2020 (Senior): Appeared in eight games ... Was a special-teams leader for the Yellow Jackets, including as a gunner on the punt team ... Played a key role in Georgia Tech ranking second nationally in net punting (44.62 avg.) ... Recorded two tackles for the season, with both stops coming against eventual national semifinalists Clemson (Oct. 17) and Notre Dame (Oct. 31) ... Tackle versus Clemson was a seven-yard tackle for loss.

2019 (Junior): Appeared in 11 games ... Finished with five tackles on the season (four solo, one assisted) ... Recorded solo tackles in back-to-back games against The Citadel (Sept. 14) and at Temple (Sept. 28) ... Also assisted in a tackle at Miami (Fla.) (Oct. 19) before notching solo tackles in back-to-back games against Pitt (Nov. 2) and at Virginia (Nov. 9) ... Recovered his first-career fumble on a muffed punt in the second quarter against NC State (Nov. 21).

2018 (Sophomore): Appeared in 11 games, making five starts at cornerback ... Started five of the first seven games of the season, missing games versus Clemson (Sept. 22) and Bowling Green (Sept. 29) due to injury ... Saw action in the final six games of the season in a reserve role ... Battled through an upper-body injury sustained early in the season to finish 12th overall on the team and fifth among defensive backs with 26 total tackles ... Recorded lone tackle for loss in season opener against Alcorn State (Sept. 1) ... Had a season-high six tackles (four solo) at USF (Sept. 8) ... Notched five solo tackles in rout at Louisville (Oct. 5) ... Closed the season strong with eight stops over the final three contests – three vs. Virginia (Nov. 17), two at Georgia (Nov. 24) and three in the Quick Lane Bowl vs. Minnesota (Dec. 26).

2017 (True Freshman): Appeared in 10 games as a true freshman after enrolling at Georgia Tech in January and participating in spring practice ... Played primarily on special teams and did not record any statistics ... Was one of nine true freshmen that saw action for the Yellow Jackets.

High School: Rated as a four-star prospect by ESPN both as a defensive back and a return specialist ... Tabbed as the nation's No. 32-ranked cornerback by ESPN ... Second-team all-state honoree ... Also named all-county and all-region ... Notched seven interceptions over final two prep seasons, including four as a senior in 2016 ... Helped lead McEachern to district championship and state quarterfinals appearance in '16 ... Coached by Kyle Hockman ... Also lettered twice as a sprinter in track and field ... Honor roll student ... Participated in Key Club ... Graduated from high school early and enrolled at Georgia Tech at the beginning of the 2017 spring semester to begin school and football activities.

Personal: Graduated from Georgia Tech in December 2020 with a B.S. in business administration ... Is the third of four siblings ... Godbrother, Travis Zachery, rushed for 3,043 yards and 41 touchdowns as a running back at Clemson from 1998-2001.

2020 (Redshirt Junior): Appeared in all 10 games ... Made only start of his career on Senior Day versus Pitt (Dec. 12) ... Was a leader on special teams, including as a gunner on punt coverage ... Played a key role in Georgia Tech ranking second nationally in net punting (44.62 avg.) ... Recorded six special-teams tackles on the season ... Three of his six tackles came in season-opening win at Florida State (Sept. 12) ... Also recorded solo tackles in each of the final three games of the season – vs. Duke (Nov. 28), at NC State (Dec. 5) and at Pitt (Dec. 10).

2019 (Redshirt Sophomore): Appeared in 10 games ... Hauled in his first-career reception at then-No. 1 Clemson (Aug. 29) when James Graham connected with him for 34 yards in the fourth quarter ... Also returned three punts on the season, all against North Carolina (Oct. 5), amassing 16 return yards ... Caught his second reception of the season for 19 yards at Duke (Oct. 12) ... Finished the season averaging 26.5 yards per reception.

2018 (Redshirt Freshman): Made first-career appearance in season-opening win over Alcorn State ... Had one rush for minus-one yard.

2017 (True Freshman): Redshirted.

High School: Three-time all-region honoree as a wide receiver at Kell H.S. (coach Derek Cook) ... Also earned all-Cobb County recognition three times (first team as a sophomore, honorable mention as a junior and senior) ... Helped lead team to three region championships (2013, 2014 and 2016) and a pair of state semifinal appearances (2013 and 2016) ... Also played strong safety and returned kicks ... Had 99- and 95-yard kickoff returns for touchdowns ... Three-year captain ... Lists most memorable athletic achievement as racking up 122 receiving yards, including a 70-yard touchdown, and breaking up a pass to clinch regional title as a sophomore ... Team co-captain ... Also earned four letters and was a three-year captain in baseball as a second baseman and outfielder ... Ranked ninth in class with a 4.35 grade point average ... Member of principal's honor roll and National Honor Society.

