancing professional ethics, internationalization, and corporate social responsibility. As a senior advisor to the United Nations Global Compact, in 2007 he was the lead author of the "Principles for Responsible Management Education," now adopted by more than 700 schools around the world.

Cabrera's research has been published in leading academic journals. He has been quoted by leading global media, including The Economist, BBC, CNN, CNBC, El País, Forbes, the International Herald Tribune, and The New York Times. His op-eds have been published by The Washington Post and the international press, and he has appeared on NPR programs and PBS NewsHour. He's been named a "Young Global Leader" by the World Economic Forum, a "Star of Europe" by Businessweek, "Henry Crown Fellow" by the Aspen Institute, and "Great Immigrant" by the Carnegie Corporation of New York. He has received honorary degrees from Miami Dade College and Universidad Politécnica de Madrid. He is the first native of Spain to serve as president of an American university.

Charles Isbell, executive associate dean and professor in the College of Computing, was named faculty athletics representative (FAR) to the Georgia Tech Athletic Association on June 6, 2017. His three-year term as FAR began July 1, 2017. The FAR serves as the liaison between the Institute and the Athletic Association on issues regarding rules compliance, developments at the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), and activities related to Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) membership.

His first institutional service role at Tech was with the Institute Undergraduate Curriculum Committee, where he worked with student-athletes returning to finish their degrees. "Since the very beginning of being here as a faculty member, I've been interested in the way student-athletes interact with the rest of the institution," he said.

For Isbell, understanding the experience of student-athletes is paramount to success in higher education. Athletic achievements can elevate a university's profile to prospective students, and student-athletes' relationship to the university is one that can be used as a model for the broader campus community.

"Anyone interested in higher education and how it has to grow and change has to understand how Division I athletics works at a university," he said. "As higher education changes, we have to think of ourselves more as a community and consider what lets people build connections and keep coming back. It's going to have to happen with all students, faculty, and staff, and athletics can be an example of how to do that well."

While Isbell is a fan and frequent attendee of Georgia Tech athletic events, his support for student-athletes extends beyond the stands.

"I want the student-athletes to know I am here for them, and I intend to talk with them and be a resource for them," he said. "I want them to know that and believe it, and know that I take it very seriously."

Isbell's research passion is artificial intelligence. In particular, he focuses on applying statistical machine learning to building autonomous agents that must live and interact with large numbers of other intelligent agents, some of whom may be human.

Isbell received his B.S. in computer science in 1990 from Georgia Tech and his Ph.D. in computer science from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in 1998. After four years at AT&T Labs/Research, he returned to Georgia Tech in 2002 to join the faculty of the College of Computing.

His research interests are varied, but recently he has been building autonomous agents that engage in lifelong learning when in the presence of thousands of other intelligent agents, including humans.

His work has been featured in the popular media, including The New York Times and The Washington Post, as well as in technical collections. He also pursues reform in computing education. He was a developer of Threads, Georgia Tech's new structuring principle for computing curricula, and one of the key developers in Georgia Tech's new MOOC-supported Master of Science in Computer Science, the first of its kind in the world. He teaches several courses both to on-campus students and to students around the world in Tech's Online master of science in computer science program.

Georgia Institute of Technology introduced former Tech football player Todd Stansbury as the Institute's ninth director of athletics on Sept. 22, 2016.

In just his second full year as the A.D. at his alma mater, he oversaw one of Georgia Tech athletics' most successful all-around years in recent memory in 2018-19.

Among the accomplishments in '18-19:

- Georgia Tech leaped 55 spots in the final Learfield IMG Directors' Cup standings, from No. 121 in 2017-18 to No. 66 in 2018-19, Tech's highest finish in the national all-sports standings since 2010-11;

- nine teams — football, men's cross country, women's cross country, men's swimming and diving, women's indoor track and field, women's outdoor track and field, women's tennis, golf and baseball — earned Directors' Cup points for the Yellow Jackets based on NCAA postseason qualification and performance, the most GT teams to earn Directors' Cup points since 2009-10;

- in the latest Academic Progress Rate (APR) data released by the NCAA, Tech was the only institution from a Power Five conference that had a multiyear APR higher than the national average in every sport;

- Georgia Tech's NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) came in at 89 percent, the highest mark in school history for the sixth-straight year;

- GT athletics' Jackets Without Borders international service program won the prestigious ACC Game Changers award for community service;

