Tech Visits Georgia State

For the first time since 2007, Georgia Tech's men's basketball team travels across town to face Georgia State on its home floor when the two city of Atlanta rivals tip off at 7 p.m. Saturday at the Panthers' new GSU Convocation Center.

Behind six players scoring in double figures, the Yellow Jackets opened their seventh season under head coach Josh Pastner Monday night by defeating Clayton State, 93-63, at McCamish Pavilion. The Panthers, likewise, opened their first season under head coach Jonas Hayes Monday with a 76-59 victory over Coastal Georgia at the Convocation Center.

Saturday's meeting marks the 21st regular-season meeting between the two teams and the last of a three-game series that began with the 2020-21 season opener. The first two meetings were both decided in overtime, Georgia State winning in 2020 and Tech in 2021 at McCarnish Pavilion.

The game will be streamed live online on ESPN+, available on the ESPN app with a subscription. Radio coverage will be on the Georgia Tech Sports Network by Legends Sports and flagship station WCNN (680/93.7 the Fan), as well as on satellite radio (SiriusXM channel 389, SXM app 989).

Among the eight key letterwinners returning are two starters from the 2021-22 squad, both seniors in 6-3 point guard **Kyle Sturdivant** (7.6 ppg, 2.3 apg) and 6-11 center **Rodney Howard** (6.5 ppg, 5.1 rpg), as well as the backup point guard, 6-1 junior **Deivon Smith** (5.7 ppg, 2.0 apg) and a rising trio of sophomore perimeter players in 6-6 **Dallan "Deebo" Coleman** (6.2 ppg), 6-6 **Miles Kelly** (4.5 ppg) and 6-7 **Jalon Moore** (2.8 ppg). Junior 6-2 guard **Tristan Maxwell** and 6-8 junior forward **Jordan Meka** return to provide additional depth.

Pastner and his staff have augmented the eight returnees with a pair of transfers in 6-2 guard Lance Terry (14.3 ppg at Gardner-Webb) and 6-7 forward Ja'von Franklin (12.2 ppg, 7.8 rpg at South Alabama), and over the summer signed a pair of international players who will be freshmen in 2022-23 - 6-8 forward Freds Pauls Bagatskis from Latvia and 7-foot center Cyril Martynov of Canada.

Tech finished off the 2021-22 season with an 84-74 loss to Louisville in the first round of the Atlantic Coast Conference Tournament at the Barclays Center in Brooklyn, N.Y. Tech (12-20 overall, 5-15 ACC) finished in 14th place in the ACC regular season standings, one year after winning the fourth conference title in program history.

Series vs. Georgia State

• Georgia Tech is facing Georgia State in the Panthers' home arena for just the third time in the series and the first time since 2007. GSU won the first time, 77-73, on March 10, 1973, and the Yellow Jackets prevailed, 72-67, on Dec. 5, 2007 at the GSU Sports Arena.

 Tech holds an 18-3 overall lead in a series that began in 1970, taking last year's contest in overtime by a 72-62 score at McCamish Pavilion. Georgia State had won the prior last two meetings, although one of the meetings was an exhibition game in November of 2017 to raise money for hurricane relief efforts that year.

• The Panthers defeated Tech at McCamish Pavilion to open the 2020-21 season, a 123-120 victory in four overtimes, the first quadruple-overtime game in Tech program history.

 Saturday's meeting is the final installment of a threegame series agreed to by the two programs in the summer of 2020. The first two games were played at McCamish Pavilion.

• Tech is 17-2 against the Panthers on its home floor, including a 16-1 mark in Alexander Memorial Coliseum.

Last Time Out

Georgia Tech shot 61.8 percent from the field in the second half to overcome a sluggish start and pull away from Clayton State, 93-63, in Monday night's 2022-23 season opener at McCamish Pavilion.

Clayton State went on a 10-3 run late in the first half to send the game to halftime knotted at 34-34, but the second half was all Georgia Tech, as the Yellow Jackets made 21-of-34 field goals and outscored the visiting Lakers 59-29 over the final 20 minutes.

Playing in his first game in the White and Gold, Gardner-Webb transfer Lance Terry sparked Tech's second-half outburst, making 4-of-6 3-pointers and scoring 14 of his game-high 16 points after the break.

Despite the slow start, Georgia Tech finished the game with big advantages in shooting percentage (48%-37%), 3-point field-goal percentage (35%-18%), rebounds (52-32), points in the paint (52-34) and fast-break points (25-10).

Rodney Howard scored 15 points and pulled down 13 rebounds for his fourth-career double-double, while Jalon Moore (11 points), Miles Kelly (10), Deivon Smith (10) and Kyle Sturdivant (10) rounded out six scorers in double-figures for the Yellow Jackets. Sturdivant also dished out five assists and matched a team-high with two steals.

Last year's Meeting

Jordan Usher scored a career-high 30 points, including nine in overtime, as Georgia Tech rallied late from a six-point deficit and outlasted Georgia State in overtime, 72-62, last Dec. 21 at McCarnish Pavilion.