Personal: Has one sibling ... Cousin, Zack Bowers, played college baseball at Georgia and is now a member of the San Francisco Giants organization ... Majoring in mechanical engineering ... Aspires to be an engine developer for a car manufacturer.

2020 (Redshirt Senior): Saw action in all 10 games, including nine starts ... Led Georgia Tech in receptions (29), receiving yards (439) and touchdown receptions (4) ... 15.1 yards per reception ranked second on the team (min. five receptions) ... Caught at least one pass in every game ... Had multiple catches in 9-of-10 games ... Opened the season with a then-career-high five catches for 57 yards in win at Florida State (Sept. 12) ... Had four receptions for 31 yards, including a 9-yard touchdown, in win over Louisville (Oct. 9) ... Caught a 59-yard touchdown pass, the longest reception of his career, against eventual College Football Playoff participant Clemson (Oct. 17) ... Caught three passes for 64 yards against another CFP participant, Notre Dame (Oct. 31) ... Capped his collegiate career with five receptions for 97 yards (both career highs), including a 21-yard touchdown, against Pitt (Dec. 10) ... Named to Atlantic Coast Conference all-academic team for his achievements on the field and in the classroom.

2019 (Senior): Started the first four games of the season before missing the final eight games of the season due to injury ... Awarded a redshirt season ... After a slow start to the season, hauled in three passes for 71 yards – all then-career highs – against The Citadel (Sept. 14), including his first-career touchdown reception – a 33-yard pass from Lucas Johnson in the third quarter ... Followed up his touchdown by converting the two-point conversion on a pass from Johnson as well ... He then eclipsed the reception milestone with four catches for 63 yards, including a 27-yard reception from James Graham in the fourth quarter ... Finished his year averaging 19.1 yards per reception ... An ACC Honor Roll member.

2018 (Junior): An ACC Honor Roll selection ... Appeared in 12 games, starting 11 ... Missed Oct. 13 game vs. Duke due to injury ... Caught 11 passes for 186 yards, both career highs and good for second on the team ... Averaged 16.9 yards per reception ... Had a career-high three receptions in Quick Lane Bowl vs. Minnesota (Dec. 26) ... Caught two passes in three different games – Sept. 1 vs. Alcorn State (21 yds.), Sept. 29 vs. Bowling Green (career-high 70 yds.) and Nov. 10 vs. Miami (42 yds.) ... 37-yard reception vs. Bowling Green was a season long ... Caught a pivotal 22-yard pass for a first down on third-and-6 to help Georgia Tech milk the final 6:43 off the clock in 27-21 win over Miami.

2017 (Sophomore): Played in all 11 games as the top receiver off the bench behind starters Ricky Jeune and Brad Stewart ... Caught just one pass but it was a big one – a 49-yarder that gave Georgia Tech first-and-goal at the two-yard line and set up the Yellow Jackets' first touchdown of the game at Virginia (Nov. 4).

2016 (True Freshman): One of six true freshmen that saw playing time for Georgia Tech ... Appeared in 11 games as a reserve wideout and on special teams ... Did not record any statistics.

High School: Amassed 84 receptions and 25 touchdowns over final two prep seasons, including 47 catches for 819 yards and 15 touchdowns as a senior ... Earned honorable-mention all-state recognition

as a senior ... Two-time all-county and all-region honoree ... Served as team captain for a squad that went 11-2 and claimed region championship during his senior campaign, good for the best finish in school history ... Hauled in five passes for 183 yards and three touchdowns, including TD receptions of 84 and 63 yards, in final high-school game, a 49-31 loss to Colquitt County in the 2015 Georgia 6A state quarterfinals ... Also recorded 30 tackles and two interceptions for South Forsyth (coach Jeff Arnette) as a senior ... Was also a three-year letterwinner in track and field (100-meter, 4×100-meter relay).

Personal: Graduated from Georgia Tech in May 2020 with a B.S. in history, technology and society ... Is one of four siblings – has an older sister and two younger brothers ... Brother, Jamal, is a redshirt freshman offensive lineman at Georgia Tech ... Father, Richard, played football at West Georgia ... Uncle, Ken Camp, played football at Auburn ... Jalen did not begin playing football until 10th grade ... Also enjoys playing basketball ... Member of ACC academic honor roll.