- buoyed by contributions to Athletics Initiative 2020, a \$125 million fundraising initiative introduced by Stansbury in June 2018 (see below for more details), Tech athletics enjoyed a record-breaking fundraising year with more than \$50 million in donations. Stansbury began setting the stage for these accomplishments as soon as he officially arrived back on The Flats on Nov. 28, 2016. In the first months of his tenure as athletics director, he identified four strategic priorities for Georgia Tech athletics — to define the GT athletics brand, to establish an internal culture, to align the internal structure and to generate new revenue. He has addressed those priorities through a slew of initiatives and accomplishments. Highlights include:

- a significant revenue lift, which can be traced in large part to an innovative overhaul of sales operations that focused on integrating fundraising and ticket sales efforts;

- the establishment of a partnership with adidas to serve as the official apparel provider of Georgia Tech athletics, which was announced on Aug. 22, 2017 and went into effect on July 1, 2018;

- significant facilities upgrades, including a new \$4.5 million football locker room, a \$1.2 million investment in new videoboards at several competition venues (baseball, softball, volleyball and tennis, as well as Bobby Dodd Stadium's Callaway Plaza) and a refresh of the student-athletes' nutrition center and training table;

- a re-emphasis on Georgia Tech athletics iconic Total Person Program, with investments for additional staff and programming for student-athletes, including the department's first three Jackets Without Borders service trips to Costa Rica (2017) and Puerto Rico (2018 and 2019);

- a comprehensive brand refinement that included defining Georgia Tech athletics' official colors, Tech's first-ever athletics wordmark and a simplification of the iconic interlocking GT logo;

- the creation of Georgia Tech's "Gold Code," which outlines the department's core values, brand differentiators, vision, mission and the Everyday Champions formula — Winning + The Institute + Total Person Program = Everyday Champions;

- the establishment of two new offices within the athletics department — the office of brand and ideation, which works to identify and tell the story of the Yellow Jackets' brand, and the office of innovation, which oversees Georgia Tech's efforts to build on its status as college athletics' leader in innovation, particularly through collaboration and partnerships with the Institute and innovation hubs throughout Atlanta. In June 2018, Stansbury unveiled the most significant undertaking of his tenure as Georgia Tech's A.D. — Athletics Initiative 2020. AI 2020 aims to raise \$125 million for athletics facilities, endowments and operations by Dec. 31, 2020 with three priorities in mind — recruiting (putting GT in position to attract the special type of student-athlete that can excel both athletically and academically at Tech), building a better student-athlete (equipping them with the tools they need to excel in their sport, while also developing each as a Total Person that succeeds in academics and life) and winning (being true to the great tradition of excellence at Georgia Tech by competing for ACC and national championships).

The crown jewel of AI 2020 is a \$70 million renovation of Georgia Tech's Edge Center. The new Edge Center will serve as a sleek and innovative home base for Georgia Tech athletics' teams and administration, a one-stop shop for key student-athlete services, an anchor for recruiting efforts and a showcase for the Institute's commitment to student-athlete success and fan engagement.

In the first year since the public unveil, Georgia Tech raised more than \$90 million towards AI 2020's \$125 million goal.

A native of Oakville, Ontario, Stansbury was initially drawn to Georgia Tech when he befriended several Tech football student-athletes while on a family vacation in Florida as a youngster. The student-athletes invited Stansbury and his family to attend a practice on their way back through Atlanta.

They accepted and, after visiting campus, Stansbury was determined to attend and play football at Tech. Several years later, he was offered and accepted a football scholarship to

attend Tech. He enrolled in 1980 and played linebacker and special teams for the Yellow Jackets under head coach Bill Curry. He went on to be selected in the third round of the Canadian Football League draft by the Saskatchewan Roughriders in 1984 but after a brief CFL career, returned to Atlanta to begin a banking career.

In 1988, he left banking and returned to The Flats to become an academic advisor for Georgia Tech's football program. In 1991, he was promoted to assistant athletics director for academics by legendary A.D. Homer Rice.

After leaving Tech in 1995, Stansbury's career included stops at Houston (associate A.D. - 1997-2000) and Oregon State (executive associate A.D. - 2003-12), as well as three stints as an athletics director at East Tennessee State (2000-03), UCF (2012-15) and Oregon State (2015-16). Stansbury and his wife, Karen, who were married inside Georgia Tech's Arthur B. Edge Intercollegiate Athletics Center, reside in Atlanta. After they were married in 1995, the couple traveled the world for 18 months before returning to the United States.