The Yellow Jackets (6-5), who snapped a four-game losing streak, had scored just 19 points in the final 21:58 of regulation to squander a 15-point lead. But Usher came to the rescue, making two free throws with 10 seconds left in regulation to send the game to overtime, then scored nine of Georgia Tech's 13 points in the extra period to help the Yellow Jackets avenge last season's 123-120 four-overtime loss to the Panthers.

Tech led 40-25 with 1:58 to go in the first half on Tuesday, but went ice-cold from that point, scoring just six points over the next 14 minutes. The cold streak sparked a 27-6 GSU run that spanned both halves and left the Jackets trailing 52-46 with less than eight minutes to go in the game. Tech had 11 turnovers and made just three field goals during the Panthers' 27-6 spurt.

The Yellow Jackets never regained the lead the rest of regulation, but Usher made three free throws in the final 78 seconds, including both attempts with 10 seconds remaining to knot the score at 59-59. The Jackets then forced an off-balance three-point attempt by GSU's Corey Allen in the waning seconds that was off the mark. Usher grabbed the rebound and the game went to overtime.

The extra period was all Usher. The senior scored seven of the first nine points of overtime, including a pair of three-pointers, as the Jackets opened with a 9-0 run that gave them a commanding 68-59 lead just 2:10 into the period. From there, Tech's lead never shrunk to less than eight the rest of the way.

Usher made 8-of-14 shots from the field, including 5-of-6 from three-point range, and 9-of-10 shooting from the foul line. He also grabbed 11 rebounds for his third double-double of the season.

Notable from Clayton State Game

• Tech has scored 196 points in its two games against Clayton State last season and tonight combined.

• Tech snapped a two-game losing streak in season openers, having lost to Miami of Ohio and Georgia State to open the last two seasons.

• Six Tech players scored in double digits. The last time five or more players reached double figures in a game was Dec. 6, 2020 in the Yellow Jackets' 79-62 win over Kentucky (Jose Alvarado, Bubba Parham, Kyle Sturdivant, Jordan Usher, Moses Wright). The last time six players reached double figures was Feb. 4, 2018 in an 80-72 win at against Boston College (Brandon Alston, Jose Alvarado, Abdoulaye Gueye, Tadric Jackson, Ben Lammers, Josh Okogie).

• No Tech player logged as many as 30 minutes against Clayton State, the first time that has happened since Tech's 87-60 win at Miami on Feb. 20, 2021.

 Senior Kyle Sturdivant made his 32nd career start in a Georgia Tech uniform against Clayton State, most among the current Yellow Jackets, while senior center Rodney Howard started for the 25th time. Lance Terry made his first start as a Yellow Jacket, and the 38th of his college career (37 at Gardner-Webb).

 Rodney Howard (15 points and 13 rebounds) notched the fourth double-double of his career. The 6-11 center posted three in 2021-22 vs. Miami of Ohio (10/14), NC State (14/11) and Syracuse (19/10). It was the 10th double-figure scoring game of his career.

• Lance Terry, who played three seasons at Gardner-Webb before transferring to Tech, surpassed 600 career points for his college career. He opened the season with 598 points. Terry notched the 34th double-figure scoring game of his college career.

 Also in double-points against Clayton State - Jalon Moore for the second time in his career, Miles Kelly for the third time, Deivon Smith for the 12th time, Kyle Sturdivant for the 13th time.

• Kelly has hit 20-of-44 (45.5 pct.) from three-point range over Tech's last 12 games dating back to Jan. 23 vs. Clayton State. He was 5-for-30 over the Jackets' first 17 games of last season.

• Kyle Sturdivant has a 47:18 assist/turnover ratio over his last 15 games dating back to last Jan. 23 vs. Clayton State. He played 10 turnover-free games last season and recorded a 47:21 ratio in ACC games.

General Storylines

 108th season - Georgia Tech is playing its 108th season of basketball in 2022-23, having compiled an all-time on-court record of 1,422-1,287 (22 wins and one loss from the 2016-17 and 2017-18 seasons were vacated by the NCAA Committee on Infractions).

• Tech in the ACC - Tech is playing its 44th season as a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, having won the conference championship in 1985, 1990, 1993 and 2021. Prior to that, Tech competed in the Metro Conference for three seasons from 1975-78, was an independent from 1964-75, and was a member of the Southeastern Conference for 32 years from 1932-64, winning one title in 1938.

 Tech has played six seasons under head coach Josh Pastner, who has built the Tech program based on a "get old and stay old" philosophy, elevating the talent level incrementally through ever-improving high school recruiting and attracting transfers who went to high school in the Atlanta area.

 Georgia Tech has been projected to finish last in the ACC standings by a vote of the conference's official media panel before the season. Last season, Tech was projected to finish 10th and wound up 14th, the first time under Pastner that the Yellow Jackets finished below projections. In the prior three seasons, the Jackets surpassed expectations, having been picked to finish 13th, 12th and ninth, respectively, before

 Tech lost its top two scorers in seniors Michael Devoe and Jordan Usher, but returns eight of the next 10 players. Tech's returning scholarship players combined to start 100 games in 2021-22, and logged 53.8 percent of the minutes played.

