Finished the season strong, going 6-3 over final 10 matches... Combined with teammates to go 16-12 overall in doubles matches, including a 12-7 dual doubles record... Was 8-2 in doubles play against ACC opponents... Played at No. 2 and No. 3 doubles positions, posting a 10-2 record from No. 3... Partnered with Scarlett Nicholson to go 7-1 in doubles, including a 5-1 mark against league opponents... 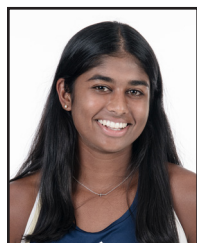

Georgia Tech hired Rodney Harmon July 3, 2012, as the seventh head women's tennis coach in school history. Harmon has gone 210-111 over the past 12 seasons as the head coach of the Yellow Jackets.

Georgia Tech compiled a 14-10 overall record in 2024 and reached the NCAA Tournament for the 24th consecutive year, advancing to the second round. The Yellow Jackets defeated Illinois in first round action before dropping a heartbreaker to No. 9 Texas, 4-3, in second round action. Carol Lee and Kate Sharabura earned all-ACC accolades, and represented Tech in the NCAA Singles (Lee) and Doubles Championship.

The Yellow Jackets went 16-10 in 2023 and earned their 23rd consecutive NCAA Tournament berth after reaching semifinals of the ACC Championship. Earning the No. 7 seed in the ACC Tournament, Tech swept Syracuse in the first round to meet No. 6 Duke in the quarterfinals. Behind wins from Carol Lee, Alejandra Cruz and a match-clinching win from Kylie Bilchev, the Jackets knocked off the Blue Devils, 4-3. The Jackets were selected to the Gainesville Regional for the NCAA Tournament and cruised to a 4-1 victory over No. 37 UCF before falling to host and No. 16 Florida, 4-1. Bilchev and Lee both earned at-large bids to the NCAA Singles Championship with Lee advancing to the quarterfinals to earn All-American recognition. Both Bilchev and Lee also picked up all-ACC accolades.

Georgia Tech made its 22nd consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance in 2022, earning an at-large bid to the tournament. Tech made the short trip to Auburn, Ala., for the first two rounds, defeating Memphis, 4-1, before falling narrowly to No. 14 Auburn, 4-3. Four Yellow Jackets - Carol Lee & Kate Sharabura and Kylie Bilchev & Ava Hrastar - earned individual bids to the NCAA Doubles Tournament. Bilchev and Hrastar made a run to the quarterfinals to earn All-American status after defeating two nationally-ranked opponents. Lee and Sharabura also earned All-American status, finishing the season ranked No. 5 nationally after earning the No. 4 seed in the NCAA Championship. All four Jackets earned all-ACC honors, led by first-team selection Lee. Tech finished the season at 15-11 overall and 8-5 in ACC play.

During the spring 2021 season, Harmon guided the Jackets to their 21st NCAA Tournament postseason appearance as Tech made a run to the round of 16 for the 11th time in program history. Tech finished the season ranked No. 10 in the final Oracle/ITA National Rankings after climbing as high as No. 6 during the season. Seniors Kenya Jones and Victoria Flores were named ITA All-Americans in both singles and doubles as the pair combined to rise as high as No. 1 in ITA doubles national rankings during the season. Tech was represented by both Jones and Flores in the NCAA Championship in singles action and had two doubles teams - Jones/Flores and Gia Cohen/Ava Hrastar - earn at-large bids into the doubles field. Both Jones and Flores picked up all-ACC honors as Jones was named to the first team and Flores the second team.

In ACC action, the Jackets earned the No. 6 -seed into the ACC Tournament and defeated three foes en route to making its seventh appearance in the title match. Freshman Carol Lee proved victorious against the Tar Heels, but Tech fell in the championship match, 4-1. After defeating South Carolina and Duke in ITA Kick-Off Weekend action, Tech secured a spot in the ITA National Team Indoor Championships in Stillwater, Okla. Tech finished the season with a 20-11 overall record and went 8-5 against ACC opponents.

Off the court, Tech capped the season collecting a trio of academic honors as freshman Hrastar was named to the All-ACC Academic Team, five Jackets were named ITA Scholar-Athletes and the program was tabbed an ITA All-Academic Team. Flores collected a pair of prestigious awards for her outstanding efforts off the court as the senior received the ITA Ann Lebedeff Leadership Award and was named the ITA Southeast Regional Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award winner.

Harmon led the Yellow Jackets to a fifth place finish in the ACC during a shortened 2019-20 season due to Covid-19. Tech posted a 15-6 overall record and went 5-2 in league play before seasons were suspended due to the pandemic. During the 2020 season, the Jackets captured the ITA Kick-Off Weekend at South Carolina, defeating Wisconsin and USC to claim a spot in the ITA National Team Indoor Championships in February. Tech's No. 1 doubles duo of Kenya Jones and Victoria Flores were tabbed ITA All-Americans at the conclusion of the season. Jones and Flores went 20-2 overall, including a 15-1 dual record and 6-0 ACC ledger, and climbed as high as No. 6 in the ITA national polls. Additionally, Jones earned ITA All-America status in singles after

leading the Jackets from the top singles spot, compiling a 17-9 overall record. Tabbed ACC Player of the Week three times during the season, Jones rose to No. 20 nationally in singles.

In 2018-19, the Yellow Jackets recorded their 20th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. Tech defeated No. 25 Ohio State in the round of 64, 4-3, before the Jackets fell to No. 8 Vanderbilt in the round of 32. Junior Kenya Jones was tabbed ITA All-American after going 29-12 overall from the No. 1 singles position. Jones rose as high as No. 8 in the national rankings and finished the campaign ranked No. 15. Additionally, Jones was tabbed all-ACC first team.