2020 (Sixth-Year Senior): All-ACC honorable mention for the second-straight season ... Named one of the team's permanent captains for the second-straight season ... Led Georgia Tech with 84 tackles and nine tackles for loss ... Ranked fifth in the ACC and 64th nationally with 8.4 tackles per game ... Recorded between six and eight tackles each game over six of the first seven contests of the season (6 vs. Florida State, 8 vs. UCF, 7 at Syracuse, 7 vs. Louisville, 8 at Boston College, 6 vs. Notre Dame) ... Took his game to another level following Georgia Tech's four-week break at the beginning of November, recording at least 12 tackles in each of the final three games of his collegiate career – 12 vs. Duke, 12 at NC State and 14 vs. Pitt ... 14 tackles came vs. Pitt despite having to miss some time during the game to attend to a hand injury ... Was one of only five ACC players to record 12 or more tackles in a game on at least three different occasions in 2020 ... Was one of only 12 players in the ACC with at least 2.0 tackles for loss in three different games (at FSU, at NC State, vs. Pitt) ... Broke up two passes in the win over Duke (Nov. 28).

2019 (Fifth-Year Junior): All-ACC honorable mention ... Started all 12 games at inside linebacker ... Led the team with 97 tackles (54 solo) on the season ... Ranked tied for eighth in the ACC and 53rd nationally with 8.1 tackles per game ... Recorded at least three tackles in every game and was one of just eight ACC players with four double-digit tackle games ... His four double-digit tackle games were the most since Julian Burnett in 2005 ... Also finished with 6.0 tackles-for-loss for 16 yards and 2.0 sacks for 9 yards ... Forced two fumbles on the year and recovered one ... Also intercepted one pass for eight yards, hurried a quarterback and broke up three passes to complete the stat sheet ... Was one of just seven Power Five players and one of 16 Division I FBS players with at least 97 tackles, an interception and a fumble recovery in 2019 ... First crossed doubled-digits against The Citadel (Sept. 14), when he tallied 14 tackles, 1.0 sacks for 4 yards and intercepted a pass ... Registered a career-high 16 tackles (eight solo) against

North Carolina (Oct. 5), the most by a Tech defender since Morgan Burnett had 16 in 2009 ... Took down 10 offensive players and forced his first fumble of his career against Pitt (Nov. 2) ... Recorded nine tackles the next week at Virginia (Nov. 9), including 2.0 tackles-for-loss for 6 yards and 1.0 sacks for 5 yards ... Totaled 11 tackles (eight solo) and 1.0 tackles for loss in the primetime Thursday night game against NC State (Nov. 21) ... Forced his second fumble of the season against then-No. 4 Georgia (Nov. 30) ... Tallied 63 tackles over the Yellow Jackets' final six home games of the season ... Joined Charlie Thomas and Tariq Carpenter in becoming the first Georgia Tech trio since 2012 to record more than 60 tackles apiece in a single season ... An ACC Honor Roll member.

2018 (Redshirt Junior): Appeared in all 13 games and made 12 starts at inside linebacker ... Ranked sixth on the team with 47 tackles ... Registered at least one tackle in every game and made multiple stops in 12-of-13 ... Opened the season with four tackles and a fumble recovery that he returned 15 yards for a touchdown in shutout win over Alcorn State (Sept. 1) ... Had six tackles at USF (Sept. 8) but was ejected from the game due to a targeting penalty in the second half, a turning point in Georgia Tech's 49-38 loss ... Was forced to sit out of the first half at Pitt (Sept. 15) due to the previous week's targeting call but returned to make two tackles in the second half of the defeat ... Was in on a sack against Clemson (Sept. 22) ... Had five tackles and a quarterback hurry in rout at Louisville (Oct. 5) ... Recorded a career-high seven stops in win at North Carolina (Nov. 3) ... Had six tackles in Quick Lane Bowl vs. Minnesota (Dec. 26).

2017 (Redshirt Sophomore): Sustained a lower-body injury during fall camp and missed the entire season.

2016 (Redshirt Freshman): Appeared in all 13 games with one start at outside linebacker (Sept. 17 vs. Vanderbilt) ... Finished the season with 12 tackles ... Ranked second on the team with four special-teams tackles (two on kickoffs, two on punts) ... Matched a career high with three tackles at Pittsburgh (Oct. 8) and Virginia Tech (Nov. 12).

2015 (True Freshman): Redshirted.