 Four seniors, all rotation players, completed their Tech careers in 2021-22 and graduated in May. Michael Devoe (G League camp) and Jordan Usher (Turkey) are pursuing professional careers. Khalid Moore (Fordham) and Bubba Parham (Samford) elected to enter the transfer portal and pursue graduate transfer opportunities for their final season of eligibility.

• De-classification of scrimmages - Tech played a pair of closed scrimmages, at Vanderbilt and at home against Tulane. The Jackets defeated the Commodores, 80-76, while the Tulane scrimmage ended in an 88-all tie. Both scrimmages were played as 40-minute games. Tech shot the ball well in both games, combining to hit 52.9 percent from the floor (54-of-102), 44 percent from three-point range (22-of-50) and 80 percent from the foul line (40-of-50). The Jackets outrebounded both opponents and assisted on 32 of 54 made field goals, but accumulated 36 turnovers.

Early in Their Development

The 2021-22 season represented the most extensive college experience that most of the players on Georgia Tech's roster had accumulated. Of the 12 scholarship players who saw rotation minutes for Georgia Tech, only seniors Michael Devoe, Jordan Usher, Khalid Moore and Bubba Parham had extensive experience entering the season, and all have graduated.

Tech's top eight returning players combined to start 69 games last season - **Kyle Sturdivant** and **Rodney Howard** totalled 53 of those starts - after having started a total of 12 games previously.

Incoming transfers **Ja'von Franklin** and **Lance Terry** started 31 games each last season at South Alabama and Gardner-Webb, respectively. They represent the top two career scorers on the Yellow Jackets roster - Terry with 598 points and Franklin with 419. Sturdivant is next at 376.

Program Trends

• Less experienced - According to KenPom.com, Tech ranked No. 162 in the nation last season in experience (average 1.99 years per player) and No. 149 in minutes continuity (52.3 percent), a measure of playing minutes from 2020-21 carrying over to 2021-22. The Jackets were No. 4 (2.54 years) and 10 (75.2), respectively, in those categories the year before.

• Two fouls in the first half? No problem. Georgia Tech ranked No. 6 in the nation in two-foul participation (57.9 pct.), a measure of percentage of available minutes played by players with two fouls. Tech had ranked No. 4 or higher in this category each of the previous four years, and was No. 1 in 2020 and 2021. Tech was far and away the leader among major conference teams - the closest power conference team to the Yellow Jackets is Texas Tech (44th nationally at 36.8 pct.).

 Bench minutes - Josh Pastner expanded his rotation in the 2021-22 season, but the Jackets still ranked No. 239 in minutes played by its reserves (28.4 percent). Tech utilized nine or more players in most games last season (10 or more in eight games), and nine regulars averaged better than 10 minutes per game in ACC games. The national average was 30.7 percent.

• Size doesn't matter - Georgia Tech played taller over the 2020-21 season in terms of average overall height, ranking No. 78 in the nation at 77.6 inches, according to KenPom.com. Tech ranked No. 256 in its ACC championship season (76.3 inches), taller than only three power conference teams (Arizona State, Georgia and Penn State), and taller than only seven teams that played in the NCAA Tournament field.

Notable from 2021-22

• Dynamic duo - Georgia Tech seniors Michael Devoe and Jordan Usher accounted for 46.8 percent of the Yellow Jackets' scoring this season, and as the top two assist purveyors on the team, had a hand in 69.4 percent of Tech's field goals made. Those numbers for ACC games were similar (46.0, 70.4). In Tech's 12 wins, however, they accounted for just 43.4 percent of the Jackets' points; in Tech's five ACC wins: 42.1 percent.

• Grand theft basketball - The Jackets ranked No. 2 in the ACC in forcing turnovers against conference opponents (13.30 per game) and were No. 2 in steals (8.05). Tech's last 15 ACC foes (beginning Jan. 19 vs. Wake Forest) coughed it up 197 times (13.13 per game), 128 of them takeaways for Tech (8.53 per game).

• Ten lineups - Tech utilized 10 different starting lineups in 2021-22, and no Yellow Jacket started all 32 games. Tech's most frequent lineup has been the original one (Michael Devoe and Kyle Sturdivant at the guards, Jordan Usher and Khalid Moore at the forwards, Rodney Howard at center), which the Jackets used 18 times.

• Coming up short - Tech lost seven games by five points or fewer in 2021-22, five of them in conference play. Tech lost five other games against ACC foes (including Louisville in the ACC Tournament) by 10 points or fewer.

• Tech made great strides in its offensive efficiency under Josh Pastner in his first five seasons, ranking No. 22 nationally in 2020-21 at 113.7, easily its highest ranking under Pastner. The Jackets managed to exceed one point per possession in 22 of 26 games (Tech reached that benchmark 11 times in all of 2019-20). Tech scored over a point per possession in its final 10 games. The Jackets did so in just 11 of 32 games in 2021-22, and only against Boston College (twice), Florida State, Pittsburgh and Louisville in ACC play.

 Rookies rising - Tech's highly-regarded freshman class scored 100 points combined over Tech's last six games and totaled 340 minutes on the floor, their most extensive time as a group during the 2021-22 season. Deebo Coleman averaged 24 minutes per game in ACC play, while Miles Kelly averaged 23 minutes in the last six games and Jalon Moore 13.6.