The 2017-18 women's tennis season was one for the record books as the Yellow Jackets recorded just the second trip in program history to the NCAA Semifinals. The Jackets capped the year with a 25-6 overall record and 12-2 ACC ledger, reaching the semifinals of the ACC Tournament. Tech climbed as high as No. 2 in the national rankings during the season and boasted the No. 1 doubles team in the country, Paige Hourigan and Kenya Jones, for several weeks on the national polls. Three Jackets collected all-ACC honors at the end of the season: Hourigan (first team), Jones (second team) and Johnnie Renaud (third team). Hourigan and Jones also earned the ACC's automatic berth into the NCAA Championships as a doubles tandem. The pair, who were tabbed ITA All-Americans, reached the NCAA quarterfinals after helping the team advance to the semifinals.

After earning their 19th consecutive NCAA Tournament berth, the Jackets defeated Eastern Kentucky and Winthrop in the NCAA Regional to reach the round of 16 where they recorded a comeback win over Pepperdine to clinch a spot in the Elite Eight. In the quarterfinals, Tech posted another comeback win over No. 14 UCLA. After trailing the Bruins, 3-1, Nami Otsuka, Hourigan and Ida Jarlskog lifted the Jackets past the Bruins, 4-3, to the semifinals. Tech fell in the NCAA Semifinals to top-seeded and No. 2 Vanderbilt, 4-2.

In 2016-17, Harmon led the Jackets to a remarkable ledger of 27-5. Tech claimed a share of the ACC regular season championship, going 13-1 in league play and remained undefeated against league opponents until the final match of the regular season. On April 29, the Jackets avenged their only ACC loss of the season at Duke, with a 4-2 win over the Blue Devils in the ACC Championship semifinals. With the win, Tech made its sixth appearance in the ACC Championship match since 1986, but dropped a heartbreaker to UNC, 4-3. Four Jackets earned ACC recognition as Rasheeda McAdoo and Jonnie Renaud were named All-ACC first team, Paige Hourigan was tabbed All-ACC second team and freshman Nami Otsuka was listed on the All-ACC third team. For the second consecutive season, Harmon was named the ACC Coach of the Year. Additionally, Harmon was tabbed the 2017 Wilson/ITA Southeast Region Coach of the Year,

becoming the second coach in program history to earn the honor.

Tech continued its postseason success in 2017, making its 18th straight NCAA Tournament appearance and hosted the first- and second-rounds at the Ken Byers Tennis Complex. The Jackets upended Alabama State and Northwestern to reach the Sweet 16 for the second straight year before falling to Oklahoma State in the Round of 16 in Athens. McAdoo and Renaud both earned individual NCAA singles bids in addition to earning a doubles bid to the NCAA Championships. The Tech duo of Hourigan/Kenya Jones also received a doubles bid and advanced to the second round. At the conclusion of the season, Harmon was named the Wilson/ITA Southeast Region Coach of the Year.

In his fourth season on The Flats, Harmon led the Jackets to a 19-9 overall record and 11-3 ACC ledger. Tech reached the semifinals of the ACC tournament, falling to Miami, but rebounded, earning an at-large bid into the NCAA Tournament for the 17th consecutive season. By way of winning the Columbia, S.C. regional, Tech advanced to the round of 16 in Tulsa, Oklahoma where they fell to Ohio State. Harmon was named the ACC Coach of the Year, while Johnnise Renaud was tabbed All-ACC first team and Paige Hourigan was named All-ACC third team. Renaud and Hourigan each earned NCAA singles bids, while the pair of Kendal Woodard/Hourigan earned a doubles bid as well.

During his third season on the Flats, Harmon led his team to a 17-10 overall record and a 9-5 mark in ACC play. The Yellow Jackets made their 16th consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament, advancing to the second round, and finished the season ranked #20 in the ITA Rankings. During the ACC Tournament, the Jackets advanced to their fifth ACC Championship Title Match before falling to Virginia. Georgia Tech finished the ACC season in sixth and both freshmen Johnnise Renaud and Paige Hourigan were named to the All-ACC Second Team.

Harmon's second season at the helm of the Yellow Jackets started off with a bang after sophomores Megan Kurey and Kendal Woodard won the USTA/ITA National Indoor Intercollegiate Championships doubles title. The duo also captured the USTA/ITA Southeast Regional Doubles title during the fall. Kurey and Woodard were ranked as the number one doubles team in the country on February 11, 2014 and received the #6 seed in the 2014 NCAA doubles championships. Woodard garnered conference honors for the second season in a row after being named to the All-ACC First Team while Kurey was named to the All-ACC Second Team.

The Yellow Jackets went 14-10 overall and 9-5 in the ACC during Harmon's second year at the helm of the Jackets. Tech closed out the 2014 regular season with an exciting 4-3 win against No. 1 Duke. The win against the top-ranked team in the country

was the first of Harmon's career and fourth in the history of the Yellow Jackets. The Jackets received the six seed in the 2014 ACC Tournament and advanced to the quarter finals before falling to Virginia.

In 2014, Tech received its 15th straight berth in the NCAA Tournament. The Yellow Jackets defeated Purdue in the first round, 4-0, before falling to overall nine seed Vanderbilt, 4-2, in the second round.

Harmon had quite the successful first season on the Flats, leading his team to a 15-10 record and a 7-4 mark in the ACC. The Jackets reached its highest ranking of the season in the ITA rankings at #19 during the week of April 9th. Tech defeated nine ranked teams, including four that were ranked in the top-25. Freshman Kendal Woodard was honored on the 2013 All-ACC Women's Tennis Team while Elizabeth Kilborn, Megan Kurey and Elizabeth Kurey were all named to the All-ACC Academic team during Harmon's first year.