Mark Rountree, a former football student-athlete at Louisiana Tech and experienced athletics administrator who most recently served as the director of athletics at Portland State University, joined the Georgia Tech athletics staff as a deputy athletics director on Nov. 30, 2016. In his role, he serves as the sport administrator for Georgia Tech football.

Rountree was director of athletics at Portland State for 23 months, beginning on Jan. 2, 2015. In less than two years as A.D., he instituted fundraising and oversaw groundbreaking for the Viking Pavilion Project, a \$50 million renovation of PSU's main athletics facility, which will include a 3,000-seat arena and 15,000 square feet dedicated to student-athletes' academic pursuits when construction is completed in 2018. Also under Rountree's direction, Portland State set fundraising records during its annual Wine and Roses events in both 2015 and 2016.

He hired new women's basketball, softball and track and field head coaches at Portland State and signed football head coach Bruce Barnum to a five-year contract. Barnum went on to lead PSU to a 9-3 record and NCAA Division I FCS playoff appearance in his first full season at the helm in 2015. In addition to posting its best record as a Division I program, Portland State football also recorded its highest home attendance in seven seasons in '15.

Prior to his arrival at Portland State, Rountree served as deputy athletics director at Miami (Ohio) from 2013-14. At Miami, he oversaw the daily operation of the athletics department, served as sport administrator for football and men's basketball and supervised academics, business operations, compliance, equipment and strength and conditioning. He was also the department's chief financial officer and was responsible for strategic planning.

Rountree's administrative experience also includes stints at Georgetown (senior associate A.D./internal operations -- 2008-13), Oregon State (associate A.D./compliance -- 2004-08), Towson (assistant A.D./compliance -- 2000-04), Maryland (compliance coordinator -- 1997-2000), Texas Pan-American (assistant A.D./1994-97) and Louisiana Tech (director of academic support -- 1991-94). It was during his five years at Oregon State that he worked with Stansbury, who was OSU's executive associate A.D. at the time.

A native of West Monroe, La., Rountree was a four-year letterwinner as a running back/wide receiver at Louisiana Tech from 1987-90. He graduated from Louisiana Tech with a bachelor's degree in history in 1991.

He and his wife, Jennie, live in Atlanta.

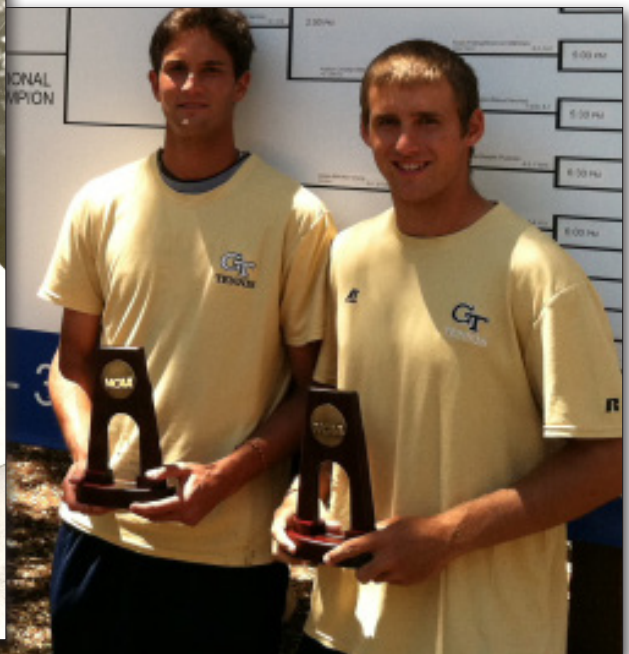

HISTORY

TECH TENNIS TIMELINE

1908—First Tech tennis team, with individuals competing in tournaments.

1915—Coached by J.R. Crenshaw, Tech tennis team competes in first dual matches, 2-0.

1918—Tech wins the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association championship.

1922—Tech wins the first of its two Southern Conference championships.

1926—Yellow Jackets win their second Southern Conference title in five years.

1929—Longtime coach J.R. Crenshaw coaches his final season, compiling an overall record of 32-12-2 in 13 seasons.