• Three-bo - Kick-started by a strong game against

Clayton State on Jan. 23, Tech freshman Deebo Coleman has hit 22 of 55 shots (40 percent) from three-point range over Tech's last 15 games. That included a 0-for-6 game at Notre Dame.

• Rad Rodney - Center Rodney Howard put together his best basketball over the final stretch, scoring in double digits in six of Tech's last nine games and posting a pair of doubledoubles. He averaged 10.2 points (40-of-63, 63.5 pct. from the floor) and 6.3 rebounds, with 15 assists and five blocks.

• Sturdy Sturdivant - Kyle Sturdivant posted a 49:18 assist/turnover ratio over Tech's last 19 games and played nine of those games without committing a turnover. The junior guard also posted six double-digit scoring efforts over that stretch.

• Winning numbers - In Tech's 12 wins last season, the Yellow Jackets connected on 49.6 percent of their field goal attempts and 43.7 percent of their three-point tries. Tech also assisted on 59.8 percent of its field goals.

• No freebies - Tech attempted 106 fewer free throws than its opponents in 21 games against ACC teams last season was outscored at the stripe by 4.6 per game (Tech was called for 81 more fouls over 21 games). Even in the Yellow Jackets' five ACC wins, they attempted six fewer free throws than their foes and scored six fewer points at the stripe, while being called for 19 more fouls.

• Foul play - Tech committed more fouls than its opponent in 23 of 32 games last season (71.9 percent of the time). In Josh Pastner's first five seasons, the Jackets did so in 65 of 157 games (41.4 percent of the time).

• Breaking fast - Tech ranked No. 3 in the ACC in average tempo (68.1 possessions) and No. 5 average offensive possession length (17.4 seconds), No. 7 in average defensive possession length (17.8), according to KenPom.com.

• Deivon Smith missed Tech's last six games under concussion protocol after a fall late in the Pittsburgh game.

• Miles Kelly went 21-of-45 (46.7 pct.) from threepoint range in his last 12 games ... He was 5-for-30 for the season prior to the Clayton State game on Jan. 23.

Pastner's Key Metrics

• Assists to made field goals: The Jackets assisted on 17 of their 35 made field goals (48.6 pct.) against Clayton State. Its nightly goal is to assist on 60 percent of its made field goals, which Tech met nine times last season.

• Free throws made to opponents' attempts: Tech went 16-of-24 from the free throw line to Clayton State's 7-of-11. Tech's goal each night is to make more free throws than the opponent attempts, which the Jackets did five times last season. Tech finished last in the ACC in foul differential (minus-80) and free throw disparity (minus-103) in conference games, and were outscored from the free throw line by 4.6 points per game in conference play last season.

• Turnovers: Tech committed 11 turnovers to Clayton State's 13, meeting its target of 11 or fewer in a game. Tech met that goal 13 times last season. Tech won the turnover battle in 18 of 31 games last season (one tie), including 12 of the last 18 (the Jackets had 15 turnovers to BC's 14). Under Pastner, when Tech has committed fewer turnovers than its opponent, it is 49-35. When it has committed more, it is 42-51.

• Guard rebounding: Tech's perimeter players grabbed 22 of its 31 defensive rebounds against Clayton State. The Jackets' perimeter players took 77.1 percent of the total defensive rebounds last season.

Two-point (guard) conversion

Splitting the point guard duties nearly evenly in the wake of the departure of Jose Alvarado, Kyle Sturdivant and Deivon Smith combined to average 11.9 points and 3.8 assists over 32 games, while compiling a 121:80 assist/turnover ratio. Sturdivant started 28 games, while Smith started five.

They both started and played together for much of Tech's win over Charleston Southern in the absence of Michael Devoe, and have played together on some other occasions. Smith missed the last six games of the season under concussion protocols.

Sturdivant averaged more than 32 minutes in each of Tech's last six games in Smith's absence. He had played 30 or more minutes only twice before that.

Extending its Range

Georgia Tech has lived and succeeded by playing excellent defense during its six years under Josh Pastner, and also has steadily improved offensively over that time as the Yellow Jackets acquired more outside shooting prowess.

Tech has posted its highest two national rankings the last two seasons in both percentage of field goal attempts taken from beyond the three-point arc and in percentage of points scored on three-pointers.

Though he has expanded his bench to reflect the growing level of talent within the program, head coach Josh Pastner typically employs a tight playing rotation when conference play rolls around, reminiscent of the way Bobby Cremins coached the Yellow Jackets over his 19 seasons. But he expanded his rotation significantly in 2021-22 to accomodate a talented group of freshmen, who played more and more as the year progressed

Tech ranked No. 239 nationally in bench minutes (28.4 pct.), according to KenPom.com, up from 2020-21 season reflecting an expansion in the Jackets' rotation, consistently playing 8-to-10 players, with nine rotation players averaging more than 10 minutes per game in ACC play.

Also, Tech's bench contributed more points than that of its opponent in 18 of 32 games in 2021-22. The Jackets accomplished that just six times in 26 games the year before.