Harmon brings 25 years of player development to the Yellow Jackets with prior experience in both junior and college tennis. Most recently he served as the director of tennis at the Deerwood Country Club in Jacksonville, Fla.

Harmon was the men's tennis head coach at the University of Miami from 1995 until 1997 where he brought in the No. 1 recruiting class in 1996, led by No. 1 recruit Michael Russell. Harmon was the 1996 and 1997 Big East Conference Coach of the Year during his time with the Hurricanes.

Harmon left the Hurricanes to re-join the United States Tennis Association training center headquarters in Boca Raton, Fla., where he advanced to director of men's tennis. During his tenure at the USTA, Harmon served as the head coach of the U.S. men's tennis team at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China.

Before joining Miami, Harmon spent four years as the USTA national coach where he coached future pros including Todd Martin, MaliVai Washington and Alex O'Brien. During his first stint with the USTA, Harmon served as the U.S. men's tennis head coach at the 1993 World University Games in Buffalo, N.Y.

Harmon began his collegiate career at the University of Tennessee before transferring to Southern Methodist University where he graduated from with a Bachelor of Arts in Broadcast/Film in May, 1983. He was the 1980 NCAA Doubles champion at Tennessee with Mel Purcell and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Singles Championship. Harmon and Purcell were the 1980 ITA Doubles Team of the Year and Harmon won the SEC No. 2 singles title.

After transferring to SMU, Harmon won the 1982 and 1983 Southwest Conference No. 1 singles title. He was inducted into the ITA Collegiate Tennis Hall of Fame in 2010.

Georgia Tech alumnus, Austin Roebuck, returned to The Flats as associate head coach for the women's tennis program in June 2024. Roebuck served as assistant coach at Indiana for the last three seasons.

"I am really excited Austin is coming back to join our coaching staff as associate head coach," said Harmon. "He did such a great job as our volunteer coach and gained valuable experience as an assistant coach at Indiana for the past three years."

"I couldn't be more excited to be back at Georgia Tech and in the ACC," Roebuck said. "I've had so many great experiences here as a player and coach, and I am incredibly thankful to Rodney [Harmon] for the opportunity to work together again at my alma mater. Go Jackets!"

In three seasons at Indiana (2021-24), Roebuck helped the Hoosiers regain national exposure with the program's first top 75 national ranking since 2019. He helped mentor Lara Schneider to back-to-back all-Big Ten selections after producing consecutive winning seasons on the courts. Schneider was also part of the doubles team with Laura Masic that captured the 2022 ITA Ohio Valley Regional Championship to clinch a spot in the ITA National Fall Championships. As a pair, Schneider and Masic climbed as high as No. 22 in the national ITA doubles rankings.

Prior to his stint at Indiana, Roebuck served as the volunteer assistant coach at Georgia Tech for two seasons (2019-21). During the two seasons, Georgia Tech remained a top 12 program nationally, clinched a pair of berths to the National Team Indoor Championships, reached the ACC Tournament championship match (2021) and advanced to the NCAA Championships round of 16 (2021). With several successes on the courts, Roebuck worked primarily with the doubles team of Kenya Jones and Victoria Flores, who reached the No. 1 ranking in the country in 2021.

Roebuck spent the 2019 spring season as the volunteer assistant coach for the men's and women's tennis programs at Kennesaw State. At KSU, he helped develop practice plans, served as an on-court coach for home dual matches, provided statistical analysis on matches and assisted with travel logistics.

He also previously worked at ATI Tennis Academy as the managing partner and director and served as a USTA team coach.

A four-year letterwinner for Georgia Tech men's tennis, Roebuck played under head coach Kenny Thorne from 2006-10. He earned a bachelor's degree in business administration with a concentration in general management from Georgia Tech in May 2012.

J Batt was named the 10th full-time director of athletics in Georgia Tech history on Oct. 14, 2022 and officially took the reins of Tech athletics 10 days later, on Oct. 24, 2022.

In less than two years under Batt's leadership, Georgia Tech athletics' impressive achievements include:

- the highly regarded hires of Georgia Tech alumnus Brent Key as the 21st head coach in Tech football history and former All-American and NBA All-Star Damon Stoudamire as the 15th men's basketball head coach in school history;
- a historic multi-decade partnership with Hyundai, which will provide transformative revenue for Tech athletics, both in the present and for years to come;
- two ultra-successful Competitive Drive Initiatives, a pair of two-month fundraising initiatives at the end of 2022 and 2023, both of which shattered their goals in terms of total donors and funds raised and, with matching gifts from the Georgia Tech Foundation, produced a total impact of more than \$15 million for Tech student-athletes.

Tech also took a big step towards re-establishing itself as one of college athletics' premier programs in Batt's first full year as the Yellow Jackets' athletics director in 2023-24. Fourteen of seventeen teams earned a spot in postseason competitions, highlighted by football (which earned its first bowl win since 2016 with a 30-17 victory over Central Florida in the Gasparilla Bowl), golf (which made its second-straight NCAA semifinals appearance) and volleyball (which advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16). Other highlights included thrilling football wins over nationally ranked Miami (Fla.) and North Carolina and men's basketball victories over Duke, North Carolina, Clemson and Mississippi State.

In the classroom, Georgia Tech's student-athletes continued to excel academically in 2023-24, highlighted by setting an all-time high for the third-straight year with a 92% NCAA Graduation Success Rate and posting the highest mean grade point average in Tech Athletics history with a 3.25 in the spring 2024 semester.

Batt came to The Flats after serving as executive deputy director of athletics, chief operating officer and chief revenue officer at Alabama for five years (2017-22). He joined Alabama athletics' administration as senior associate athletics director, was promoted to COO and senior deputy athletic director in 2021 and to executive deputy director, COO and chief revenue officer in 2022.