1934—Legendary Earle Bortell takes over as the Tech head coach, embarking on a career that would span 28 years and 215 victories.

1938—Russell Bobbitt, the conference champ at number one singles, led Georgia Tech to its first Southeastern Conference team title. The team was captained by GT Hall of Fame member Bill Moore and coached by Earle Bortell.

1945—Howard McCall reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA singles championship while Niles Millsap goes three rounds in singles and teams with Frank Willett who reach the semis in doubles.

1946—The team won its second Southeastern Conference team championship, led by T.W. Fowler, who won the conference title at two singles, and Howard McCall and Niles Millsap, who were co-champions at number one doubles.

May 12-14, 1960—Tech dominated the SEC Tennis Championships at Knoxville, Tenn., beating Tulane and Florida to win the team title. Ned Neely won the conference singles championship and teamed with Harry Thompson to win the number two singles championship. Thompson won the number two singles title, while Paul Metz was the number five singles champion and Dave Peake and Dave Pearsall won the number three doubles crown.

1960—Tech team posts a fourth-place finish at the NCAA championships, the best finish in school history, as Ned Neely and Harry Thompson reach the semifinals in doubles.

1966—All-American Walter Johnson advanced to the quarterfinals to lead Tech to a fifth-place NCAA finish.

1970—Led by All-American Larry Turville, who reached the fourth round, Tech ties for 10th place at the NAAs, as four players entered in singles and two in doubles teams.

March 11, 1982—First ACC win vs. Maryland, 6-3.

April 20, 1985—Freshman Bryan Shelton wins the ACC title at number one singles, the first individual ACC title in school history.

May 18, 1985—Bryan Shelton loses to Dan Goldie, 7-6, 4-6, 6-1, in first round of NCAA Singles Championships in the first NCAA appearance by a Tech player since 1971.

May 1987—Mark Avedikian and Richey Gilbert earn berths in NCAA doubles championship.

Jan. 23-24, 1988—Tech hosts nationally-ranked teams Stanford (No. 1), Tennessee (No. 10) and California (No. 13) to christen the Bill Moore Tennis Center; Jackets beat 13th-ranked Golden Bears but fall to top-ranked Cardinal. Jean Desdunes named head coach.

April 5, 1988—Defeated Georgia, 5-4, in Athens, for Tech's first win over the Bulldogs since 1966.

April 7, 1988—Defeated Clemson, 5-4, to finish first in the ACC regular season with a 7-0 record.

April 23, 1988—Lost to Clemson in finals of ACC Tournament, 5-4.

May 21, 1988—Lost to Michigan, 5-4, in first appearance in NCAA Team Championships.

May 26, 1988—Bryan Shelton reaches quarterfinals of NCAA Singles Championship before losing to eventual champion, Robbie Weiss of Pepperdine.

May 1988—Bryan Shelton and Kenny Thorne garner All-America honors, the first Yellow Jackets to earn the recognition since 1970.

May 19, 1993—Rob Givone competes in the NCAA singles tournament, becoming Tech's first NCAA entrant in five years.

April 22-24, 1994—Tech defeats Wake and Virginia to reach the finals of the ACC Tournament before falling to seventh-ranked Duke.

May 13-15, 1994—After defeating Florida State and VCU in the first two rounds, the third-seeded Tech score a heart-stopping 4-3 victory over NC to win the Region II title and advance to the NCAA Team Championships for the second time in school history. With Tech tied 3-3 against the Tar Heels, senior Scott Cotton was on the verge of defeat but rallied at number two singles to clinch the title.

May 21, 1994—Tech falls to third-ranked TCU in the first round of the NCAA Championships, to finish the season at 17-11 and ranked 28th in the final poll.

May 25, 1994—Rob Givone returns to the NCAA individual tourney, competing in singles and doubles with partner Scott Cotton.

March 29, 1995—Tech defeats Georgia Southern for head coach Jean Desdunes' 100th victory.

May 9, 1997—The team returns to NCAA Tournament play, falling to Duke in their NCAA Region II Championships opener.

May 15, 1998—Tech makes its second straight NCAA appearance, falling to Virginia Commonwealth at the NCAA Region II Championships in Richmond, Va.

June 30, 1998—Jean Desdunes resigns as head coach, stepping down with the second-highest win total in school history with 139. Assistant coach and former Tech All-American Kenny Thorne is named head coach at his alma mater.