Tech's highest ranking in bench minutes under Josh Pastner came in 2017-18, when the Jackets ranked No. 89 at 33.5 percent. They have not ranked higher than No. 210 in any other year under Pastner.

Assisted Living

Georgia Tech coach Josh Pastner preached and prodded his Yellow Jackets on ball and player movement and hard cutting from the first time he got his team on the practice court. His primary measuring stick on how well the Jackets perform offensively is their ratio of assists to made field goals.

Tech has consistently been above the national average and maintained a high rate in ACC games. The Yellow Jackets finished the 2021-22 season ranked No. 122 at 53.1 percent, and was 10th in the ACC at 53.1 percent in conference games. The Jackets finished the 2020-21 season No. 53 nationally at 57.1 percent and held the second-highest mark in ACC games only (58.8 pct.).

Tech ranked No. 110 currently in adjusted defensive efficiency in 2021-22, according to KenPom.com, at 99.2 points per 100 possessions, its lowest standing under Pastner but still among the top third in the NCAA.

The major difference between last year's unit and the previous five Tech teams wass playing a small lineup the majority of the time and the absence of a rim-protector and shot blocker like the ones on the list below.

Building Depth

The upward progress of Georgia Tech's program is evident in the development of its recruiting classes under head coach Josh Pastner, each of whom has played significant minutes and made significant contributions on the ACC level. Though not highly-rated in terms of rankings, the players have a wide range of skills and have developed into consistent conference-level performers for the next couple of years.

Evidence of that is apparent in the fact that Pastner has consistently played eight to 10 players in his rotation during the 2021-22 season after generally keeping Tech's rotation to no more than seven or eight in his first five seasons. Eight Yellow Jackets averaged double-digit minutes in ACC play this season.

a. The 2017-18 class of Jose Alvarado, Evan Cole and Moses Wright combined to start 205 games (Cole graduated and transferred after the 2020-21 season). Alvarado and Wright started every game of the 2020-21 season (except for the NCAA Tournament game against Loyola which Wright missed) and were the Jackets' top two scorers and played the most minutes. Wright became Georgia Tech's first ACC Player of the Year since 1990, and Alvarado was named the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year.

b. The 2018-19 class of Michael Devoe, Khalid Moore and Kristian Sjolund combined to start 213 games (Sjolund redshirted before transferring to UTEP after the 2019-20 season). Devoe started 106 games over his four seasons, was the Jackets' No. 3 scorer in 2020-21 and No. 1 in 2021-22, was named the ACC Tournament MVP in 2021 and third-team All-ACC in 2021-22. Moore started 63 games in his career and was a key contributor in ways that don't always show up in the box score.

c. James Banks III, who transferred from Texas, and Jordan Usher, a transfer from Southern California, started 54 games, contributed 17.7 points, 12.0 rebounds and played 56.2 minutes per game in 2019-20. Banks moved on to play professionally and is in the G League with the Dallas Mavericks affiliate in Texas, while Usher started all but one game over two-plus seasons and was the Jackets' No. 2 scorer in 2021-22.

d. Next up - Tech's 2021 signing class of Deebo Coleman, Miles Kelly and Jalon Moore, a class ranked as high at No. 28 nationally, served notice as the core of the team the next few years, They combined to average 40 minutes and 8.3 points per game in 2021-22, They combined to connect on 39.1 percent of their three-point tries.

Five-Star Player Development

Notable player development successes over the past four seasons include Josh Okogie, Ben Lammers, Tadric Jackson, Abdoulaye Gueye, James Banks III, Jose Alvarado, Moses Wright and Michael Devoe, who maximized their skill sets and their production under the current coaching staff.

Josh Okogie went from being ranked 11th in the state as a HS senior to a first-round NBA draft pick. Gueye, a 6-9

forward, developed from a project player into an ACC-level contributor in the first two seasons with the current staff, and is now in his fourth season with the Minnesota Timberwolves. Graduate transfer Brandon Alston had similar statistical numbers at the ACC level as he compiled in two seasons at Lehigh, and is now playing professionally overseas.

James Banks III, a 6-10 center, made the ACC's All-Defensive team twice in two years and finished his career No. 8 in blocked shots at Tech. Wright blossomed at the end of the 2018-19 season and doubled his scoring and rebounding averages in 2019-20 over his sophomore year, doubled again his senior year and was named the ACC Player of the Year. Devoe added more than six points to his scoring average and ranked among the top five in the ACC in field goal and threepoint percentage.

Jose Alvarado, a three-star guard out of Brooklyn, N.Y., who started as a freshman, improved his scoring, shooting and ballhandling every year as a Yellow Jacket, finishing his career with 1,429 points and ranking among the top 10 in Tech history in assists, steals and three-point field goals. He became the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year and a second-team All-ACC choice in 2021, and is now on the roster of the NBA's New Orleans Pelicans.

Moses Wright, an unheralded and unrated prospect from Raleigh, N.C., became a stalwart in the Tech lineup as a junior and the ACC Player of the Year as a senior. The 6-9 forward was Tech's leading scorer and rebounder on an ACC Championship squad and also made the conference all-defensive team. He was signed to the Los Angeles Clippers G League affiliate as a free agent, then signed a two-way contract with the Dallas Mavericks midway through the 2021-22 season.