At Alabama, he was responsible for guiding revenue generating, including charitable giving, ticketing, Tide Pride, and other revenue sources. Batt oversaw the successful development, implementation, and launch of the Crimson Standard, Alabama Athletics' 10-year, \$600 million capital initiative. He also provided day-to-day leadership of the department as a member of the Athletics executive team and served as the sport administrator for men's basketball.

Widely regarded as one of college athletics' top fundraisers, Batt served as senior associate athletic director and executive director of the Pirate Club at East Carolina from 2013 to 2017. As a member of the ECU athletics executive leadership team, Batt oversaw a development operation that increased total fundraising in 2016 by more than 60% over ECU's previous best year.

He also served as associate A.D. and executive director of Maryland's Terrapin Club from 2011 to 2013. He joined the Terrapin Club staff in 2009 before being promoted to executive director beginning in 2011.

Before his four-year tenure at Maryland, Batt held positions in athletics fundraising at James Madison, William & Mary and his alma mater, North Carolina.

A member of the Tar Heels' 2001 NCAA champion men's soccer team, Batt earned both a bachelor's degree in journalism and mass communications and a master's degree in sports administration from UNC.

Batt and his wife, Leah, have two sons: Fitz and Graham.

Ángel Cabrera is the 12th president of the Georgia Institute of Technology, one of America's leading research universities, serving nearly 48,000 students and conducting more than \$1.4 billion in annual sponsored research.

Since Cabrera's arrival in the fall of 2019, enrollment grew to an all-time high, applications broke Institute and state levels, and the undergraduate program became the third most-selective among public universities. Offering best-in-class graduation rates and career outcomes, coupled with lower tuition and fees than most other leading research universities, Georgia Tech is consistently recognized for offering one of the best returns on investment for students.

Georgia Tech's research enterprise has also experienced considerable growth since 2019. With more than \$1.2 billion in annual research expenditures, the Institute ranks among the top 20 most research-intensive universities in the nation and is No. 1 among institutions without a medical school.

Georgia Tech's unprecedented growth stems from a 10-year strategic plan that was developed under Cabrera's leadership with the participation of more than 5,700 members of the Institute community and adopted in November 2020. In the plan, titled "Progress and Service for All," Georgia Tech pledges to amplify its impact and lead by example in a mission to develop leaders who advance technology and improve the human condition. During Cabrera's presidency, Georgia Tech has continued to build on two decades of progress in transforming the neighborhoods surrounding its campus into thriving hubs of innovation and entrepreneurship. In 2023, the third and final phase of Tech Square broke ground with the construction of the George and Scheller Towers, and Science Square Labs was completed in 2024 — the first phase of a new district on Atlanta's westside dedicated to medical technology research and innovation.

Cabrera came to Georgia Tech after serving for seven years as president of George Mason University (GMU) in Virginia. During his presidency, GMU joined the top tier of research universities in the Carnegie Classification, became the largest and fastest-growing institution in the state, launched numerous academic and research programs, and established a campus in South Korea. Before GMU, Cabrera was president of the Thunderbird School of Global Management, now part of Arizona State University, and dean of IE Business School in Madrid.

Cabrera has been named a "Young Global Leader" by the World Economic Forum, a "Star of Europe" by Bloomberg Businessweek, a "Henry Crown Fellow" by the Aspen Institute, and a "Great Immigrant" by the Carnegie Corporation of New York. He has received honorary degrees from Miami Dade College and Universidad Politécnica de Madrid.

Cabrera serves on the boards of the National Geographic Society, Harvard College Visiting Committee, Atlanta Committee for Progress, Metro Atlanta Chamber, and Bankinter Innovation Foundation in Spain. He has served on the board of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, the advisory boards of Instituto Tecnológico de Monterrey and Georgia Tech (which he chaired), and the boards of three public companies.

Cabrera earned his M.S. and Ph.D. in psychology and cognitive science from Georgia Tech, which he attended as a Fulbright Scholar. He also holds a B.S. and an M.S. in computer and electrical engineering from Universidad Politécnica de Madrid. His academic publications have been cited thousands of times.

He is married to management scholar and Georgia Tech classmate, Elizabeth. Their son, Alex, is a graduate of Georgia Tech and Carnegie Mellon University, and their daughter, Emilia, is a graduate of Harvard University. Cabrera is the first native of Spain to serve as president of an American university.

President Ángel Cabrera named Jenna Jordan, associate professor and associate chair in the Sam Nunn School of International Affairs, as faculty athletics representative (FAR) to the Georgia Tech Athletic Association (GTAA) in May 2022.

The FAR serves as the liaison between the Institute and the Athletic Association on issues regarding rules compliance activities, new developments at the NCAA, and activities related to Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) membership. This is a part-time administrative position appointed for a term of three years.

"Professor Jordan is not just an accomplished scholar but an exemplary educator who cares deeply about the growth and well-being of our students," said Cabrera. "She has made a difference these past years as a faculty guide with the Stamps President's Scholars, and I have no doubt she will have a similar impact in supporting the academic experience of our student-athletes and serving as an effective liaison between our faculty and our athletic program."

Jordan has been a Georgia Tech faculty member since 2012. Her research focuses on terrorism and political violence, international security, cybersecurity, wargaming, organizational theory, and statecraft. Her work has been published by Stanford University Press and in International Security, Security Studies, Conflict Management and Peace Science, Journal of Cybersecurity, and International Trends as well as The New York Times, The Atlantic, Chicago Tribune, Foreign Policy, and The Washington Quarterly. She holds a Ph.D. in political science from the University of Chicago, an M.A. in political science from Stanford University, and a B.A. in international relations from Mills College.

"Serving as faculty athletics representative is a unique opportunity to address the challenges facing student-athletes, and I am excited to be able to help guide their experience at Georgia Tech," she said. "I recognize the importance of building bridges across the Institute, and I hope to create new opportunities to facilitate meaningful student-athlete interaction, continuing the efforts of my FAR predecessors who fiercely advocated for and mentored our student-athletes. And I will continue to foster a culture of mentorship and support among the faculty and our student-athletes."