High School: Three-year letterwinner ... Team captain as senior while leading Buford to three-straight state titles ... Buford was 58-2 in four years ... 2014 all-county, all-state first team selection and region defensive player of the year ... Also played receiver, punter and punt returner ... Led Buford with 75 tackles along with nine pass breakups, two interceptions and two punt returns for touchdown as senior ... Coached by Jess Simpson, who is now defensive line coach at ACC rival Miami ... Lettered three years in track for head coach David Snell ... Team captain all three years ... Was 2013 Georgia state pole vault champion.

Personal: Earned a B.S. in economics from Georgia Tech in May 2019 and is on pace to earn a M.S. in economics from Georgia Tech in May 2021 ... Has two older brothers and one younger sister ... Father, Buddy, was two-time All-Pro linebacker for Atlanta Falcons and 1980 NFL Defensive Rookie of the Year ... Brother, Justin, was drafted by Cincinnati Reds out of high school ... Brother, Jessel, played football at Auburn from 2009-11 and Delaware from 2011-14 ... Sister, Gabby, is an All-America volleyball player at Kentucky and helped lead UK to the 2020-21 NCAA Division I national championship.

2020 (Senior): Put together one of the most decorated individual seasons in Georgia Tech football history ... Won the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter ... Became the second Yellow Jacket to win the Ray Guy Award (joining Durant Brooks – 2007) ... Became the first African American to win the Ray Guy Award in its 21-year history ... Was a unanimous first-team All-American, becoming only the third Georgia Tech player to ever earn unanimous All-America honors (joining Ken Swilling – 1990 and Calvin Johnson – 2006) ... Led the nation and set Georgia Tech and Atlantic Coast Conference records with a 48.0-yard punting average ... To put the whopping 48.0-yard average into perspective, the margin between his average and the third-best average in the nation (46.7 – Washington State's Oscar Draguicevich) was the same as the margin between Draguicevich and the nation's ninth-best average (45.4 – San Diego State's Tanner Kuljian) ... 49% of his punts (22-of-45) traveled 50 or more yards, 47% (21-of-45) were fair caught, 40% (18-of-45) were downed inside the opponent's 20 yard line and only 17% (8-of-45) were returned ... Helped Georgia Tech rank second nationally in net punting (44.62-yard average) ... Averaged at least 51 yards per punt three times in nine games (51.2 vs. UCF on Sept. 19, 51.0 at Boston College on Oct. 24 and 51.0 vs. Pitt on Dec. 10) ... Was named the Ray Guy Award National Punter of the Week twice (51.2 avg., 3 inside 20, career-long 70-yarder vs. UCF on Sept. 19 and 51.0 avg., 3 inside 20 at Boston College on Oct. 24) and one of the award's "Ray's 4" recipients (honoring the nation's four best punters each week) five times (41.7 avg., 2 inside 20 at Florida State, 49.3 avg., 3 inside 20, 64-yarder downed at 4 yard line at Syracuse on Sept. 26 and 48.3 avg., 3 inside 20 vs. Clemson on Oct. 17, in addition to the performances vs. UCF and at BC) ... Finished with a 44.7-yard career punting average, which ranks second in Georgia Tech history behind only Brooks (45.3).

2019 (Junior): One of the nation's top weapons on special teams, Harvin ranked 17th nationally and fifth in the ACC with a 44.8-yard punting average – good for the fifth-best single-season punting average in school history, giving him two of the top-10 season marks in the Georgia Tech annals for his career ... Boomed 80 punts for 3,583 total yards – both good for third all-time in school history ... A career-high 18 of 80 punts, including 10 in the first four games of 2019, were downed inside the 20-yard line ... 26-of-80 punts traveled 50 yards or more ... Averaged at least 45 yards per punt six times in 12 games and 50 yards or more twice – 51.4 at Duke (Oct. 12), 45.5 at Miami (Fla.) (Oct. 19), 46.4 vs. Pitt (Nov. 2), 48.2 vs. vs. Virginia Tech (Nov. 16), 50.5 vs. NC State (Nov. 21), and 45.2 vs. then-No. 4 Georgia (Nov. 30) ... His whopping 51.4-yards average at Duke (Oct 12) ranked 16th in school history for single-game average ... Named ACC Specialist of the Week after he averaged 45.5 yards per punt and threw a 41-yard

touchdown pass to Nathan Cottrell on a fake punt in Tech's 28-21 overtime win over Miami (Fla.) (Oct. 19) – the first completion of his career ... Harvin finished the season with a 774.4 pass-efficiency rating ... Amassed 434 punting yards on nine kicks against Virginia Tech (Nov. 16), ranking tied for ninth in school history ... Set two program records by punting 13 times for 587 yards against Georgia (Nov. 30) – the most since 1997.