Michael Devoe, a four-star prospect out of Orlando, Fla., came to Tech as a heralded scorer and outside shooter, but developed into a much more rounded player by his senior year, when he led the Jackets in scoring and assists and was the team's third-leading rebounder and second-leading steal artist. He was one of only nine players in Division I to average 17.9 points, 4.9 rebounds, 3.1 assists and 1.4 steals. Devoe played in the L.A. Clippers' summer league team and went to training camp with its G League team.

Winning Starts at Home

Georgia Tech and head coach Josh Pastner have worked to make McCamish Pavilion a real homecourt advantage for the program, and the Yellow Jackets made a good start on that by setting a program record for wins at home (17) in 2017-18, including a 7-2 ACC record and two NIT victories.

Tech is 33-23 against ACC teams at home under Pastner, and that includes a 8-9 mark against ranked opponents.

Tech is 70-32 at McCamish Pavilion under Pastner, 113-62 since the building opened for the 2012-13 season.

Welcome to The Hank

Georgia Tech has played 10 seasons in McCamish Pavilion, which was essentially brand new when it opened for the 2012-13 season. The only physical elements of McCamish Pavilion that remain from the venerable Alexander Memorial Coliseum are the roof and the 32 steel ribs that support it.

The capacity of McCamish Pavilion is 8,600, including 1,665 seats in the new balcony level and 6,935 seats in the lower seating bowl. There are no suites, but there is a club area that seats 500. Alexander Memorial Coliseum seated 9,191 spectators in its final configuration.

The most impressive features of McCamish Pavilion are its grand entrance, which fronts 10th and Fowler Streets, the ability for patrons to view the court from the main concourse all the way around, and the theatrical lighting system, which concentrates light on the court while leaving the seating areas dark, modeled after the Staples Center in Los Angeles and Madison Square Garden in New York.

Tech played 55 seasons in Alexander Memorial Coliseum, compiling a record of 556-194 (.741). Miami was the last team to play Tech in Alexander Memorial Coliseum, a game Tech won, and was the first ACC team to play in McCamish Pavilion on Jan. 5, which Miami won. For the 2011-12 season, Tech played its home games at Philips Arena and the Arena at Gwinnett.

Three Tech Alumni on NBA Rosters

Since 1982, Georgia Tech has produced 19 first-round NBA draft picks and 46 draft picks overall. A total of 42 Georgia Tech alumni have played in the NBA.

Three former Georgia tech players opened the 2022-23 season on NBA rosters - Jose Alvarado in his second season with the New Orleans Pelicans, Josh Okogie in his first season with the Phoenix Suns after playing four years in Minnesota, and Thaddeus Young, a 15-year NBA veteran beginning his first full season with the Toronto Raptors.

Five former Georgia Tech basketball stars spent time on NBA rosters in 2021-22, but **Derrick Favors, a 12-year veteran**, was waived by the Houston Rockets prior to the season after being traded from Oklahoma City, and Moses Wright, who was on the Dallas Mavericks roster last season, signed a contract to play in China.

Two other former Yellow Jackets are in training camp with G League teams. Former center James Banks III is a member of the Texas Legends, the Mavericks' affiliate. while Michael Devoe, who graduated from Tech last spring, is in camp with the Ontario (Calif.) Clippers.

Arts and Letters

Beginning with Moe Miller and Lance Storrs in the summer of 2011, every four-year senior in the Georgia Tech program has graduated, with the exception 2019 senior Ben Lammers, who is playing pro ball overseas and needs to complete one course, and 2021 senior Jose Alvarado, who likewise needs to complete one course

Eleven different Georgia Tech players have made the ACC All-Academic team since it was established in 2011, with Marcus Georges-Hunt and Tadric Jackson making it twice.

Tech's men's basketball team has recorded the highest Academic Progress Report scores the last five years since the NCAA began tracking academic performance in 2004-05. The Jackets scored a perfect team single year APR score of 1000 three straight years from 2011-13.

Tech's NCAA Tournament History

Georgia Tech has played in the NCAA Tournament 17 times in its history. Sixteen of those appearances have occurred from 1985 to the present, 10 under Bobby Cremins and five under Paul Hewitt.

The most recent was 2021, when the Yellow Jackets won the ACC Championship and earned an automatic bid, then fell 71-60 to Loyola Chicago in the opening round of the Midwest Regional.

That ended an 11-year hiatus from the NCAA Tournament that dated back to 2010, when the Yellow Jackets defeated Oklahoma State in the first round before losing to Ohio State in the round of 32 of the Midwest Regional.

Tech has a record of 23-17 in NCAA Tournament play, highlighted by its 2004 trip to the NCAA title game as well as a Final Four berth in 1990. The Yellow Jackets have reached the NCAA Sweet 16 seven times (1960, 1985, 1986, 1990, 1992, 1996, 2004).

The 2004 and 2005 appearances were Tech's' first back-to-back appearances since Bobby Cremins led the Institute to the Big Dance nine straight years from 1985-93.

Georgia Tech has won at least one game in 11 of its 17 previous NCAA Tournament appearances.