GEORGIA TECH WINS NCAA WOMEN'S TENNIS TITLE

Jackets Defeat UCLA 4-2 in Championship Match

Athens, Ga. -- Kristi Miller, Amanda McDowell and Christy Striplin won singles matches and then senior Alison Silverio provided the clinching victory at No. 2 singles to give Georgia Tech a 4-2 victory over UCLA in the NCAA championship match Tuesday at Henry Feild Stadium. The championship is the first NCAA title in any sport for Georgia Tech, which has also won four national championships in football via wire service polls.

"I just couldn't be happier," said Tech head coach Bryan Shelton, whose team won its 21st straight match to finish the season at 29-4. "We fought our tails off. For Ali (Silverio) to come through in the clutch one more time for us in the final match of her career is just unbelievable."

Tech fell behind by losing the doubles point and then trailed 2-1 before Miller and Striplin put the Jackets back on top 3-2 with Silverio just beginning her third set. Tech trailed in the remaining match on court six when Silverio finished off 40th-ranked Tracy Lin with a dominating 6-1 win in the third. Silverio had won the first 7-5 but dropped the second, also 7-5. Silverio, who also clinched the Jackets' quarterfinal win over Fresno State, was named the Most Valuable Player of the NCAA Tournament.

McDowell earned Tech's first singles win with a 6-1, 6-0 blitzing of Ashley Joelson at No. 4 singles. The freshman from Atlanta won her 10th straight match and her team-leading 39th of the season. She was undefeated in the NCAA matches to earn a spot on the all-tournament team.

One day after clinching Tech's semifinal win over California, Striplin again provided a key victory as she rallied for a three-set win over Alex McGoodwin at No. 5 singles. After losing the first set, Striplin won 12 of the final 14 games for a 4-6, 6-1, 6-2 victory and was also named to the all-tournament team.

Miller, ranked sixth in the nation, defeated No. 15 Riza Zalameda at No. 1 singles, 6-3, 7-6.

UCLA dominated in doubles winning 8-3 at both No. 1 and No. 2, although the Jackets led on court three when doubles ended. Zalameda and Yasmin Schnack defeated Tech's third-ranked duo of Miller and Whitney McCray, and Joelson and Goodwin downed Silverio and Amanda Craddock.

The Bruins earned a singles win from Schnack, who defeated Craddock at No. 3, and Lumpkin was leading for UCLA at No. 6.

CARY, N.C. - Tournament MVP Alison Silverio came back after dropping her first set to win at No. 4 singles and lift sixth-ranked Georgia Tech to a 4-3 victory over No. 12 Miami in the finals of the ACC Championship.

It marks the first ACC Championship in Georgia Tech tennis history.

"I think it's so hard to win an ACC title and it's hard enough to get into the finals, much less complete the task by winning the tournament," said head coach Bryan Shelton. "In 1988, we [the men's team] came so close, just one match away from winning. Kenny [Thorne, head coach for Georgia Tech men's tennis] and I were out there in the end and couldn't quite get it done, so it has been a long time coming to have this opportunity again. It doesn't feel much different, being a coach or player, as it is just as satisfying to win now as a coach. The girls on the court are the ones that got it done though, they deserve all of the credit."

In the tournament, the Yellow Jackets went 11-4 in singles matches, including a perfect 3-0 mark by Silverio. She also teamed with Kristi Miller to clinch the doubles point against the Hurricanes earlier in the day.

The Yellow Jackets carried a 1-0 lead into singles play by earning wins at the No. 1 and 3 doubles positions. After the Hurricane duo of Megan Bradley and Staci Stevens defeated Lyndsay Shosho and Dasha Potapova, 8-5, at the No. 2 slot, the Yellow Jacket duo of Whitney McCray and Kelly Anderson downed Patricia Starzyk and Caren Seenauth, 8-5 at No. 3, setting up the top doubles slot for the clinching point.

No. 18 Miller and Silverio then stopped a comeback by Audrey Banada and Melissa Applebaum to clinch the doubles point for the Yellow Jackets with a 9-7 score at the No. 1 position.

Banada tied the match at 1-1 when she defeated Shosho, 6-1, 6-1, at the No. 5 singles position, and Miami took a 2-1 lead in the match when No. 99 Emily Mowery downed Tech's Kacie Anson, 6-2, 6-0, at the No. 6 position.

After Miami went up 3-1 with a 6-3, 6-4 win by the nation's top-ranked Bradley at No. 1 singles, the Yellow Jackets battled back with wins at the Nos. 2 and 3 positions.

At No. 2, Potapova battled the Hurricane's Stevens, winning 6-2, 7-5, and the Jackets' Anderson came back after winning a tiebreaker in the first set to defeat Applebaum, 7-6 (6), 6-1.

Silverio then came back to win her second set 6-4 after dropping the first by a 5-7 mark and then breezed through the final set, 6-2 against Starzyk, to give the Yellow Jackets their first ACC Championship.

CARY, N.C. - With singles wins by Kelly Anderson, Kristi Miller and Christy Striplin, the 10th-ranked Georgia Tech women's tennis team captured its second ACC Championship in as many years with a 4-1 victory over No. 9 Miami Sunday afternoon at the Cary Tennis Center in Cary, NC.

With the win, the Yellow Jackets tied their previous season-high with their 21st win, moving to 21-5 on the season, while Miami dropped to 19-6.

"Our goal from the first day of practice in the fall was to come back and win the ACC Championship," said Georgia Tech head coach Bryan Shelton. "The girls have kept that goal in front of them all year, and for them to come out and keep that against a great Miami team is just a credit to the heart and discipline that they show every day."