2018 (Sophomore): Second-team all-ACC ... One of the nation's least-utilized weapons, Harvin would've led the ACC and ranked 16th nationally through the regular season with a 44.3-yard punting average, but with just 31 attempts fell short of the 3.6 punts per game needed to qualify for the NCAA's official statistical rankings ... Season average fell to 41.3 yards per punt after he uncharacteristically kicked four times for just 75 yards (18.8 avg.) in Quick Lane Bowl vs. Minnesota ... Sixteen of his 35 punts (including 14 of his last 21) were downed inside the 20-yard line, 10-of-35 traveled 50 yards or more and three of his booming punts were muffed, all of which were recovered by Georgia Tech and led directly to scores (two touchdowns and a field goal) ... Averaged at least 45 yards per punt seven times in 12 games – 48.0 vs. Alcorn State (Sept. 1), 48.5 vs. Clemson (Sept. 22), 53.0 vs. Bowling Green (Sept. 29) ... 46.2 vs. Duke (Oct. 13), 45.0 at North Carolina (Nov. 3), 47.3 vs. Miami (Nov. 10) and 46.7 vs. Virginia (Nov. 17) ... Averaged a whopping 47.7 yards per punt in six home games but just 34.6 yards per punt in six games away from home ... Played in only 12 games because he was the only healthy, non-redshirting player that did not see action in Georgia Tech's 66-31 romp at Louisville (Oct. 5).

2017 (True Freshman): Led all NCAA Division I true freshmen, ranked 16th overall nationally and was second in the ACC in punting average at 44.1 yards per punt ... 44.1-yard average was a Georgia Tech freshman record, breaking the 18-year-old record of 43.8 yards per punt (Dan Dyke – 1999) ... Fifth-best overall single-season punting average in school history ... Only the third FWAA freshman all-American in GT history, joining place kicker Travis Bell (2004) and guard Will Jackson (2010) ... Became the first Georgia Tech freshman to be named all-ACC since Calvin Johnson (first-team WR) and Bell (second-team PK) in 2004 ... For the season, 16 of his 50 punts downed inside the 20-yard line (32 percent), 13-of-50 traveled 50-plus yards (26 percent) and just 21 were returned (42 percent) ... Opened his collegiate career by averaging 46 yards over three punts, including a 56-yarder that was downed at the 18-yard line, against Tennessee (Sept. 4) ... Two of his three punts were downed inside the 20-yard line in home debut against Jacksonville State (Sept. 9) ... Averaged 47.3 yards per punt (second-highest of the season) against North Carolina (Sept. 30) ... Had 4-of-6 punts downed inside the 20-yard line, including a season-long 62-yarder, at Miami (Oct. 14) ... Averaged a season-high 51.5 yards per punt, including a 56-yarder, in win over Wake Forest (Oct. 21) ... In a driving rain at Clemson (Oct. 28), averaged 46.9 yards per punt with 5-of-9 traveling 50-plus yards ... In three games in October, averaged a whopping 46.9 yards over 17 punts with 7-of-17 traveling 50 yards or more and 7-of-17 downed inside the 20-yard line ... For the season, averaged 40 yards or more per punt in 10-of-11 games.

High School: Rated as a three-star prospect by ESPN, 247Sports and Rivals ... Ranked as the No. 2 punter in the Class of 2017 by Kohl's Kicking Camps ... Nation's No. 4-ranked punter according to ESPN and 247Sports ... Two-time all-state honoree ... Selected to play in Blue-Grey All-America Game and Shrine Bowl of the Carolinas ... Averaged 42.5 yards per punt with a long of 72 as a senior ... Led the state in punting average as a junior and senior ... Helped lead Sumter to four-straight district championships (2013-16), back-to-back regional championships (2015-16) and a state runner-up finish (2014) ... Coached by Mark Barnes ... Also earned four letters in track and field and helped lead Sumter to three-straight regional championships as a thrower ... Four-time academic letterwinner ... Graduated with a 3.8 grade point average.

Personal: On pace to graduate from Georgia Tech in May 2021 with a B.S. in business administration ... Oldest of two siblings ... Began playing football at age seven ... An accomplished musician that plays multiple instruments and participated in region band two times, holding down first chair on both occasions ... Member of ACC academic honor roll.