Tech's ACC Tournament History

Georgia Tech has played in 42 ACC Tournaments, and has a 28-38 all-time record in the event. The Yellow Jackets have won four championships, in 1985 (Atlanta), 1990 (Charlotte), 1993 (Charlotte) and 2021 (Greensboro).

Tech has been a runner-up four times (1986, 1996, 2005, 2010). The 1986, 1996 and 2010 runs to the finals occurred in Greensboro. Tech also made the finals in 2005 at the Verizon Center in Washington, D.C.

Tech was 0-2 in the ACC Tournament under coach Dwane Morrison, 15-16 under Bobby Cremins (including all three titles), 9-11 under Paul Hewitt (runner-up in 2005 and 2010), 2-5 under Brian Gregory. and 1-3 under Josh Pastner.

Tech did not play in the 2020 tournament while serving an NCAA postseason ban.

Media Guidelines

The Yellow Jackets' student-athletes and coaches are generally available to the media prior to each game during the season, typically before a practice. The practice schedule varies once the season begins, and media sessions will be scheduled and announced weekly.

Georgia Tech's practices are closed to the public and the media.

Interview requests with student-athletes that need to be conducted at other times must be made through Mike Stamus in the communications office at least 24 hours in advance. These interviews will be scheduled around the student-athletes' availability and class schedule.

Media are asked not to contact student-athletes directly either by phone, text, social media or e-mail; they are instructed to refer media to the communications office. Every effort will be made to make players available when requested. Players are not available on game days until after the game.

Interviewing Coach Pastner

Media wishing to speak with Coach Pastner at times other than scheduled media availabilities must notify Mike Stamus in the communications office in advance to make or confirm arrangements. He also is available each Monday on the ACC Teleconference.

Post-Game Protocol

Post-game press conferences for home games will be held in person in the Shah Media Room across from the press box on the upper concourse of McCamish Pavilion.

Georgia Tech head coach and selected players will appear in the room following a cooling off period. the visiting team's head coach will also appear if that institution chooses to. If not, the visiting team coach will conduct his press conference virtually, and links will be provided to the media.

Josh Pastner Radio Show

Head coach Josh Pastner's weekly radio show airs each Monday from 7-8 p.m. on "680 the Fan" and 93.7 FM, beginning in December.

ACC Coaches Weekly Teleconference

The 15 ACC head basketball coaches will be featured on weekly Monday virtual teleconferences during the 2022-23 season, beginning Jan. 9 and continuing through the last Monday in February. Each coach will have 10 minutes to make an opening statement and answer questions. There will be an instant replay of each teleconference on the Conference's internet site TheACC. com each Monday afternoon.

Coaches whose teams play on Monday in January and February are not required to participate in that day's call. Coaches who do not have a Monday game - Georgia Tech is one - will be on every Monday at the same time. The teleconference schedule for each Monday will differ for the other head coaches, depending on what teams play that Monday night.

BIO UPDATES

Head Coach Josh Pastner • 7th season at Tech

A fter leading Memphis to five post-season berths in seven seasons as the Tigers' head coach, Josh Pastner became Georgia Tech's 14th head basketball coach on April 8, 2016 and within a five-year period, returned the Yellow Jackets to the NCAA Tournament and coached the program to its first Atlantic Coast Conference championship in 28 years.

Implementing a high-energy style of play and creative offensive and defensive schemes, and building the Jackets' talent base for the future, Pastner has established the Yellow Jackets as one of the top defensive teams in the nation year-in and year-out, while he and his staff have steadily improved the team's offense to be ranked in the top half of the ACC. Those efforts, as well as improving efforts in recruiting, produced Georgia Tech's first ACC Championship since 1993 and its first berth in the NCAA Tournament in 11 years in the 2020-21 season.

Pastner has tirelessly promoted the program on campus and throughout the city of Atlanta in an effort to re-create the major homecourt atmosphere that surrounded the Yellow Jackets throughout the 1980s, 1990s and into the middle of the 2000s. The result has been numerous wins, high excitement and 13 sellouts in four pre-pandemic seasons at McCamish Pavilion, and a school-record 11 consecutive home ACC wins over the 2019-20 and 2020-21 seasons.

Six of his players – guards Josh Okogie, Jose Alvarado and Michael Devoe, as well as frontcourt players Ben Lammers, James Banks III and Moses Wright – have earned ACC honors during his tenure. Wright was named the ACC Player of the Year, Tech's first since 1990, and Alvarado the ACC's Defensive Player of the Year in the 2020-21 season. Okogie, in particular, developed from an under-the-radar high school prospect into a highly-regarded NBA prospect, having played three years in the league, while Lammers and Banks have gone on to play professionally overseas. Alvarado and Wright, though undrafted following their senior seasons, wound up on NBA rosters in the 2021-22 season.