Tech improved to 5-3 against the Hurricanes, and are a perfect 5-0 against Miami since Shelton began coaching on the Flats in 2000. After earning the first ACC Tennis Championship in school history a year ago, the Jackets are now back-to-back champions for the first time in history.

The Jackets took a 1-0 lead in the match with quick victories at the Nos. 2 and 3 doubles slots. The Tech duo of Kacie Anson and Alison Silverio dropped Caren Seenauth and Patricia Starzyk, 8-3, on court three before Anderson and Whitney McCray captured the deciding point with an 8-4 victory over Monika Dancevic and Audrey Banada at the No. 2 position.

"I think that our team stepped up in so many spots today," said Shelton. "It started with our best doubles effort of the year, and it culminated with players stepping up in singles."

Anderson, ranked No. 111 in singles, gave the Jackets a 2-0 edge with a 6-0, 6-3 victory over Starzyk on court five before No. 83 Melissa Applebaum pulled the Canes within one point with a 6-2, 6-4 win over No. 60 Lyndsay Shosho at No. 2 singles.

ACC Tournament MVP Kristi Miller, the top-ranked singles player in the nation, then pushed the score to 3-0 with a hard-fought 6-4, 6-3 victory over the nation's No. 2 singles player, ACC Player of the Year Audra Cohen, before Striplin clinched the championship for the Jackets with a 6-1, 7-5 win against Seenauth at the No. 6 slot in the lineup.

"Up and down the lineup, I saw quality tennis all day long," added Shelton, "and at the end of the day, we were holding the trophy. I'm just really proud of this group of players."

CARY, N.C. - Christy Striplin won 12 of her last 13 games en route to a 2-6, 6-0, 6-1 victory at No. 5 singles to clinch match point as the fifth-ranked Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets (23-4) captured their third-straight ACC Women's Tennis Championship with a 4-1 win over No. 11 Miami in the title match Sunday afternoon at the Cary Tennis Complex. "It never gets old," said an elated Bryan Shelton, head coach of the three-time ACC Champion women's tennis team.

For the third-straight day, the Yellow Jackets were led by freshman Amanda Craddock, who ended the tournament with a 3-0 record in singles and a 2-0 mark in doubles to earn MVP honors. Craddock posted a 6-3, 6-2 win over Miami's 50th-ranked Audrey Banada to tie the match at 1-1 after the Hurricanes won the doubles point to start the day.

"A.C. is well deserving (of MVP honors) after her play this weekend," said Shelton. "Not only did she win, but she won convincingly in all of her matches. She was the catalyst for this team all weekend, and the honor is just a tribute to what she's done all season. She has gotten better and better as the season has gone on."

Freshman Amanda McDowell gave the Yellow Jackets a 2-1 lead with a 6-1, 6-1 victory over Romy Farah at the No. 4 singles spot before Tech's eighth-ranked Kristi Miller stunned top-ranked Audra Cohen, 7-5, 6-2, at the top singles spot to put the score to 3-1. It was the second time in as many ACC Championship matches that Miller has bested Cohen.

"Kristi's win was huge," said Shelton. "Last year she got over the hump, beating Audra at ACC's, and she made shockwaves throughout the rankings. I think the same happened again today. She fell behind early (to Cohen), but got gritty and stuck in there. Once (Miller) got on top, she didn't relinquish the lead. I'm so proud of her effort, especially after losing doubles. She came back strong to lead this team to victory."

Miami began singles play with a 1-0 lead after winning at the Nos. 1 and 3 doubles positions. Banada and Gina Sabatino stopped the Yellow Jacket tandem of Taryn Rudman and Kirsten Flower, 8-3, at the third doubles spot before Tech's 51st-ranked duo of Alison Silverio and Craddock handed Caren Seenauth and Farah an 8-6 loss at the second doubles position, setting up the top doubles line as the deciding match.

Miami's 33rd-ranked Cohen and Laura Valverde then outlasted Miller and Whitney McCray, the nation's third-ranked doubles team, 8-6, to give the Hurricanes the first point of the match.

CARY, N.C. - Sophomore Irina Falconi pulled off a dramatic three-set victory to clinch seventh-seeded Georgia Tech team's 4-3 win over top-seeded and No. 1 ranked North Carolina in the finals of the 2010 ACC Tournament at the Cary Tennis Center.

The Yellow Jackets captured their fourth ACC Tournament title under head Bryan Shelton and first since 2007. "What an incredible weekend," Shelton said. "It is certainly one of the biggest highlights in our program's history. It was a really special weekend to be able to see our players believe and execute the game plans. We fought through a lot of adversity this weekend physically but just remained so mentally tough."

Falconi, the tournament MVP, split the first two sets with No. 22 Sanaz Marand before winning the match in the third set, 6-1, 3-6, 6-4.

"That was one of the gutsiest performances that I have seen," said Shelton about Falconi. "For her to be able to steady herself and get to the net on two of the biggest points of the match to clinch it for us was incredible for us."

The Yellow Jackets opened the day by taking two of three doubles matches to open up an early 1-0 lead over the Tar Heels. After Elizabeth Kilborn and Viet Ha Ngo fell on court three, the Jackets tandem of Hillary Davis and Lynn Blau picked up their teammates with an 8-6 victory over Sophie Grabinski and Jelena Durisic. With the point on the line, Tech's No. 1 duo of Falconi and Sasha Krupina came through with an 8-5 win over Marand and Katrina Tsang.

North Carolina pulled even with the Jackets when Jelena Durisic upended Krupina, 6-3, 6-2, at No. 3 singles. The Tar Heels' Shinann Featherston followed with a 6-0, 6-2 win over Davis at the sixth position in the lineup to open a 2-1 advantage on Tech.