April 30, 1999—Thorne is named ACC Coach of the Year after guiding the Jackets to a regular-season tie for second place in the ACC and the finals of the conference tournament. Thorne's No. 1 player, Benjamin Cassaigne, is named ACC Player of the Year.

May 14-15, 1999—The Yellow Jackets qualify for NCAA Regional play for the third-straight year, downing Boise State in their opening match before falling to defending national champion Stanford in round two at Palo Alto, Calif.

April 30, 2000—Roger Anderson is named ACC Rookie of the Year, the first Yellow Jacket to earn the honor.

March 7, 2001—Tech defeats 20th-ranked Miami. Tech's first win over a Top-20 opponent since 1998.

May 12-13, 2001—Tech competes in the NCAA Regional for the fourth time in the last five years. Tech tops Arizona, 4-2, in the first round before falling to eventual national champion Georgia in the second round in Athens, Ga.

October 28, 2001—Junior Roger Anderson becomes the first Yellow Jacket to win the Omni Hotels South Atlantic Region Championship when he defeats 43rd-ranked David Loewenthal

of Wake Forest in straight sets, 6-1, 7-5.

May 2, 2003—Senior Roger Anderson and junior Scott Schnugg become the first Tech players to earn All-America honors since 1988 after finishing the year ranked 10th nationally in doubles.

May 28, 2005—Freshman David North and junior Marko Rajevac participate in the NCAA Doubles Championship as alternates and advance to the quarterfinals to earn All-American honors, before falling to eventual national champions John Isner and Antonio Ruiz from Georgia.

May, 2008—Freshman Guillermo Gomez became just the second Yellow Jacket to be named ACC Freshman of the Year and ITA Mideast Region Rookie of the Year.

Feb. 19, 2009—Sophomore Guillermo Gomez ranked No. 7 nationally in singles by ITA -- the highest-ever ranking in for a Tech player in history.

Feb. 19, 2010—Junior Guillermo Gomez ranked No. 3 nationally in singles by ITA, the highest-ever ranking in Tech history. Gomez had surpassed his previous high in the first spring rankings (No. 5).

October 24, 2010—Kevin King and Juan Spir win the doubles title at the USTA/ITA Southeast Regional in Gainesville, Fla., beating teammates Eliot Potvin and Ryan Smith in the finals.

May, 2011—Senior Guillermo Gomez captures All-ACC honors for the fourth time, All-America honors for the third time, and finishes his career with a school record 119 singles victories. Juan Spir and Kevin King are named All-Americans in doubles.

June 8, 2011—Kenny Thorne named Wilson/ITA Division I National Coach of the Year after leading Georgia Tech to a 21-6 record and the Yellow Jackets advanced to the NCAA Round of 16 for the first time since 1994. Tech's 8-3 ACC mark was a program high for conference wins, and its final ITA ranking of No. 13 also was a program best.

October 24, 2011—Kevin King captures singles title at USTA/ITA Southeast Regional in Athens, beating three players ranked ahead of him and losing only one set in the tournament.

June 7, 2012—Kevin King and Juan Spir are named ITA All-Americans in doubles for the second time. King finishes his career with a Tech record 87 victories in doubles.

October 22, 2012—Juan Spir and Vikram Hundal win the doubles title at the USTA/ITA Southeast Regional in Tallahassee, Fla. The title was Spir's second in the event, this time with a different partner.

January 3, 2013—Juan Spir and Vikram Hundal open the spring ranked No. 3 by the ITA in doubles, the highest ranking ever attained by a Tech duo. They would stay there through the end of February when Hundal was injured.

January 18, 2013—Georgia Tech opens the new Ken Byers Tennis Complex by winning two matches over Old Dominion (5-2) and Lipscomb (4-3).

April 19, 2015—Georgia Tech stuns 8th-ranked Duke, 4-3, at the Ken Byers Tennis Complex, the highest-ranked team the Yellow Jackets had defeated under head coach Kenny Thorne (1998-present).

May 8, 2015—Georgia Tech returns to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in three years, earning a bid by defeating No. 8 Duke to close the regular season, then No. 35 Notre Dame and No. 14 Virginia Tech in the ACC Tournament.

2016—Georgia Tech returns to the NCAA Tournament for the second straight year behind Christopher Eubanks, who became the third Tech player to be named ACC Player of the Year. Eubanks also is named an ITA All-American.