In his fifth year at the helm in 2020-21, Pastner guided Georgia Tech to the ACC Championship, the Yellow Jackets' first since 1993, and a berth in the NCAA Tournament, the first since 2010. The Jackets also earned their highest regular-season ACC finish and tournament seed (4th for both) since the program's national-runner-up team in 2004. Tech's 17-9 overall record was its best by winning percentage since 2004, and its 11-6 ACC record was the fourth-highest by winning percentage in the program's 42-year history in the conference. Tech achieved its highest rankings under Pastner in such categories as offensive efficiency, scoring, field goal percentage, three-point percentage and fewest turnovers, while maintaining its high level of play on the defensive end of the court.

That came on the heels of a successful 2019-20 campaign, in which the Yellow Jackets posted a 17-14 record, winning nine of its last 12 games, including six of the last seven. Tech finished with the program's first winning ACC record since 2004, its highest ACC finish since 2005 (fifth) and its most conference victories (11-9 record) since 1996.

Pastner, 45, compiled a 167-73 record over seven seasons as the head coach at Memphis, where the Tigers earned bids to the NCAA Tournament four times. Pastner's Memphis teams averaged 23.9 wins per season and compiled a conference regular-season record of 82-36, including a conference winning streak of 28 games. The Tigers went 11-4 in Conference USA and American Athletic Conference tournaments, including three championships.

He guided Memphis to five post-season berths, the NIT in 2010 and the NCAA Tournament in 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014. Pastner twice won Conference USA Coach of the Year honors (2010, 2013) by various organizations and news media.

Pastner was born in Glen Dale, W.Va., and grew up in Kingwood, Texas. He earned his bachelor's degree in family studies in December of 1998, in just two and a half years, from Arizona and his master's degree in teaching and teacher education from Arizona in December of 1999, all while lettering four years in basketball under head coach Lute Olson.

He married the former Kerri Lamas of Sierra Vista, Ariz., in 2009. He has a stepson (Ethan), three daughters, Payten, Kamryn and Harper, and a newborn son, Cason.

ANTHONY WILKINS Associate Head Coach • 5th season at Tech

Anthony Wilkins, an Atlanta native who spent the past five seasons on the coaching staff at Tulane University, joined Georgia Tech's basketball staff in June of 2018.

Wilkins, 43, served as an assistant coach for four seasons at Tulane after serving as director of basketball operations during his first year with the Green Wave. At Tulane, Wilkins handled game strategy and scout prep responsibilities along with player development and recruiting duties. He also had six years of professional playing experience prior to entering the coaching world.

Focusing his on-court efforts with Tech's offense, the Yellow Jackets have made significant strides in his three seasons on The Flats, helping elevate the Jackets into the top half of the ACC in scoring, field goal percentage, three-point shooting and ballhandling. In 2020-21, Tech achieved its highest national ranking on offensive efficiency (23rd according to KenPom. com), and its highest ACC rankings in scoring (6th), field goal percentage (2nd), three-point percentage (3rd) and fewest turnoves (3rd). He helped develop Tech's guard tandem of Jose Alvarado and Michael Devoe into two of the ACC's top 10 scorers, and is credited with developing the perimeter skills of Moses Wright, the ACC Player of the year in 2021.

JULIAN SWARTZ Assistant Coach • 7th season at Tech

A 21-year coaching veteran, including 13 years on the NCAA Division I level, Julian Swartz was named an assistant coach on Josh Pastner's staff in August of 2018.

Swartz, 43, is responsible for on-court development of Tech players and focuses his efforts on the Yellow Jackets' defensive schemes as well as handle recruiting responsibilities. He helped guide Tech's defense to a national ranking of No. 37 in efficiency in 2018-19 and No. 17 in 2019-20, according to KenPom. com, and the Yellow Jackets also ranked among the top 15 in effective field goal percentage and three-point defense. In 2020-21, Tech used its trademark defenses in a completely different way, becoming the top team in the ACC and one of the best in the nation in forcing turnovers and steals to boost its offense.

Swartz's recruiting efforts have been central to the Jackets' last two recruiting classes, and he has been ranked No. 6 among college basketball recruiters by 247Sports. Tech's 2021 class of guards Dallan "Deebo" Coleman and Miles Kelly and forward Jalon Moore was ranked the 15th-best in the nation.

BRIAN ESKILDSEN Assistant Coach • 1st season at Tech

Brian Eskildsen, who helped Harvard to three Ivy League championships, a trip to the NCAA tournament in 2015 and NIT berths in 2018 and 2019, joined Georgia Tech's men's basketball staff as assistant coach in June, 2022.

A 13-year veteran in Division I basketball, Eskildsen has spent his entire career working at high-level academic institutions that enjoyed success, including Rice and Stanford before landing at Harvard.

Eskildsen, 34, spent eight seasons at the lvy League institution under head coach Tommy Amaker, helping the Crimson capture conference championships in 2015, 2018 and 2019. Harvard was in position to win another Ancient Eight title and a potential NCAA Tournament bid in 2020, compiling a 21-8 record and a runner-up finish in the lvy regular season before COVID-19 abruptly ended that season.

During his time in Cambridge, eight Harvard players earned All-lvy League recognition, three of them more than once, and the Crimson scored power conference wins over Auburn, Brigham Young, California, Georgetown and Texas A&M. Harvard averaged nearly 18 wins per season (not counting the cancelled 2020-21 season), winning 18 or more games five times and winning 10 or more lvy games five times.