Kilborn evened the score at 2-2 with a 6-2, 7-5 victory over Grabinski on court five but the Tar Heels would answer right back when No. 51 Tsang finished off Ngo, 6-2, 6-4 at No. 2 singles.

Down 3-2, the Jackets Lynn Blau came from behind to win a huge 1-6, 6-3, 6-3 win over Gina Suarez-Malaguti on court four.

The match came down to Falconi, the nation's top-ranked player, and she did not disappoint. Falconi captured her school-record 26th dual-match victory of the season and has now won 20 straight matches to lead Tech to the title.

"We could not have done this without everyone on the team contributing," Shelton said. "This was truly a team effort this weekend. We got a lift from everyone on the team and it led us to this win."

Kristi Miller became Georgia Tech's first women's tennis All-American when she earned All-American honors in singles as a freshman. The Marysville, Mich., native went on to become the most decorated student-athlete in school history, as she own's Tech's career marks in singles victories (152) and doubles wins (110). A six-time All-American (four-times singles, two-times doubles), Miller has also earned the prestigious Honda Award for Women's Tennis (2006) and is a four-time all-Atlantic Coast Conference honoree. Miller's accolades include being named the 2008 ACC Player of the Year, the ITA National Player to Watch and ACC Tournament MVP in 2006 and the ACC Rookie of the Year in 2005. Miller is a three-time CoSIDA/ESPN the Magazine Academic All-American and finished her four-year degree with a perfect 4.0 grade point average at Georgia Tech.

LYNDSAY SHOSHO

2006 - DOUBLES



Lyndsay Shosho became the Yellow Jackets' second women's tennis All-American when she teamed with Kristi Miller to advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championships in her senior season (2006). The same year, Shosho set the then school record for singles wins in a season with 35 while breaking the mark for doubles victories at Tech. She currently stands fourth in Tech's record books with 83 career doubles wins and eighth with 84 career singles wins. In addition to earning All-America honors, Shosho was twice named All-Atlantic Coast Conference and helped lead Tech to its first two Atlantic Coast Conference Championships.

WHITNEY MCCRAY

2007 - DOUBLES



Whitney McCray earned All-American accolades in doubles during the 2007 season when she teamed with Kristi Miller to earn the No. 3 seed in the NCAA Doubles Championships. The Yellow Jacket duo, which reached as high as No. 3 before finishing the season at No. 7 in the national rankings, were ranked in the top-10 for the last three months of the season. McCray ranks second all-time in the Yellow Jacket record books with 101 career doubles wins. She was part of all three ACC Championships and was a key member of Tech's NCAA Championship team in 2007.

AMANDA MCDOWELL

2008 - SINGLES



Amanda McDowell became the first Georgia Tech women's tennis player to win an individual national title when she captured the 2008 NCAA Singles Championship. Only the second Yellow Jacket to earn All-America accolades in singles, McDowell finished her sophomore season with a school record 45 singles wins. She was named the 2008 ITA National Player of the Year and was the 2008 Honda Award recipient for women's tennis.

IRINA FALCONIA

2009 - SINGLES
2010 - SINGLES



Irina Falconia became the fifth Yellow Jacket women to earn All-America honors and just the second freshman to be nationally recognized. Falconi won 30 matches including 18 over nationally-ranked players. She closed out her rookie campaign ranked No. 12 in the nation. In her sophomore, and final campaign on The Flats, by setting a school record for dual match wins, finishing 26-1. She posted a 40-3 overall singles mark, good for fourth all-time in the Tech annals. She posted a 30-3 mark against ranked foes and her .930 winning percentage is by far the best in school history. Falconi was the No. 1 seed in the 2010 NCAA Singles Tournament and advanced to the quarterfinals.

JILLIAN O'NEILL

2012 - SINGLES



Jillian O'Neill became the sixth Jacket to earn All-America honors when she finished the season ranked No. 12 in the ITA rankings. The Montreal, Quebec, native finished the year with a team-best 30 singles wins and a 17-9 mark from the No. 1 spot in Tech's dual lineup. O'Neill claimed 16 wins over ranked foes. She advanced to the NCAA Singles Championship for the second time in 2012 and finished her two-year Tech career with a 54-29 singles record.

HONORS & AWARDS

MEGAN KUREY 2014 - DOUBLES



Megan Kurey earned All-American accolades in doubles during the 2014 season when she teamed with Kendal Woodard to earn a 5-8 seed in the NCAA Doubles Championships. The duo finished out the season ranked as the #7 doubles team in the nation. Kurey and Woodard finished the 2014 season with a 13-7 record. The tandem won the 2013 ITA/USTA Southeast Doubles Title and the 2013 USTA/ITA National Indoor Intercollegiate Championships doubles title. Kurey was named to the All-ACC second team in 2014.

KENDAL WOODARD 2014 - DOUBLES



Kendal Woodard earned All-American accolades in doubles during the 2014 season when she teamed with Megan Kurey to earn a 5-8 seed in the NCAA Doubles Championships. The duo finished out the season ranked as the #7 doubles team in the nation. Kurey and Woodard finished the 2014 season with a 13-7 record. The tandem won the 2013 ITA/USTA Southeast Doubles Title and the 2013 USTA/ITA National Indoor Intercollegiate Championships doubles title. Woodard was named to the All-ACC first team in 2014 and was named All-ACC in 2013.

PAIGE HOURIGAN 2018 - SINGLES & DOUBLES



Paige Hourigan earned All-American accolades in both singles and doubles her senior season on The Flats. In singles play, Hourigan posted a 24-13 overall record and went 16-10 in dual action. A four-time all-ACC selection, Hourigan was named to the first team to cap her collegiate career. Ranked as high as No. 12 in the ITA rankings during the season where she finished the year, Hourigan reached the NCAA Tournament round of 16 in singles action before falling to eventual national champion Arianne Hartono of Ole Miss. Hourigan received at-large bids to the NCAA Singles Championship all four years as a Yellow Jacket. With doubles partner, Kenya Jones, the tandem finished the season ranked No. 1 in the country in the final ITA rankings. The pair went 27-8 overall and 18-5 in dual competition. Earning the ACC's automatic NCAA Tournament bid, the tandem capped their season in the NCAA quarterfinals. They spent the entire season ranked in the top five in the country and both were named all-ACC.

KENYA JONES 2018 - DOUBLES 2019 - SINGLES 2020 - SINGLES & DOUBLES 2021 - SINGLES & DOUBLES



Kenya Jones earned All-American accolades with doubles partner Paige Hourigan in 2017-18. The tandem finished the season ranked No. 1 in the country in the final ITA rankings. The pair went 27-8 overall and 18-5 in dual competition. Earning the ACC's automatic NCAA Tournament bid, the tandem capped their season in the NCAA quarterfinals. They spent the entire season ranked in the top five in the country and both were named all-ACC. Jones was then tabbed an All-American in singles her junior season, in 2018-19. She finished with a 29-12 overall mark and rose as high as No. 8 in the national rankings. She capped the campaign ranked No. 15 nationally. After a shortened 2019-20 season due to Covid-19, Jones capped her collegiate season earning ITA All-American status in both singles and doubles. She led the Jackets from the top singles and doubles positions all season, compiling an overall 17-9 record in singles, including a 12-4 mark in dual play. Jones posted a 5-2 record against ACC opponents, was named ACC Player of the Week three times and defeated three top-10 players during the spring season. She rose to No. 20 nationally in singles rankings. In doubles with partner Victoria Flores,

the tandem went 20-2 overall, including a 15-1 dual record and 6-0 ACC ledger, all from the No. 1 spot. They went 7-0 against national ranked opponents and rose to No. 6 nationally in doubles rankings. Jones returned for her Covid year and fifth year on The Flats in 2021, earning ITA All-America honors in both singles and doubles. She climbed as high as No. 2 nationally in singles rankings and was one half of the No. 1 doubles team in the country with Flores.

VICTORIA FLORES 2020 - DOUBLES 2021 - SINGLES & DOUBLES



In doubles with partner Kenya Jones, Victoria Flores earned her first ITA All-America status following the shortened 2019-20 season due to Covid-19. The tandem went 20-2 overall, including a 15-1 dual record and 6-0 ACC ledger, all from the No. 1 spot. They went 7-0 against national ranked opponents and rose to No. 6 nationally in doubles rankings. Jones and Flores finished the season on an eight-match win streak. Flores earned ITA All-America honors in both singles and doubles her senior year in 2021. She climbed as high as No. 13 in singles and was one half of the top ranked doubles tandem in the country with Jones.

CAROL LEE 2022 - DOUBLES 2023 - SINGLES



Carol Lee earned All-American status with doubles partner Kate Sharabura in 2021-22 after the doubles team earned the No. 4 seed in the NCAA Championship and finished the season ranked No. 5 nationally. The pair compiled a 22-6 overall record during the season, including a 17-3 dual mark, and went 9-3 in ACC action. The Jackets led Georgia Tech from the No. 1 position all season and broke into the ITA national rankings in February, becoming a top-10 team at No. 9 on March 23. Lee became a two-time All-American in 2023 when she earned ITA All-American in singles. Lee went 29-12 overall and 17-7 in dual singles matches for Georgia Tech, leading the Yellow Jackets from the No. 1 singles position all season. She earned an individual bid to the NCAA Singles Championship as a top-16 seed to clinch All-American status. In her second individual appearance, Lee advanced to the quarterfinals for her deepest run in her career.

HONORS & AWARDS

KATE SHARABURA 2022 - DOUBLES



Kate Sharabura earned All-American status as a freshman with doubles partner Carol Lee in 2021-22 after the doubles team earned the No. 4 seed in the NCAA Championship and finished the season ranked No. 5 nationally. The pair compiled a 22-6 overall record during the season, including a 17-3 dual mark, and went 9-3 in ACC action. The Jackets led Georgia Tech from the No. 1 position all season and broke into the ITA national rankings in February, becoming a top-10 team at No. 9 on March 23. Sharabura was named the ITA Southeast Region Rookie of the Year to conclude her inaugural collegiate campaign.

KYLIE BILCHEV 2022 - DOUBLES



Kylie Bilchev became a freshman All-American when she earned the status with doubles partner Ava Hrastar in 2021-22. The pair went 21-10 overall, 12-8 in dual play and rose as high as No. 13 in the ITA polls. The tandem earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Doubles Championship and defeated two nationally-ranked opponents to reach the quarterfinals, garnering All-American status with their run. Bilchev and Hrastar capped the season ranked No. 21.

AVA HRASTAR 2022 - DOUBLES



Ava Hrastar earned All-American status with doubles partner Kylie Bilchev when the pair made a run to the quarterfinals of the 2022 NCAA Doubles Championship. The pair went 21-10 overall, 12-8 in dual play and rose as high as No. 13 in the ITA polls. The

tandem earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Doubles Championship and defeated two nationally-ranked opponents to reach the quarterfinals, garnering All-American status with their run. Bilchev and Hrastar capped the season ranked No. 21.

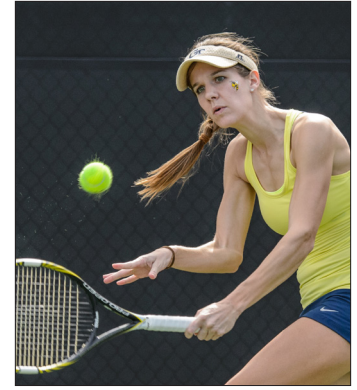
